CALL TO ORDER

Chair Simon called the College Curriculum Committee (CCC) meeting to order at 2:32 p.m.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

F. Arce updated the committee in regards to funding for the remainder of the school year:

- There may be mid-year cuts
- Must think about the practicality of creating new courses/programs
 - o How to pay for adding courses is a legitimate question

F. Arce urged CCC members to work with their colleagues on these issues.

CHAIR'S REPORT

Chair Simon began by welcoming everyone to the first CCC meeting of the fall semester, then asked everyone in attendance to introduce themselves. Chair Simon reviewed the CCC timeline, included in today's handouts. The assigning of divisions to particular meetings will even out the workload for the semester. The number of courses due for review this fall, indicated on the timeline, is the minimum for the semester. It was also noted that the deadline for changes to the catalog is the end of fall semester.

Chair Simon stated that she would be attending regional training on September 23, offered by the Academic Senate, regarding educational policies. This will include potential changes to policies regarding repeatability. There is one more space available for a CCC member to attend the training, and Chair Simon invited members to take advantage of this opportunity.

The next meeting of the Standard Review Sub-Committee, scheduled for September 20, is to be a face-to-face meeting, as it consists of reviewing high school articulation proposals.

We must adhere to repeatability regulations. Chair Simon and Q. Chapman will be offering additional trainings, based on information they received from recent workshops given by the Curriculum Institute.

COURSE REVIEW; CHANGE IN CATALOG DESCRIPTION

1. Chinese 1 – Elementary Chinese I Current Status/Proposed Change

This beginning course introduces and develops students' skills for language acquisition in, taught within the context of Chinese culture, introduces students to listening, speaking, reading, and writing elementary Mandarin Chinese. Students also are introduced to the cultural background of the language. Technological support and tutorial services enhance the course. develop pronunciation and speaking skills along with their understanding of spoken Chinese. Audio and video tapes are available to reinforce the language skills students acquire in the classroom.

NOTE: This course is comparable to two years of high school Chinese.

Recommendation

This course introduces and develops students' skills for language acquisition in listening, speaking, reading, and writing Mandarin Chinese. Students also are introduced to the cultural background of the language. Technological support and tutorial services enhance the course.

Note: This course is comparable to two years of high school Chinese.

2. English as a Second Language 51C – Advanced Listening, Speaking, and Pronunciation

Current Status/Proposed Change

This course provides advanced instruction in listening and speaking skills, emphasizing oral communication, pronunciation, and idiomatic expressions in a multi-cultural academic setting. Students practice listening to and taking notes on authentic lectures from across the curriculum such as history, business, and science, and other listening material. Students present research-based speeches and participate in group discussions, debates, and panel presentations other group activities.

Recommendation

This course provides instruction in listening and speaking, emphasizing oral communication, pronunciation, and idiomatic expressions in a multi-cultural academic setting. Students practice listening to and taking notes on lectures from across the curriculum such as history, business, and science, and other listening material. Students present research-based speeches and participate in group discussions and panel presentations.
