


El Camino College Course Enrollment

Fall 2015 & Spring 2016




Overall El Camino College Success rate = 68%

Fall 2015 and Spring 2016




Distance from 2019-2020 Course Completion Goal of 74%




ECC Compton Center Course Enrollment



English Bridge Objective

To provide students with a combination of reading, writing, and test-taking strategies to help them potentially improve their English placement test exam scores so that they can begin the English sequence at the appropriate level.



Summer 2016 – The First Cohort Student Survey Highlights

Students were asked to participate in a survey to evaluate their opinion of English Bridge. Questions included:

- 1. How effective do you feel English Bridge was in helping you develop your English and test-taking skills?
- 2. Would you recommend English Bridge to your family or friends?
- 3. Do you think this program was long enough in terms of hours and/or days?
- 4. How effective do you feel English Bridge was in helping prepare you for the assessment exam?

Summer 2016 – The First Cohort Student Voices

Of the respondents:

- 100% said the program was highly effective in helping develop their English and test-taking skills.
- 100% would recommend the program to their family or friends.
- 100% said the program should have been longer.
- 100% said they were more prepared for the assessment test.

Summer 2016 – The First Cohort Student Survey Highlights

Students were asked to participate in a survey to evaluate their experiences in English Bridge. Questions included:

- 1. What did you learn about yourself as a student?
- 2. What did you plan to do to prepare for the exam?
- 3. What advice do you wish you had been given on the first day of Bridge?

Summer 2016 – The First Cohort Student Voices

- "I have learned that I am a much better student as a 34-year-old than I ever was as a kid fresh out of high school."
- "This English Bridge Program has been one of the best decisions I've made about school. I learned how to ease my anxiety about the course than I originally thought I did. I learned not to be shy around others."
- "Do not be discouraged by other students. You do you."
- "Study, cram, review, relax, workout the stress, and repeat as needed."



Fall 2016 Diagnostic Test Results: Math 23 and Math 40

Math 23: Week 1

• 60% of the students were able to answer 9 out of the 20 questions (n = 190).

Math 40: Week 1

• 60% of the students were able to answer 10 of the 20 questions (n = 154).

What did the Pre-diagnostic tests show?

The topics that students showed weaknesses in were the following:

- Fractions
- Order of operations
- Integers/signed numbers
- Word problems
- Decimals
- Simplifying expressions
- Converting fractions to decimals to percentages
- Linear Equations



Fall 2016 Post-Diagnostic Test Results: Math 23

Week 1

• 60% of the students were able to answer 9 out of the 20 questions (n = 190).

Week 14

• 60% of the students were now able to answer 18 of the 20 questions (n = 75).

Fall 2016 Post-Diagnostic Test Results: Math 40

Week 1

• 60% of the students were able to answer 10 of the 20 questions (n = 154).

Week 14

• 60% of the students were able to now answer 16 of the 20 questions (n = 114)

Who attended these workshops?

- All workshop attendance: over 45 students
- Most popular topics: fractions and simplifying expressions
- Math 40 students attended the most workshops
- Preliminary data shows that African American students were slightly over-represented in workshops compared to their enrollment in Math overall

What factors could have contributed to the improvement in results?

Students attended the workshop series

Several of the Math 23 and 40 sections had SI coaches

 Students attend tutoring sessions at the Math/Science Success Center






- In addressing student equity, SER faculty strive to:

- Examines potential structural and cultural obstacles that prevent courses from achieving equitable educational outcomes






The goal of Student Equity is to increase and improve access, course completion, course success, ESL and Basic Skills completion, degree and certificate Completion and transfer for disproportionately impacted student groups.



STARFISH Early Alert system will provide notice that a student is at risk or doing well.

Student is contacted to meet with a Counselor for initial assessment.

Counselor and/or Student Services Advisor facilitate the "Next Step" plan: support service referrals

Counselor and/or Student Services Advisor will follow-up on student to monitor progress

OBJECTIVES

Decrease Attrition: Student(s) will learn how to utilize campus resources to develop basic skills.

Increase Retention: Student(s) will know who to contact for certain levels of services.

Increase Success: Student(s) will develop study and time management skills and what it means to be a college student.

STARFISH INTEGRATION

- Faculty report at-risk students through Starfish Early Alert.
- The report is received by Counselors and Student Services Advisors.
- Student is contacted by Counselor and/or Student Services Advisor for intervention
- Student and Counselor develop a "Next Step" Student Success Plan
- Students are connected with academic resources to improve skills.
- Counselors and Student Services Advisors follow-up with students.
- It takes the entire campus working together to improve retention, success, completion and transfer rates.
