Transfer Requirements

The following requirements for the major are subject to change without notice. To assure the accuracy of the information on this sheet, you should consult with a child development counselor or review articulation agreements via the Internet at www.assist.org. You may also consult the Articulation Officer for specific articulation agreements.

A child development major builds on an interdisciplinary foundation which enables students to develop an understanding of the social, psychological, and intellectual growth of young children within the context of family and culture. Child development specialists work in community agencies, preschools, hospitals, children's centers, extended day care centers, and Head Start programs. Career opportunities are also available in special education, child advocacy, family support, educational television, parent education, and other programs serving children and their families. Note: Students who wish to teach in preschools should also refer to the CHILDHOOD EDUCATION guide sheet, and students who wish to teach in elementary school (K-5) should also refer to the LIBERAL STUDIES guide sheets.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, DOMINGUEZ HILLS

Child Development majors take Math 150 and Child Development 103; 107; 114; 108 AND 126 (or one course at CSUDH). Concentrations in Early Teaching and Learning, Counseling and Family Services, Juvenile Delinquency, and Management and Administration. When choosing CSU GE certification courses from the yellow CSU GE certification guide sheet, CSUDH recommends selecting from among the following: English 1A; one from English 1C, Philosophy 8, or Psychology 3; Speech 1; one from Chemistry 4, 20 or 21A, Geology 1 and 3, or Geography 1; one from Anthropology 1 or Biology 10; Humanities 1; one from Art 1, Dance 1, Music 11, or Theatre 8; one from English 42, French 3 or 4, Philosophy 2 or 3, or Spanish 24 or 4; four courses in two different areas from Anthropology 2 or 3, Economics 5, Psychology 5, Sociology 101, Geography 2, History 140 or 141, History 101 and 102, or Political Science 1; one from Contemporary Health 1 or PE 280.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON (2013-14)

Child and Adolescent Development majors take Child Development 103 or Psychology 16 as well as Child Development 150 and 104. Option in Elementary School Settings, also take English 27; Option in Adolescent/Youth Development, also take Psychology 9A; and Option in Family and Community Contexts, also take Anatomy 30 and Psychology 9A.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, LONG BEACH (*Impacted Major*)

Child Development and Family Studies majors take Psychology 5, Anthropology 2; Nutrition and Foods 11; and Child Development 103; 114; and one from Child Development 107, 108 or 115

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, LOS ANGELES (2013-2014)

Child Development majors pursuing the General Option take English 1C, Child Development 103, 104, 107, and 108, and Sociology 102. Specializations are available in Early Childhood, Program Administration, Youth Agency Administration, Parenting, and Child Life/Hospitalized Child.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, NORTHRIDGE

Child and Adolescent Development majors take Child Development 103; Mathematics 150; Psychology 5. Additional requirements for Early Childhood Development Option: Child Development 104 and Contemporary Health 1.

SAN DIEGO STATE UNIVERSITY (*Impacted Major*) – 2013-14

Child Development majors take Biology 10; Child Development 103 and 104; Psychology 5; Sociology 101 and Sociology 102; Psychology 9A or Sociology 109 or Mathematics 150.
