STEP 1 | Admission

Who is eligible for Admission?

Anyone 18 years of age or older qualifies for admission to El Camino College. If under the age of 18, you will qualify if you have 1) graduated from high school or 2) passed the California High School Certificate of Proficiency Test.

El Camino College may admit as a special part-time or special full-time student anyone in grades 11 or 12 who, in the opinion of the college president, may benefit from instruction. Concurrently enrolled 11th and 12th grade students must comply with all policies, follow all procedures, and meet all requirements by the published deadlines for each semester and/or session.

California Residence Requirement

Can I apply as a California resident?

To attend El Camino College as a resident of California, a student is required to have been a legal resident of the state, as defined in the California Education Code, for more than one year immediately preceding the residence determination date. The residence determination date is the day preceding the first day of the semester or session.

In addition you must meet the two-year intent provisions of California residency code, and must not have engaged in any actions that are contrary to establishing residency in the state of California.

How Do I Apply?

Apply online by visiting www.elcamino.edu and clicking on **Apply Online** - it's that easy! New and returning students (those with an absence of two consecutive semesters, excluding Summer and Winter Session) must complete an application. Don't forget to submit official transcripts from all accredited colleges and trade schools attended. If you are applying for Advanced Placement credit, then you must submit your official high school transcripts.

Step 2 | Assessment

How Do I Make Arrangements For Testing?

Before you test, you must first have an El Camino College application on file. A photo I.D. (such as a driver's license) plus your El Camino College I.D. number (the number received at time of application) is required to test

or obtain copies of past test results.

The placement tests for English, English as a Second Language (Part 1), and Math are computerized and given on a drop-in basis—no appointment is necessary. Other tests, such as the Chemistry Placement, English as a Second Language (Part 2), and Math Competency Tests, are given on an appointment-basis only. Please contact the Assessment/Testing Office for further information at 310-660-3405.

All testing is done on Campus at the Assessment/Testing Office, located in Room 217 of the Student Services Center. Testing must be completed before you register for courses. Retesting is limited and may not be done after you have enrolled in any course related to the test.

STEP 3 | Orientation

Welcome to El Camino College! All students are encouraged to participate in orientation and to become familiar with the college and its resources.

Orientation is offered in different locations: online (at www.elcamino.edu - **MyECC**), and in matriculation counseling groups for new students. Special orientation sessions are arranged for high school students through their high schools. Specialized orientations are also arranged for students who participate in the various SSTARs Programs (see student resources page after schedule information for a list of programs), and at our annual El Camino College New Student Welcome Day scheduled, Wednesday, August 26, 2009 at 8:30a.m. in the Marsee Auditorium. This is a great way for students to get to know the campus, learn about academic programs, services and meet new friends.

STEP 4 | Counseling/ Advisement

Counseling services are available to students through scheduled appointments, express or online counseling. Appointments must be made one week in advance through the Counseling Appointment Center. Appointments can be made Monday through Thursday in person or by calling (310) 660-3593 ext. 3458. A student who has selected a major field of study is strongly encouraged to see one of the counselors assigned to that field while undeclared and undecided students may see any counselor.

As part of the matriculation program, counseling services assist students in clarifying career and life goals and in developing an appropriate course of study based on goals, aptitudes and interests.

Express academic counseling (brief questions only) is generally available from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and Fridays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. for students who have questions not requiring transcript review. The express counseling schedule is based on counseling faculty availability and is subject to change. Call (310) 660-3458 for express counseling schedule. For online counseling go to www.elcamino.edu.

STEP 5 | Registration

How do I prepare to register?

- Be sure you meet any prerequisites and corequisites.
- Meet with a counselor to ensure your schedule is in line with your educational goals.

Procedure

Registration appointment information for continuing students will be available beginning **May 1, 2009**. For new and returning students, this information will be available on or after **May 15**.

When Do I Register?

Please go online to www.elcamino.edu, click on **MyECC - Registration Appointment Time**. You may also check by telephone by calling **(310) 516-9339**.

Before you go online or register by telephone, you must confirm your registration date and time.

Students may not register prior to the assigned date and time.

How Do I Register?

Register online at www.elcamino.edu and click on **MyECC**. Login and follow the online instructions. Computers are available for student use in the Library Media Technology Center - Library East Wing Basement.

You may also register through the **Automated Telephone Registration System** at **(310) 516-9339**.

STEP 6 | Pay Fees

All fees should be paid within seven business days from the day a student registers. Pay online! Just go to www.elcamino.edu and click on **MyECC**.

Financial Assistance

All students are encouraged to apply for financial aid by visiting the Financial Aid Office Web site at www.elcamino.edu/student-services/fao. Begin by clicking the Apply Online button and follow the instructions for a New Student (never attended college) or Returning Students (break in enrollment) or Continuing Students (no breaks in enrollment) column. Please review the available resources on the financial aid Web site under the Information Desk, Programs, Services and Free Calculators.

California residents may wish to apply for a Board of Governor's Fee Waiver (BOGW) to pay for their enrollment fees. Students are encouraged to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine eligibility for all federal, state and institutional programs. Some students in certain programs such as CalWORKS, CARE, or EOP&S may also complete the fee waiver application in addition to the FAFSA form. Please see enclosed applications.

Health Services Fee

Students pay \$17 each semester to cover the operation, supervision, programs and services of the Student Health Center.

Until further notice El Camino College Compton Center students will not be charged a health fee at enrollment. If a Compton student comes to the El Camino College cashier window and asks to use the El Camino College Health Center, they will be charged the \$17 fee for the access to those services.

There are exceptions under these conditions:

1. Students receiving financial aid pursuant to Section 72252.1.
2. Low-income students who meet the Board of Governors grant criteria (pursuant to Section 72252) as demonstrated by appropriate support documentation of eligibility; SSI eligibility; or GA eligibility; Veterans Affairs Dependent Fee Waiver Certification; Agency Certification or Income Tax form as they relate to qualifying income levels; or a combination of these and unmet student need as determined by the Financial Aid Office.
3. Students who depend exclusively upon prayer for healing in accordance with the teachings of a bona fide religious sect, denomination or organization.

Students will not be required to pay this fee if they are enrolled only in classes held off campus, only in distance education classes, only in non-credit classes or work site classes. High school students or students enrolled in

contract classes only are also exempt.

Refund: Students who withdraw from all courses prior to the close of the second week of the term will be eligible for a refund of the Health Services Fee. Forms to request a refund may be obtained at the Cashier's Office.

Health services are provided for students 18 years of age or older who pay the mandatory health fee. High school students permitted to attend the college on a concurrent enrollment basis are not eligible for health services.

College students under 18 years of age subject to other admissions criteria must pay the health fee and submit a parental or guardian consent form to receive health services.

Children, including children of students, are not permitted in the Student Health Center.

Refunds of Fees

Students must drop their classes through the online system located in the Activities Center, by phone or by Web, or at the cashier's window according to the following schedule:

Full semester classes must be dropped by Friday, September 11, 2009. Short-term classes starting in the beginning of the semester must be dropped by Friday, September 4, 2009. Mid-term classes must be dropped within 7 calendar days from start of the class.

To receive a refund for a parking permit, you must return your permit to the cashier's window within this same time period. Refund checks will be mailed before the end of the semester.

If your address has changed, please update the change in the Admissions Office promptly.

Non-Resident Refund Policy

To receive a refund of your non-resident tuition, you must drop your classes through the on-line system in the Activities Center or the cashier's window according to the following schedule:

100% refund for classes dropped through Friday, September 4, 2009.

75% refund for classes dropped through Friday, September 11, 2009.

50% refund for classes dropped through Friday, September 18, 2009.

25% refund for classes dropped through Friday, September 25, 2009.

Refund checks will be mailed before the end of the semester.

California Residency

To attend El Camino College as a qualified California resident, you must have established legal residence in the state one year and one day prior to the start of the term. In addition, you must meet the two-year intent provisions of California residency code and must not have engaged in any actions that are contrary to establishing residency in the state of California. The burden of proof to clearly demonstrate both physical presence in California and intent to establish California residence lies with the student in accordance with Education Code Section 68040.

The residence of an unmarried student under the age of 19 is determined by the legal residence of the parents. A married minor determines residency from the date of marriage and must comply with all provisions of residency as cited above. A person may not derive residence from a spouse.

Priority Registration

In compliance with Section 51825 of Title 5, California Administrative Code, priority registration will be implemented in this way:

1. Special registration assistance to students with disabilities as defined by statute for the purpose of providing equalization of education.

2. Students will receive priority registration according to this ranking system and criteria:

- Registration priority will be awarded as follows:

A. First priority: continuing students

B. Second priority: new and readmit students

- For fall and spring semesters, the enrollment of continuing students in accordance with priority system established on the basis of these factors:

A. One point for each unit completed at El Camino College plus one point for each unit in which the student is currently enrolled (midterm) with a maximum of 60- points.

B. Points awarded according to the total units in the current program after the 12th week as follows: 0 to 3

units equals 0 points; 3.5 to 6 units equals 2 points; 6.5 to 9 units equals 4 points; 9.5 units to 15 points equals 6 points and 15.5 plus units equals 10 points.

C. A reward of 15 points to students for maintaining their original unit load from the start of the semester through the 12th week.

D. A reward of 10 points to students with 2.0 or higher cumulative GPA

E. Day and evening programs are used to divide the student body into a day or extended day priority system. One or more day classes constitutes a day program.

3. The early enrollment of students who meet one of these guidelines:

- Instruction program requires time off campus limiting the choice of class periods on campus.
- The instructional activity requires a block of time associated with scheduled classes for such activities as practice, meetings, counseling and off-campus travel.
- First semester F-1 visa students.

Adds and Drops

It is the student's responsibility to process an official withdrawal from class. Failure to do so may result in a letter grade of A through F. A student may drop a class or classes within the refund period and add another class or classes using the fees already paid.

If a student drops after the refund deadline, payment of fees for the classes is forfeited. Any added class will require additional fees.

A student may drop a class before the refund deadline and add a class with no additional fees. If a student drops a class after the refund deadline in order to add the same class at a different time/date/instructor, the student must request a lateral transfer or level transfer from both instructors. All transfers are processed through the Admissions Office.

Attendance

If you enroll in a class and you do not attend the first scheduled meeting of the class, you may be dropped from the roster and your place may be given to a waiting student.

Children in Classrooms

Children are not permitted in classrooms while class is in session. Attendance in class is limited to officially enrolled students and authorized visitors or guests only. In addition, students shall not allow children to be left unattended or unsupervised anywhere on campus. It is the responsibility of each faculty member to inform students of this requirement.

High School Students

By law, El Camino College may restrict K-12 enrollment based on any of the following: age, grade, academic preparation, seat availability or registration priority.

El Camino College will grant college credit for completed coursework. Students should consult their school counselor and/or school district policy on enrolling in college classes to earn high school credits or dual credit.

Students - When you enroll in classes at El Camino College, you are considered a college student and are expected to act accordingly. Please familiarize yourself with El Camino policies, procedures, the college calendar, and your rights as a student by reading the class schedule and purchasing a college catalog from the ECC Bookstore.

Parents - When your child enrolls in classes at El Camino College, you lose some rights afforded you by the K-12 system. As per FERPA (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act) any business you conduct on behalf of your college student must be with the student's written consent. Yes you, the parent, will need a note from your child to access private educational records or to act on their behalf.

Applying to El Camino College does not guarantee a seat in a class. Registration priority is given to continuing students first, followed by new and returning students, and then K-12 students. K-12 students must go through the application process each semester that they are enrolled as a concurrently enrolled student. Note: high school students who have not completed the 10th grade will need to fulfill additional requirements in order to register.

Student Records

Congress has provided in the "Family Education Rights and Privacy Act" that students have certain rights of access to their education records. A copy of the Act is located in the Library. Please contact the Admissions Office for any information regarding your rights under the Act.

Equivalent Courses

Courses completed at other colleges and universities may be used to meet a prerequisite. Some high school courses, as stated in the college catalog, may also be used to meet a prerequisite.

Students who have completed equivalent courses at another college or in high school must have copies of necessary transcripts. Do not delay. Order transcripts and clear prerequisites prior to registration. Clearance for an equivalent course may be obtained in Drop-In Counseling or the appropriate academic division office.

Transcripts

If you plan to attend under veterans or Social Security benefits, receive academic advisement to become matriculated, or need to have coursework at other colleges reviewed for prerequisite clearance, you must request college transcripts from all schools you have attended be sent to the El Camino College Records Office.

If you plan to graduate from El Camino College with a degree or certificate and wish to have course work taken at other colleges considered for graduation, you must request official transcripts to be mailed from the other colleges to the El Camino College Records Office. Hand carried transcripts from the student or any other party will not be accepted.

Your first two El Camino College transcripts are free. Additional transcripts incur a fee as determined by college policy and payable at the time of the transcript request. Transcripts are processed on a first in, first out basis.

Cross Enrollment at CSU Dominguez Hills

El Camino College students who are eligible may cross-enroll at CSU Dominguez Hills without formal admission and without payment of state university tuition, in a maximum of one baccalaureate-level course per semester on a space-available basis. Such enrollment would be at the discretion of the appropriate campus authorities on each of the campuses.

A student must meet the requirements of cross enrollment to be eligible.

Additional information on requirements and procedures may be obtained at the El Camino College Admissions Office or Counseling Center.

Cheating or Plagiarism

Cheating violates Section I.B.1 of El Camino College's Board Policy 5138, Standards of Student Conduct.

The El Camino College faculty, staff and administrators are dedicated to maintaining an optimal learning environment and will not tolerate academic dishonesty. To uphold the academic integrity of the institution, all members of the academic community, faculty and students alike, must assume responsibility for providing an educational environment of the highest standards characterized by a spirit of academic honesty. The following statement is part of Board Policy 5138, Standards of Conduct: "Dishonesty, including but not limited to cheating, plagiarism or knowingly furnishing false information to the college." When there is evidence of cheating or plagiarism in classroom work, students may receive an F for that piece of work or may be suspended from all classes for that term and the following term if deemed appropriate.

Examples of cheating or plagiarism are:

- Representing the words, ideas or work of another as one's own in any academic exercise (plagiarism), including the use of commercial term paper companies;
- Copying or allowing another student to copy from one's paper or answer sheet during an examination;

- Allowing another individual to assume one's identity for the purpose of enhancing one's grade in any of the following: testing, field trips or attendance;
- Falsifying or attempting to falsify attendance records and/or grade rosters;
- Changing answers on a previously scored test, assignment or experiment with the intent to defraud;
- Inventing data for the purpose of completing a laboratory experiment or case study analysis with the intent to defraud;
- Giving and/or taking information during an examination by any means such as sign language, hand signals or secret codes;
- Obtaining copies of notes, exams or exam questions by any means other than distribution from the instructor. (This includes copying and removing exam questions from the classroom for any purpose.);
- Using study aids such as calculators, tape recorders or notes that have been specifically prohibited by the instructor.

Responsibility of El Camino College Students

It is the responsibility of each student to conduct him/herself in a manner which encourages learning and promotes honesty; and to act with fairness toward other students in the classroom. This incorporates the notion that students should not seek an unfair advantage over other students when completing an assignment, taking an examination or engaging in any other kind of academic activity.

Consequences for Cheating or Plagiarism

Given alleged violation of the Standards of Conduct, any or all of the following actions may be imposed:

1. The instructor may assign a failing grade to the examination or assignment in which the alleged cheating or plagiarism occurred. This action is based on information that the instructor had.
2. The instructor may dismiss the student from the class or activity for the present and/or following class session(s) as stipulated in BP5138, section II.B.5: Removal by Instructor.

3. The instructor may recommend suspension or expulsion of the student from the college as stipulated in BP5138, Section II.B.6 and 8. This rec-

ommendation must be in accordance with El Camino College's Due Process and Disciplinary Procedures.

4. Complete the Academic Dishonesty Report Form and submit it to your Division Office for distribution.
