#### 2010 Annual Letter from Bill Gates: Online Learning

Bill Gates <u>praises the potential of online learning</u> in his annual letter about the priorities of his foundation, which has a \$34-billion endowment.

The Microsoft Corporation chairman says he's a fan of the movement to publish course materials free online. He seems especially impressed with online systems that gauge students' knowledge and give them specific feedback, <u>a specialty of the Open Learning Initiative at Carnegie Mellon University</u>. But while he acknowledges the work of open-content aggregators like <u>Academic Earth</u>, Mr. Gates wants to see better organization of the vast course materials on the Web.

"The foundation has made a few grants to drive online learning, but we are just at the start of this work," Gates writes. "So far, technology has hardly changed formal education at all. But a lot of people, including me, think this is the next place where the Internet will surprise people in how it can improve things—especially in combination with face-to-face learning."

All projects must include the following components: 1) the opportunity for students and their teachers to experience exemplary works of art, in live form wherever possible; 2) study of the art experienced including the acquisition of skills for practicing the art form where appropriate; 3) the performance/making of art within the discipline(s) studied; and 4) assessment of student learning according to national or state arts education standards.

Title:	Humanities Initiatives for Institutions with High Hispanic Enrollment

Summary:	Humanities Initiatives are intended to strengthen and enrich humanities education and scholarship at Institutions with High Hispanic Enrollment. These grants may be used to enhance the humanities content of existing programs, develop new programs, or lay the foundation for more extensive endeavors in the future. Each project must be organized around a core topic or set of themes. Support is available for two types of projects: Faculty Humanities Initiatives and Institutional Grants for Core Humanities. Since they have different goals and outcomes, applicants should choose carefully the type of grant most appropriate for their proposed project.

Summary:	Conservation Trust is to support conservation activities around the world as they fit within the mission of the National Geographic Society. The trust will fund projects that contribute significantly to the preservation and sustainable use of the Earth's biological, cultural, and historical resources. While the Conservation Trust acknowledges the need to preserve archaeological sites and artifacts, our current budget limits prevent us from funding such requests.
	<b>Eligibility</b> The Conservation Trust's strength lies in supporting cutting edge programs that might be overlooked by other organizations, due to the risk involved in working with new investigators and in new fields. Applicants are not expected to have Ph.D.'s or other advanced degrees. However, applicants must provide a record of prior research or conservation action as it pertains to the proposed project. Funding is not restricted to United States citizens. Researchers planning work in foreign countries should include at least one local collaborator as part of their research teams.
Title:	Priority area: Reducing the U.S. contribution to global climate change.
Deadline:	The cut-off date for receipt of proposals to be considered by the Board at their June meeting is March 7. The cut-off date for receipt of proposals to be considered by the Board at their December meeting is September 7. Proposals must be received by 5:30 in the Compton Foundation office. If the cut-off date falls on a weekend, proposals will be accepted on the following Monday. If the cut-off date falls on a holiday, proposals are due the following workday.

Summary:	The U.S. is the largest national contributor to global climate change. Our nation not only plays a major role in global warming because of the size of its annual emissions, but also because U.S. decisions alter the context for international action. The Compton Foundation aims to help advance climate policy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions while encouraging adaptation planning in the areas where the harshest climate impacts are likely to be felt first. We support efforts to: (1) ensure that implementation of California's Global Warming Solutions Act (AB 32) is effective and politically successful; (2) advance a new energy economy with particular focus on renewables, efficiency, and both urban and rural green jobs; and (3) promote analysis of the climate/water nexus and use the emerging information to help provide fresh water for both human needs and aquatic ecosystems.
