CURRICULUM REVIEW

Industry and Technology Proposals

- S. Rodriguez, Dean of Industry and Technology, presented a proposal for Certificate of Achievement for Administration of Justice: Forensics, and inquired if there were any questions or concerns from the committee. S. Rodriguez fielded a question regarding 4.0 Catalog Program Description. Since there were no changes to the catalog description, 4.0 would remain the same. BEHAVIORAL AND SOCIAL SCIENCES DIVISION

COURSE REVIEW; CHANGE IN CATALOG DESCRIPTION

1. History 184 – Introduction to African History, 1885 to the Present *Current Status/Proposed Change*

This course is a surveys of the political, economic, and social and cultural development of Africa from 1885 to the present. Special emphasis will be given to Topics include colonial conquest and African resistance to European rule, influence of Christian missionaries and Islam in Africa, the striving for independence and the process of decolonization, and the struggle against apartheid in South Africa challenges of modern state building.

2. Political Science 5 – Ethnicity in the American Political Process *Current Status/Proposed Change*

The relationship of racial and ethnic groups in American society to local, state, and national government will be examined. Emphasis will be is placed on problems of assimilation and integration into the American political system.

3. Political Science 6 – Civil Rights and Liberties in the United States *Current Status/Proposed Change*

Emphasis will be placed on First Amendment protections, freedom of speech, religion and press, rights of the defendant, and problems equal protection issues of minority groups facing discrimination.
