CAREER OPPORTUNITIES:

Dancers dance for the enjoyment of others. They use their bodies in dance movements to create an art form that can interpret an idea or a story, or be purely physical expressions of rhythm and sound. Dancing alone, with a partner, or in a group, the Dancer entertains an audience in classical, modern, or acrobatic dances. Body movements are coordinated to musical accompaniment, either developed by someone else, called a choreographer, or by the individual Dancer. Dancers may also sing and provide other entertainment. Dancing is often used to supplement other types of entertainment, such as opera, musical comedy, and television. Dancers often combine performing with teaching or turn to teaching after their careers as professional Dancers are over. Some Dancers combine their skills with knowledge of health care and work as Health Therapists (Dance Therapists), or may work to rehabilitate patients.

The World Arts and Cultures/Dance department is at forefront of innovative, interdisciplinary, and cross cultural studies of the arts, offering a curriculum in which students can explore the vital relationship of the arts and performance to cultural theory and criticism. The dance concentration, with the distinctly WAC approach to dance, shifting standard models for teaching of this art form at a university, brings together the possibilities of cross-cultural and contextual studies, civic engagement, and the study of Los Angeles as a laboratory for the study of the world.

Preparation for the major: Major preparatory coursework should be completed at UCLA, however, dance courses are encouraged to improve techniques and preparation for the audition. Exemptions/substitutions from lower division requirements will be determined after admission.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, LOS ANGELES (CONTINUED)

Audition/interview & supplemental requirements: Successful applicants must have strong academic preparation and show evidence of involvement in the arts and community that demonstrates interests in varied cultures. All students are required to submit a supplemental application by digital upload, for which an additional fee is required. Letters of recommendation are also requested. Applicants to Dance will be asked to audition. All students must have a minimum 3.0 gpa at the time of application. Specific guidelines may be found at www.arts.ucla.edu/prospective-students.
