CURRICULUM REVIEW – Full Course Review Proposals

Industry and Technology Division

M. Fields presented an overview of Administrative of Justice 100, 103, 111, and 115. Chair Lipe will remove the word "eligibility" in the conditions of enrollment section for Administration of Justice 100 and 103. The committee recommended the following changes to the course outline of records:

Administration of Justice 100 – Introduction to Administration of Justice

• Provide a justification statement for English A in the Course Summary checklist.

Administration of Justice 103 – Concepts of Criminal Law I

- Provide a justification statement for English A in the Course Summary checklist.
- Verify recommended preparation, entrance skills, and matching course objectives.
- Edit the "recommended skills" section in the Conditions of Enrollment checklist. The MLA related objective of English A with recommended skill "Ability to apply strategies in the writing process…" seems to be a mismatch.

<u>Administration of Justice 111 – Criminal Investigation</u>

• Provide a justification statement for English A in the Course Summary checklist.

- Increase estimated independent study hours from 2 to 6 in the Work Outside of Class checklist.
- Verify recommended preparation, entrance skills, and matching course objectives in the Entry Skills checklist.

Administration of Justice 115 – Community and Human Relations

- Provide a justification statement for English A in the Course Summary checklist.
- Increase estimated independent study hours from 4 to 6 in the Work Outside of Class checklist.
- Verify recommended preparation, entrance skills, and matching course objectives in the Entry Skills checklist.

Chair Lipe called a motion to approve the proposed changes to Administration of Justice 100, 103, 111, and 115, including the conditions of enrollment proposals and all amended recommendations made by the committee. W. Brownlee moved, V. Nemie seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

In addition, a motion was made to approve the proposed new distance education courses for Administration of Justice 111 and 115. L. Kjeseth moved, D. Pahl seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

<u>Environmental Technology 102 – Sustainable Energy and Renewable Building Sciences and</u> Technologies

S. Rodriguez concurred with A. Cornelio's recommendation to replace the textbook with the newer 3rd edition, <u>Renewable Energy: Power for a Sustainable Future</u>, by Oxford University Press.

<u>Environmental Technology 103 – Environmental Technology Materials and Methodologies</u> The recommendations made by the committee were addressed during the voting process in CurricUNET, and the course outline of record was updated.

Nutrition and Foods 15 – Nutrition for Infants and Young Children

- A recommendation was made to insert the word "the" between "during" and "growth" in the first sentence of the catalog description "....nutritional needs during the growth and development of infants....."
- Faculty is advised to consider replacing the industry standard textbook with a newer version during the next course review.

Chair Lipe called a motion to approve the course proposals for Environmental Technology 102, 103, and Nutrition and Foods 15, including the conditions of enrollment changes and recommendations made by the committee. L. Kjeseth moved, W. Brownlee seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Fine Arts Division

Art 205B – History of Asian Art - China, Korea, and Japan

Chair Lipe introduced A. Ahmadpour from the Art Department. It was recommended the department check the C-ID descriptor for Asian Art to ensure the course covers content in 205A and 205B.

Art 207 – Art History of Mexico and Central and South America

- With conditions of enrollment change, English B = primary focus on paragraph structure and students can write short essays. Assignments ask for 1-2 page papers. During next course review, assess if this advisory level is appropriate.

Business 17 – Personal Finance

- In the Evaluation Methods and Assignments checklist, remove the word "analyze" in the Typical Assignment section "Using the expenses you tracked for the last 3 weeks, write a one-page paper analyzing <u>analyze</u> how your actual expenses compare to the budget you developed."
- Writing skills are matched to English B but students are asked to write 1-2 page analysis papers.
- In the Objectives checklist consider replacing the sentence "Student will learn" with the following: 1) Discuss the use of money as a tool.... 2) Explain the purpose and use of 3) Identify loan and insurance options...

Business 21 – Human Resources Management

There were no issues requiring discussion at the time of the meeting.

<u>Business 24 – Small Business Entrepreneurship</u>

• Replace the slash in the second sentence of the catalog description "... manage a small business/organization" with "manage a small business or small organization."

COURSE REVIEW; DISTANCE EDUCATION UPDATE; CHANGES IN CATALOG DESCRIPTION, CONDITIONS OF ENROLLMENT (Pre/Corequisite, Recommended Preparation, or Enrollment Limitation)

Business 12 – Advertising
 Current Status/Proposed Changes
 Recommended Preparation: eligibility for English 84 and eligibility for English A

In this course students will study the field of advertising and promotion from a marketing perspective. how to create effective and compelling advertising campaigns through print, broadcast, and electronic media. Topics to be covered include the practice and management of advertising by agencies, clients branding, message creation, and the media placement. Also emphasized are the concepts of ethics, social responsibility, and consumer benefits. Effective techniques in the preparation of different types of advertisements will be analyzed and applied.

Recommendation

Recommended Preparation: eligibility for English 84 and eligibility for English A

In this course students will study how to create effective and compelling advertising campaigns through print, broadcast, and electronic media. Topics to be covered include branding, message creation, and media placement. Also emphasized are the concepts of ethics, social responsibility, and consumer benefits.

Effective management of common issues in human resources from the perspective of the employee and employer are discussed.

Areas of concentration include the principles of developing new products product development, acquiring financing, drafting a business plan, advertising, taxation, accounting, and legal forms of organizations, e-commerce in a global environment and strategic planning.

Business 24 – Small Business Entrepreneurship

Recommended Preparation: eligibility for English 84 and eligibility for English A

This course provides students with the ability to identify opportunities and develop them into viable small businesses or non-profit organizations. Students will focus on building the entrepreneurial skills needed to initiate and manage a small business or small organization. Areas of concentration include product development, acquiring financing, drafting a business plan, advertising, accounting, legal forms of organizations, and strategic planning.

Students are will see how the aesthetic of newness, originality, anti-academicism, and radical formal invention characteristic of avant-garde modernism was rooted in the deep-seated societal changes and values that defined modernity. Students will be introduced to fundamental methods of analysis that will assist them in understanding art and aesthetic human activities.

Students will receive instruction and preparation for current event debates and Limited Preparation Parliamentary Debate. Students will compete in intercollegiate forensics competitions.

The basics of commercial, portraiture, still life and fine art photography are covered. Intermediate photographic lighting and black and white printing <u>skills</u> techniques are introduced.

This course emphasizes film and digital photography as a creative and commercial art. The basics of commercial, portraiture, still life and fine art photography are covered. Intermediate photographic lighting and black and white printing techniques are introduced.

4. Photography 3 – Advanced Photography *Current Status/Proposed Changes*

This course focuses on photography as a commercial and creative practice. Basic business practices for the photographer, along with fashion, industrial, <u>advertising</u>, and <u>advertising</u>/product <u>digital and film</u> photography—, are covered. Advanced lighting <u>designs</u> and <u>techniques</u>, <u>and</u> printing skills are introduced. The production of <u>professional</u> portfolio quality <u>black</u> <u>digital</u> and <u>white</u> <u>film</u> photographic prints <u>and color transparencies</u> is emphasized.

Recommendation

This course focuses on photography as a commercial and creative practice. Basic business practices for the photographer, along with fashion, industrial, advertising, and product digital and film photography are covered.
