Language and Literature

California Language Archive <u>http://cla.berkeley.edu</u>

A collaboration of two U.C. Berkeley archives, this site offers a catalog and an online archive mainly of the indigenous languages of California, but includes Native languages from North and South America. The materials include digital images of linguistic texts, hand-written field notes, and rare audio recordings.

Children's Picture Book Database at Miami University, by Valerie Ubbes. <u>http://dlp.lib.miamioh.edu/picturebook/</u>

Access is provided to over 5,000 children's picture books that can be used to design literature-based lessons in all subjects for K-12 students. The database provides brief abstracts and associated keywords for each title to support systematic searching.

A multimedia site, it introduces drama, novels, and epic poetry from various cultures and times. The emphasis is on 13 important literary works including *The Odyssey, Bhagavad Gita, Tale of Genji, and One Hundred Years of Solitude.*

Language courses developed by the FSI of the US government are in the public domain and freely available through this web site. Printed textbooks, digitized audiotapes, podcasts of conversations are also offered here. In some cases, users can choose from various dialects.

Produced by the Research Department of the national trade association for Broadway, this is a comprehensive database of Broadway shows. It includes "title page" information for all productions, historical theater information, and a variety of related statistics. There is a search function for shows, people, theaters, characters, awards, and songs.
