

# El Camino College Compton Center High School Enrollment Trends

2010-11 to 2016-17 with Projection Year

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## Introduction

This report profiles recent enrollment trends from local area high schools that send their graduates to El Camino College Compton Center. Featured schools include those coming from school districts within the Compton Community College District (CCCD): Compton, Lynwood, and Paramount school districts. Three schools from southern Los Angeles USD and Locke High Schools also feed larger enrollments to El Camino College Compton Center. The LAUSD schools are Carson, Gardena and Fremont. Jordan High School from Long Beach Unified School District is the final school located outside the Compton Community College District included in this report.

Enrollment trends are tracked from 2010-11 through 2016-17. A projection year (2017-18) is also included in this report to forecast enrollment in the next academic year (see Appendix A for how projection was calculated). Source data for these trend are from the California Department of Education (CDE), Educational Demographics Unit.

## Executive Summary

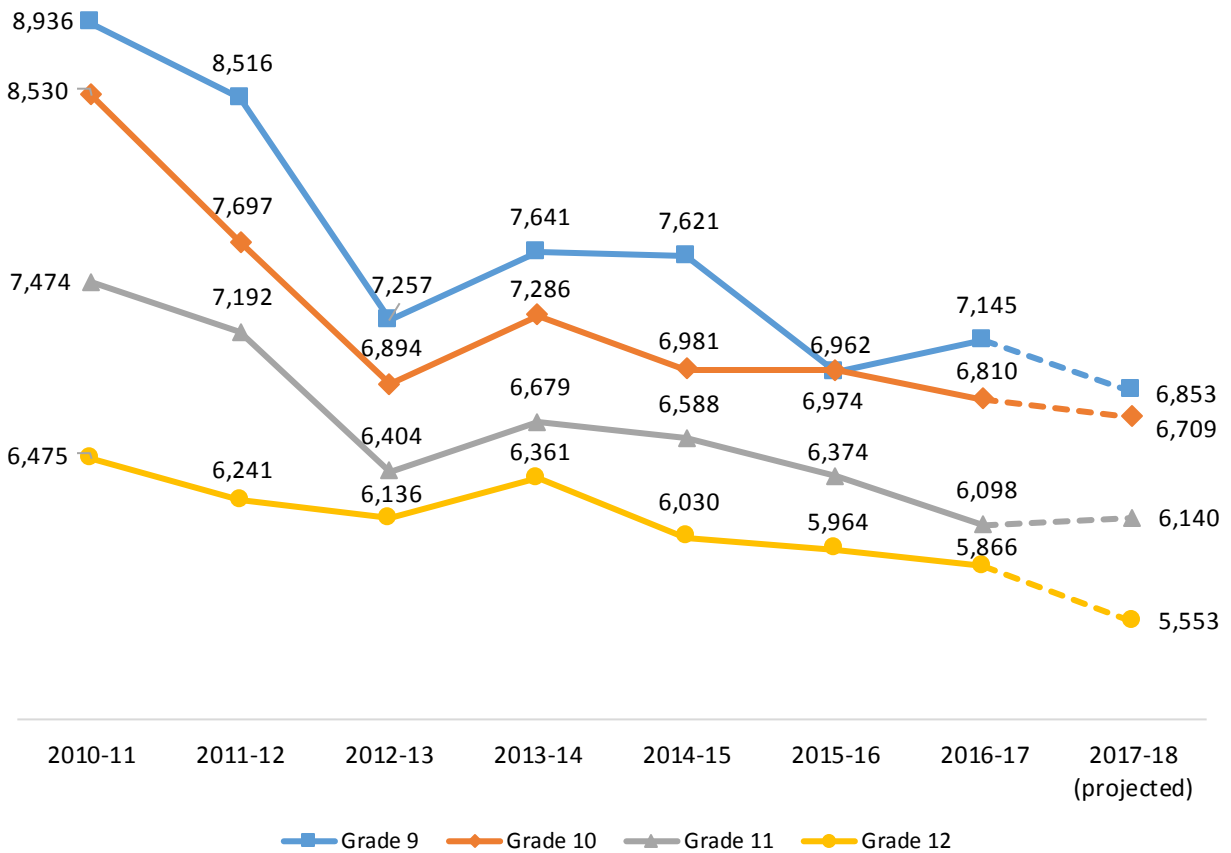
Overall enrollments in feeder high schools have been declining over the last few years. Several high schools and districts show declines to varying degrees. Some, like those in Compton Unified School District, have continued to experience declines in student enrollment. Others, like Jordan High School, have recently seen an increase in student enrollment. Despite the variations in enrollment, the area trend is one of declining high school population, which coincides with the aging population in the region, as documented in the [Service Area Profile](#).

Since 2010, elementary schools and middle schools that feed into the district high schools have experienced a steady rate of decline until recently. The greater rate of decline than growth in enrollment in elementary and middle schools suggests enrollments at the high school level will continue to decline in the next few years. Projections of enrollments at Compton Center indicate continued declines in Compton Center students coming from feeder high schools over the next few years.

## District-Wide Trends

Enrollments at the feeder high schools have generally been in a state of decline. Total local high school enrollment is down by almost 5,500 students since the 2010-2011 school year, when enrollment was at its highest in the last seven years. The greatest decline occurred between 2010 and 2013. Since then, the district has been experiencing an ebb and flow trend in enrollment with some years of growth followed by decline.

Figure 1. Trend in Total Enrollment in Feeder High Schools, 2010-2018

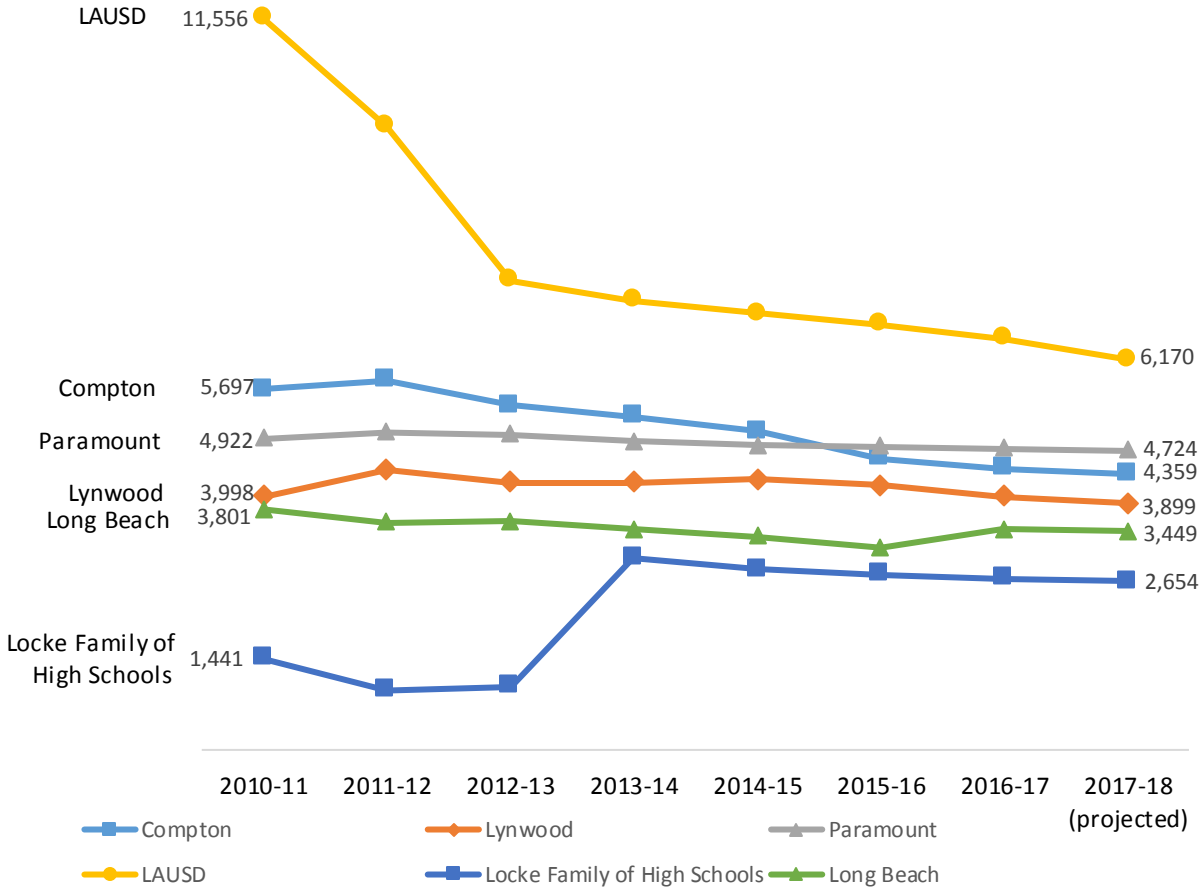


Ninth grade and tenth grade enrollments have experienced the greatest decline, with ninth grade enrollments having decreased by 1,791 students and tenth grade enrollments having decreased by 1,720 students since 2010-2011. A continued decline would lead to fewer students coming through the feeder school pipeline in the near future. Recent increase in middle school enrollment could possibly slow the rate of decline in the enrollment of ninth grade students. Furthermore, a greater percentage of people at the traditional college age range (18-24) will have completed high school as the gap in numbers between freshmen and senior narrows. This can be seen by organizing the data by class, allowing for an examination of the retention rate. In looking at the class of 2017, 7,641 students began as freshmen at one of the feeder high schools. 5,866 students were enrolled by their senior year leaving a net retention rate of about 77% through senior year, which is sixteen percentage point greater than four years ago. Although this is not an actual cohort since the same set of students are not followed throughout each period, the data indicates that classes have been losing less of their students since 2010. Despite the decrease in enrollment, feeder high schools have been experiencing increased retention rate since 2013.

# District and High School Trends

Breaking down the enrollment trends by district and high school paints a more varied picture. Most districts and its schools have been in a state of decline.

LAUSD has particularly been experiencing a steady decline in their high school enrollment. It is projected that LAUSD will continue to experience decline in enrollment. Some districts, such as Long Beach and Paramount, have shown slight increases in enrollment. Others are fluctuating between growth and decline. Locke Family of High Schools’ sharp increase in enrollment from 2011-12 to 2012-13 can be attributed to the 2013 closure of some of its schools that are not included in this report. The following sections show overall enrollment by schools within each district. Tables in Appendix B detail enrollment by grade level for each high school and district along with the annual percent change at the bottom of each table.

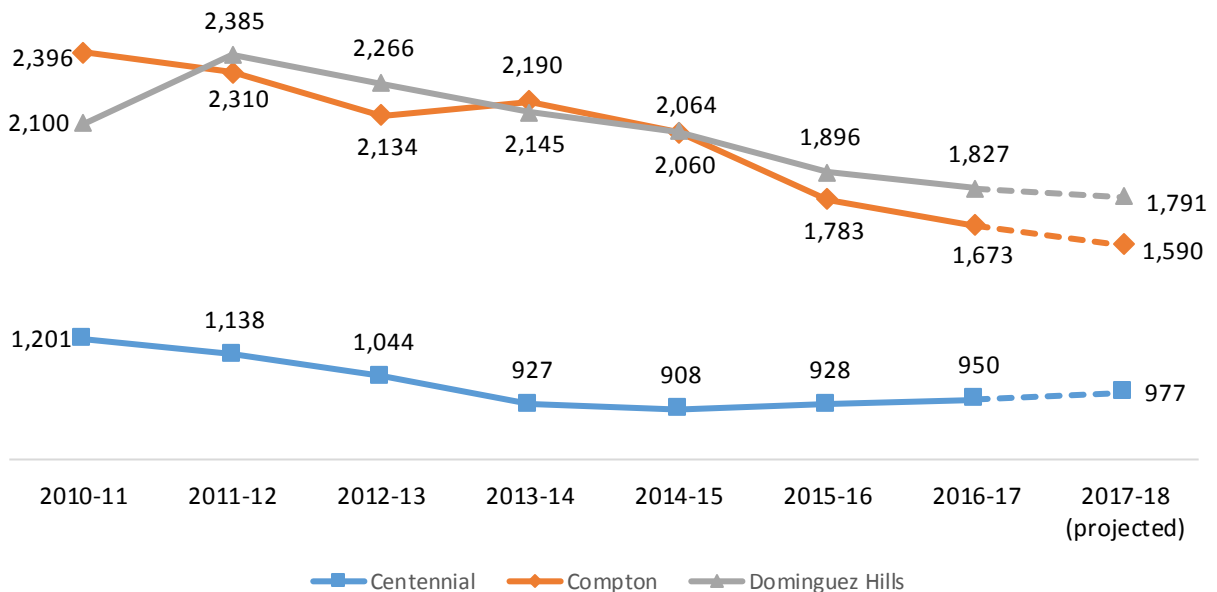
## Compton Unified School District

Compton Unified School District includes Centennial, Compton, and Dominguez Hills High Schools. All three schools are major feeders to ECC Compton Center. The slight growth the district experienced in 2011-12 reflects the increase in enrollment that Dominguez Hills High School experienced that year. Since then, it has seen steady declines in enrollment and experienced its lowest enrollment number in 2016-2017. This decline led to a decrease in enrollments of 558 students since 2011-2012. The school is projected to experience further decline in enrollment in 2017-2018.

Centennial High School continued to show a decline in enrollment from 2011 to 2014, with the school reaching its lowest enrollment of below 1,000 students in 2013-2014. It has since experienced a steady increase and is projected to continue to see a growth in enrollment in the upcoming year.

Compton High School experienced its highest peak in enrollment in 2011-2012 before seeing steady declines in the number of students. It has decreased by 558 students over the course of five academic years and is projected to continue to see a decline in enrollment.

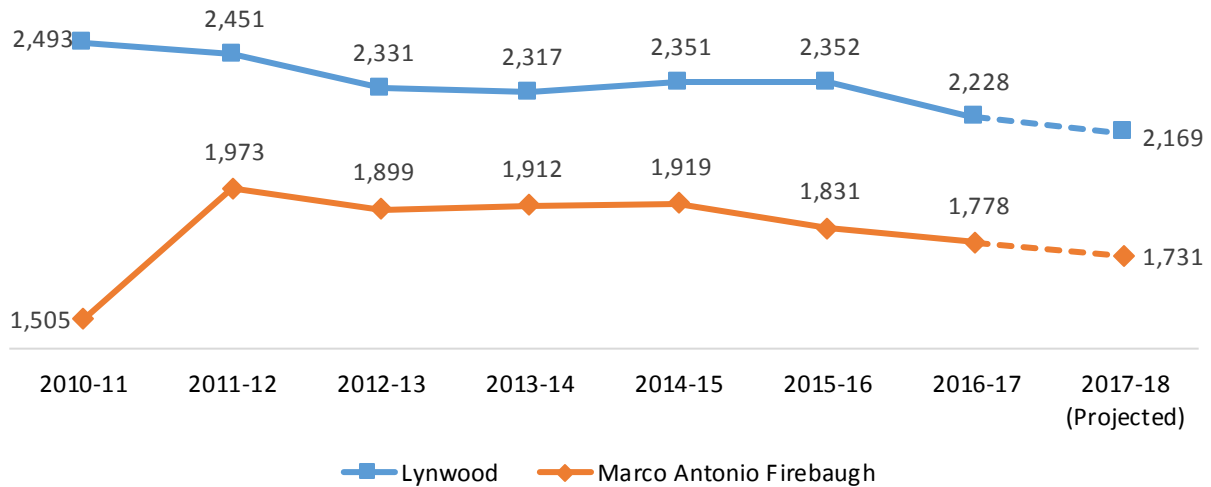
Figure 3. Compton Unified School District Enrollment Trend, 2010-2018



## Lynwood Unified School District

Lynwood Unified School District includes Lynwood and Marco Antonio Firebaugh High Schools. Both Lynwood and Firebaugh are moderate feeders to Compton Center.

Figure 4. Lynwood Unified School District Enrollment Trend, 2010-2018



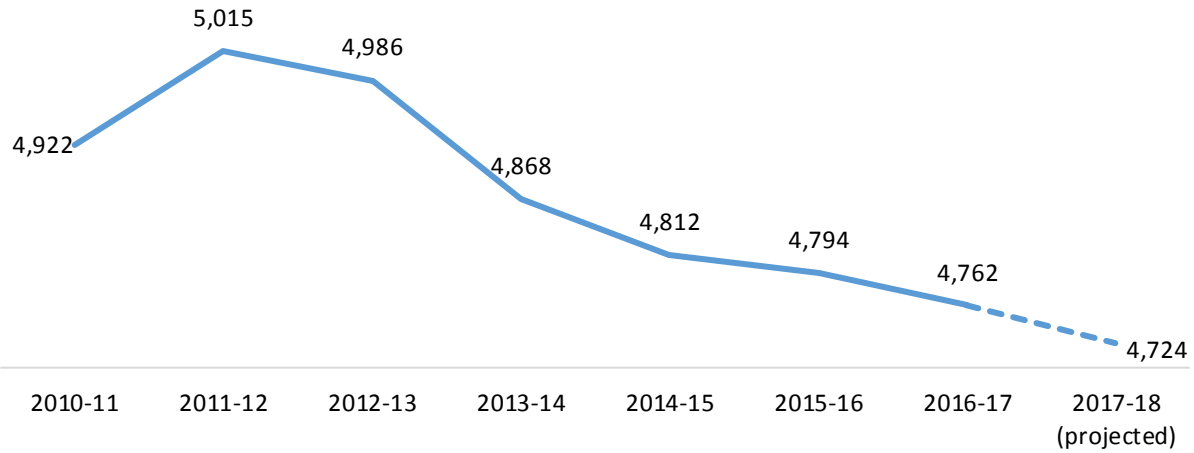
The district reached its highest peak in enrollment of 4,424 students in 2011-2012, which reflects a substantial 31% growth in enrollment at Firebaugh during that year. This was followed by a brief dip in enrollment the following year before experiencing slight increases again between 2013-2015. More recently, however, the school has been experiencing steady declines in enrollment and is projected to see another decrease in enrollment in 2017-2018.

Lynwood High School experienced its lowest enrollment in 2016-17 in the past seven years. Enrollment decreased by 265 students since 2010-2011, when it was at its highest number of enrolled student at 5,015. Similar to Firebaugh, Lynwood is projected to experience further decline in enrollment in the upcoming academic year.

## Paramount Unified School District

Paramount High School, one of the two high schools in Paramount Unified School District, is a moderate feeder to Compton Center. Since reaching its highest enrollment of 5,015 students in 2011-2012 at 5,015 students, Paramount has experienced continuous decrease in students. It saw its lowest enrollment number in 2016-17 at 4,762. Over the course of five years, the school's enrollment decreased by 253 students and is projected to see a further decline in enrollment.

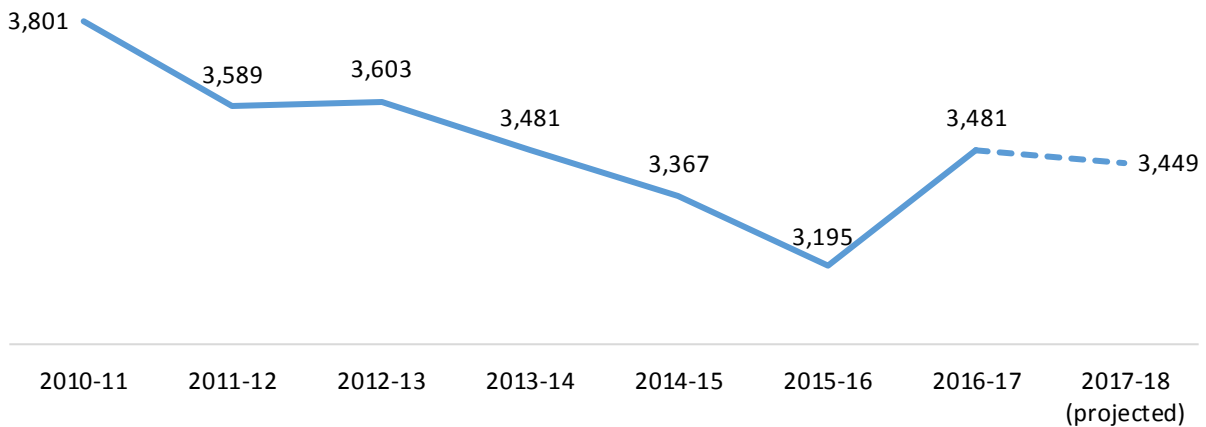
Figure 5. Paramount High School Enrollment Trend, 2010-2018



### Long Beach Unified School District

Jordan High School, one of the twelve high schools in Long Beach Unified School District, is closely situated and is a major feeder to Compton Center. Jordan was at its highest enrollment in 2010-2011 with 3,801 students. Since then, it has been experiencing declines in enrollment. The school reached its lowest enrollment in 2015-2016 with 3,195 students, a 16% decline from 2010-2011. In 2016-17, however, Jordan saw a sharp 9% increase with 3,481 students. Despite this increase, Paramount is projected to see another slight dip in student enrollment in the upcoming year.

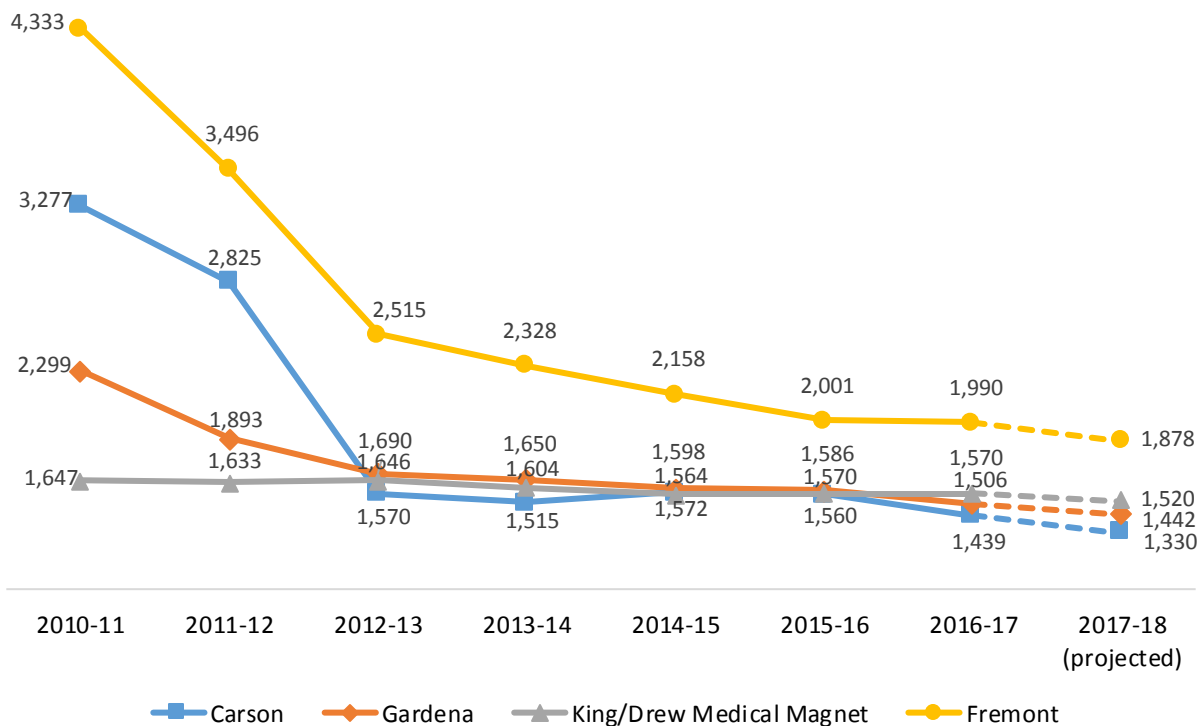
Figure 6. Jordan High School Enrollment Trend, 2010-2018



## Los Angeles Unified School District

Feeder schools in LAUSD are Carson, Gardena, King-Drew Medical Magnet, and Fremont High Schools. They steadily experienced a fairly large decline in enrollments during the last seven years.

Figure 7. Los Angeles Unified School District Enrollment Trend, 2010-2018



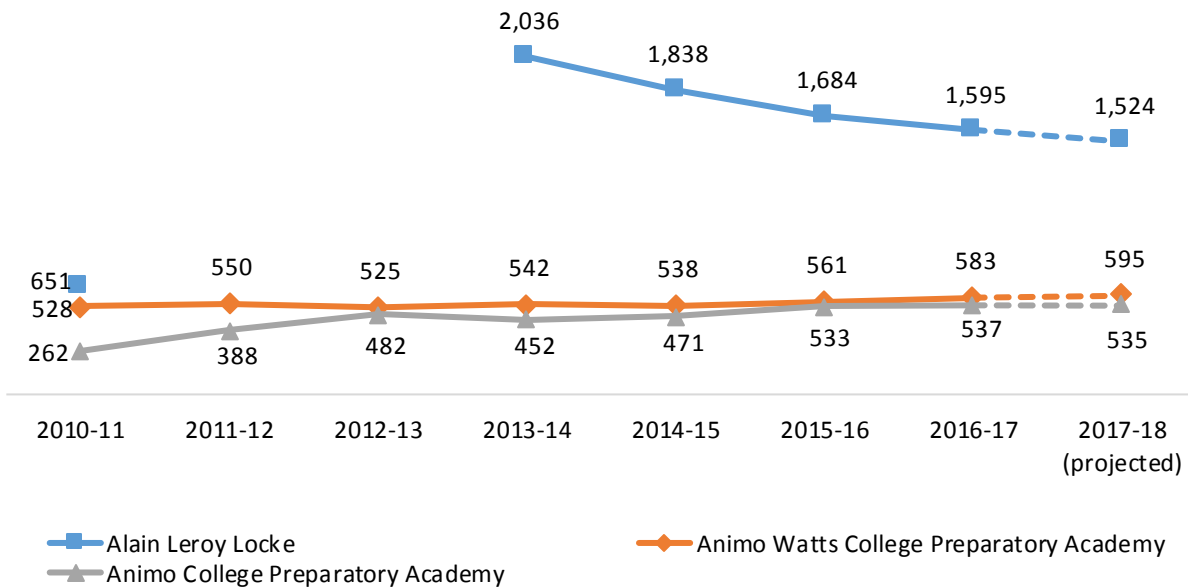
Carson and Fremont High Schools experienced a particularly significant decline in enrollment in 2012-2013. Carson's enrollment decreased from 2,825 students in 2011-2012 to 1,570 students in 2012-2013. Enrollment slightly increased between 2012 and 2015 before decreasing in enrollment once again. Fremont's enrollment decreased from 3,496 students in 2011-2012 to 2,515 students in 2012-2013 and has continued to decline. For the first time in seven years, student enrollment reached below 2,000 students in 2016-2017. Gardena High School has also seen decreases in enrollment since 2010. It experienced the sharpest decline in enrollment from 2010-2011 to 2011-2012, as enrollment decreased from 2,299 students in 2010-2011 to 1,893 students in 2011-2012. King/Drew Medical Magnet High School's enrollment has fluctuated over time. It experienced a decline in enrollment between 2012 and 2015 before seeing an increased enrollment between 2015 and 2017. These schools in LAUSD are projected to experience another decline in enrollment in 2017-2018.

## Locke Family of High Schools

Locke High School was a modest feeder to Compton Center before Green Dot Public Schools took over and reopened it as six small college prep charter schools known as the Locke Family of High Schools. In 2012-2013, schools began experiencing their first decline in total enrollment

and closed some of its schools in 2013: Animo Locke 1, 2 and 3 College Preparatory Academies and Animo Locke Technology High. Alain Leroy Locke High, which had closed in 2011, re-opened in 2013. This report includes the schools that have remained open since 2013: Alain Leroy Locke High School, Animo Watts College Preparatory Academy, and Animo College Preparatory Academy.

Alain Leroy Locke High School had 651 enrolled students prior to its closure in 2011. When it re-opened in 2013, student enrollment was at 2,036. This significant increase in the number of enrolled students coincides with the closure of three academies: Animo Locke 1, 2, and 3 College Preparatory Academies. Since its re-opening, enrollment at Alain Leroy Locke has steadily declined from 2,036 students in 2013-2014 to 1,595 students in 2016-2017, a decrease in enrollment by approximately 22%. The school is projected to experience further decline in enrollment.

Animo Watts College Preparatory Academy and Animo College Preparatory Academy show an opposite trend of slow enrollment growths over time. Since 2010-2011, Animo Watts College Preparatory Academy saw an increase of 55 students over the course of seven years and is projected to continue to experience an increase in student enrollment. Animo College Preparatory Academy saw a greater growth in enrollment by 272 students since 2010-2011, but is projected to experience a slight decrease in enrollment in 2017-2018.

## Future Trends

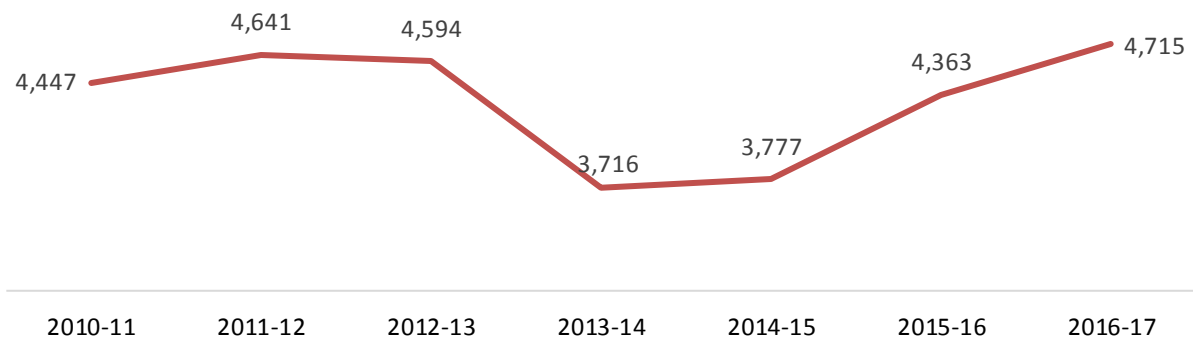
Examining enrollment trends in lower school levels (Kindergarten, Elementary Schools, and Middle Schools) can help project future enrollment at the high school level. The following graphs show enrollment trends by school level or type for districts within the Compton



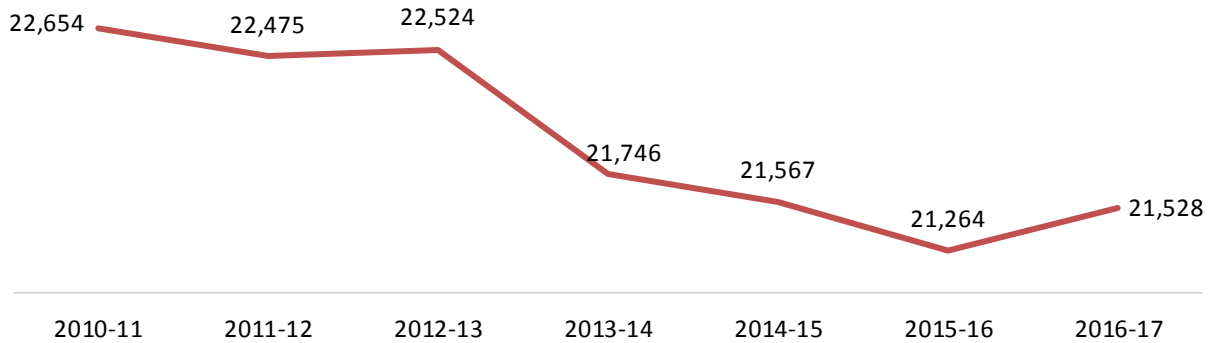
Community College District. Growth and decline is represented in number and percentage of change in Tables 25 and 26 (see Appendix B). The following charts graphically display enrollment trends by each school level.

Elementary and Middle school enrollment has been declining each year until 2015-2016, which may have contributed to a decline in high school enrollment. However, given the recent increase in enrollment at the elementary and middle school, combined with continued growth in kindergarten enrollment since 2013-2014, high schools may experience subsequent growth in enrollment in the near future.

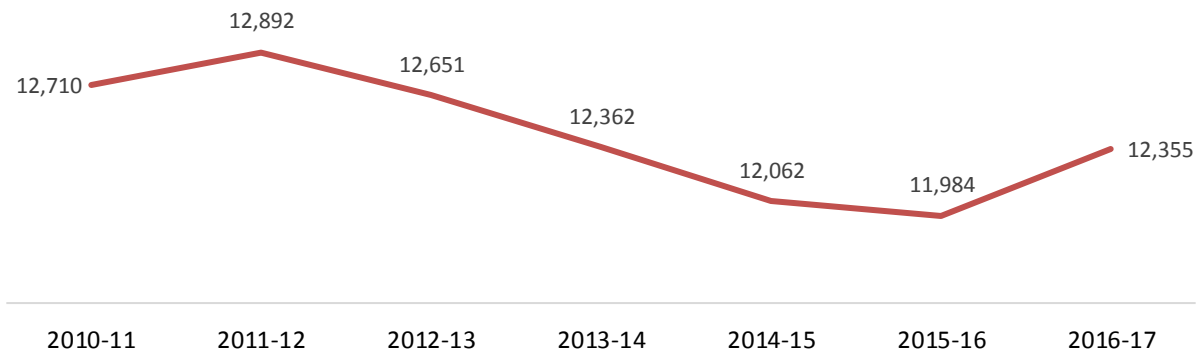
*Figure 9. Enrollment Trends in CCCD Kindergarten, 2010-2017*

## Compton Center Enrollment Projections

A projection of new enrollments coming from feeder schools was developed based on high school freshmen enrollments. Using a three-year average ratio of Compton Center enrollments coming from each feeder school and the number of freshmen who started at each feeder high school gives an indication of what each school will provide in the coming years. This model assumes other factors remain constant and that schools will continue to funnel students towards Compton Center at the same rates as they have been. Freshman counts are used because they were found to provide more accurate outputs than senior counts when comparing to known counts of students enrolled at Compton Center on self-reported high school of first time El Camino College Compton Center students.

## Appendix A – Calculating 2017-2018 High School Enrollment Projections

Grade progression ratio (GPR) is considered a useful method to project student enrollment. It uses historical enrollment data to examine cohort survival as each grade level progresses from one grade to the next. GPR is calculated by dividing enrollment in one grade level by enrollment in the lower grade from the previous year. The current report used a three-year average ratio instead of just a one-year ratio to account for and minimize randomness (e.g., housing development, migration, school transfers). This method was employed to project enrollment for Grades 10 to 12.

For 9<sup>th</sup> grade enrollment, the *total district-wide 8<sup>th</sup> grade enrollment* was used in place of lower grade enrollment since 9<sup>th</sup> grade is the incoming grade level for high schools. Therefore, 9<sup>th</sup> grade enrollment projection for each feeder high school was calculated using total 8<sup>th</sup> grade enrollment in its respective school district(s) listed in Table 3.
