laws and tactics, search and seizure rules, documenting crimes and arrests, conducting field interviews and court procedures.

Research Assignment

Students are to review newspaper and other media sources for articles on law enforcement incidents in which a patrol function was involved. Upon selecting an article, read and analyze the article and write on the following:

- 1. Summarize the incident in no more than one paragraph
- 2. Identify and describe the issue in the article
- 3. Evaluate the police handling of the incident. In your evaluation, consider tactics and judgment used. Did the officers involved use proper tactics as discussed in class? Was proper judgment applied? Were other options available? How would you have handled the incident?

Extra Credit

Extra credit points can be earned through participation in a ride-a-long patrol experience with a local law enforcement agency. To obtain credit, a student must contact the agency with which the ride-a-long will be conducted and request the ride a long. Most agencies have their own specific rules that are used to grant such request, and then procedures to follow once the request has been approved. Students should follow those rules, procedures and guidelines. However, not all police agencies allow civilian ride-a-longs. Check first with the agency.

If the request has been granted, and the ride a long completed, in order for a grade to be granted, students are required to document the experience in a written report, outlining the basic facts of the experience, such as who the police officer was with whom the student rode, when, what agency, calls handled, arrests made and any other facts that seemed interesting. Also the student should document any questions or problems that arose, which need further clarification. Total possible points for this extra credit option is 15.
