



LIBERAL STUDIES MAJOR – TRANSFER REQUIREMENTS

The following requirements are subject to change without notice. To ensure that this information is current, you should consult with a Liberal Studies counselor or review articulation agreements via the Internet at www.assist.org.

The Liberal Studies major is primarily designed for prospective elementary and special education teachers who intend to earn a Multiple Subject (K – 8) and/or Education Specialist Instruction credential. All such students should complete the coursework specified below for their intended transfer university.

Important Notes:

1. All courses on this guide sheet must be completed with a grade of C or higher.
2. In general, credential programs require that students achieve a GPA ranging from 2.5 – 2.67 prior to admission into their programs.
3. It is strongly recommended that students take the CBEST (California Basic Educational Skills Test) and complete their character clearance prior to transfer.
4. Some CSU programs may require CSU GE certification and/or the completion of a 12-15 unit concentration which can be started at the community college level. Please see a counselor or visit www.assist.org for details.
5. Students may choose between an integrated or a traditional program. The former allows them to complete a bachelor's degree and credential simultaneously, and the latter requires them to complete their bachelor's degree prior to entering a teaching credential program.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITIES

California State University, Dominguez Hills

California State University, Dominguez Hills offers prospective elementary school and special education teachers two alternatives for obtaining a Liberal Studies degree: the traditional program and the integrated program. Students applying to the **Integrated Option** must have passed all three sections of the CBEST, achieved a GPA of 2.67, completed lower division General Education and Liberal Studies coursework, and be granted clearance by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing. **The Early Teaching and Learning Option (ETLO)** is designed to prepare students to teach children from birth to age five in diverse inclusive early childhood education and preschool settings. Participants in this option complete the undergraduate Liberal Studies degree with an emphasis in early language development, culture, literacy, early mathematical reasoning, and exceptional children. California State University, Fullerton

California State University, Northridge

CSUN presently offers two undergraduate teacher preparation programs for transfer students who plan on becoming elementary or special education teachers: the Pre-Credential Option and the Integrated Teacher Education Program (ITEP) Junior Option. The Pre-Credential Program allows students to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree in Liberal Studies *only* and is best suited for individuals who wish to enroll in a teaching credential program after they earn their BA degree.

The Integrated Teacher Education Program is designed for students who wish to earn their Bachelor of Arts degree and their credential simultaneously. All students begin in the Pre-Credential Program but may join ITEP in their junior year. San Diego State University

San Diego State University currently offers two routes to obtaining the Multiple Subject Teaching Credential: (1) the traditional pathway where students earn a bachelor's degree in Applied Arts and Sciences and then enter the teaching credential program; and (2) the integrated pathway where students earn the bachelor's degree and the teaching credential concurrently. At the time of admission, all students will be placed in the "pre-traditional major." Thereafter, they may choose to pursue the integrated or traditional pathway. (Note: CSU GE certification is included within the major, so students should not follow the California State University General Education Certification or IGETC plan). **For more information, please visit their Website at www.edweb.sdsu.edu call: 619.594-6544.**

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA SYSTEM

Except for UC Riverside, most University of California teaching credential programs are at the graduate level. Thus, students must first complete a baccalaureate degree and then apply to a UC graduate school, at which point they can earn a Master of Arts degree and complete requirements for the Multiple Subject Teaching Credential. Graduate school admission requirements typically include passage of the California Basic Educational Skills Test (CBEST), demonstration of subject matter competence by passing the California Subject Exam for Teachers (CSET) Multiple Subject Exam, and a GPA of 3.0 or higher. Some programs also require that applicants take the GRE (Graduate Record Examination). With regard to coursework, students should choose their electives wisely to increase their knowledge of the areas included in the California Content Standards (e.g., math, language arts, social studies, humanities/fine arts, science, and social studies). Recommended majors: any.

PRIVATE UNIVERSITIES

Antioch University

Antioch University's Master of Arts degree in Education and Teaching Credential Program (MAE/TC) is offered at both the Los Angeles and Santa Barbara campuses and is accredited by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC). Transfer students may apply to the university's traditional graduate level program after they earn their bachelor's degree, but they also have the option of participating in the Early Decider Program for Teacher Preparation. By so doing, they may apply to and enroll in Antioch's graduate level teacher education program while completing their Bachelor of Arts degree and then apply their teacher education course credit toward their BA degree, thereby saving themselves two quarters of time and tuition. (Note: Prospective students should be advised that both the traditional graduate level and Early Decider programs are highly interactive programs based on a philosophy of activism and social justice). Azusa Pacific University

Azusa Pacific University offers a California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC) approved Multiple Subject Credential Program at the undergraduate level. As noted above, prospective transfer students should complete their lower division general education and major requirements prior to transfer. Applications for admission to the Teacher Education Program may be submitted as early as the junior or senior year as long as 60 units of university coursework have been completed and students have attended a mandatory information meeting. Candidates then begin a sequence of professional education courses in preparation for full-time student teaching. Loyola Marymount University

Loyola Marymount University offers a California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC) approved subject matter preparation program in Liberal Studies. The Liberal Studies program is designed for undergraduate students interested in pursuing a bachelor's degree and a Multiple Subject Teaching Credential simultaneously. Working collaboratively with the School of Education's Teacher Preparation Program, the Liberal Studies program seeks to provide a multi-disciplinary undergraduate education while preparing

students for the California Subject Examination for Teachers (CSET) and other credentialing requirements. Students interested in transferring to LMU as Liberal Studies majors should complete the coursework indicated below. Potential transfer students may also complete up to nine units of transferable coursework for particular areas of concentration. Liberal Studies students generally apply to the School of Education in their second year of Liberal Studies program coursework after completing the prerequisite education courses. School of Education admission criteria include an overall GPA of 2.8 and passage of the California Basic Educational Skills Test (CBEST). In addition, program applicants must submit documentation of at least 20 hours of experience working with culturally and linguistically diverse youth groups between the ages of 4 and 13 years. Mount St. Mary's College

Mount St. Mary's College offers a concurrent program of teacher preparation. Students take courses toward their bachelor's degree (in Liberal Studies) and courses in education simultaneously. The Mount St. Mary's College Elementary Teacher Preparation Program is a California Commission on Teacher Credentialing-approved program for the preparation of students who intend to earn the Preliminary Multiple Subject Teaching Credential as defined by SB 2042. Prospective transfer students should major in Liberal Studies and complete the courses listed below. However, it is not required that transfer students complete the whole list of courses. Courses not completed at El Camino may be taken at MSMC. Transfer students are also encouraged to obtain a passing score on the California Basic Educational Skills Test (CBEST) and to take the California Subject Exam for Teachers (CSET) since passing scores on all three sections of the CSET must be attained prior to student teaching. Because a Liberal Studies portfolio documenting the study of the subject areas designated below is required for the major, students considering transferring to Mount St. Mary's College are likewise encouraged to retain copies of course syllabi and course assignments. National University

National University offers a California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC) approved Bachelor of Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies with a California Preliminary Multiple Subjects Teaching Credential. The Interdisciplinary Studies major with the Preliminary Multiple Subject credential program is designed for undergraduate students interested in pursuing a bachelor's degree and a Multiple Subject Teaching Credential simultaneously. The Bachelor of Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies and a Preliminary Multiple Subjects Teaching Credential (California) provides a broad, rigorous education that prepares candidates for a career as a teacher at the elementary level. The program introduces candidates to essential knowledge, connections across the disciplines, and applies knowledge of life beyond the University. This degree program gives candidates an enriched and thought-provoking curriculum that incorporates content across subject areas and with specific educational methodology courses. This program prepares candidates for professional work as multiple subject teachers in a changing cultural and economic environment.

National University admissions criteria will include the need of an overall GPA of 2.0. In addition, program applicants must submit an application to National University with official transcripts. Transfer students are encouraged to complete the courses listed below however these courses are not required for admission to the university. The CBEST is not required prior to admission into the program. However once all major coursework is completed both the CBEST and CSET are required before enrollment into the full-time student teaching component. Pacific Oaks College

Pacific Oaks College offers a California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC)-approved Multiple Subject English Learner (MSEL) Teaching Credential Program and a Preliminary Level I and Professional Level II Education Specialist Credential in mild to moderate disabilities, both of which students may complete while working toward their bachelor's or master's degrees. Non-course requirements for the degree include: Passage of the California Basic Educational Skills Test (CBEST), US Constitution competency, a Certificate of Clearance, basic technology competency, passage of the California Subject Exam for Teachers (CSET), and passage of the Reading Instruction Competence Assessment (RICA). Applicants for the bachelor's degree must have completed a minimum of 70 semester units of transferable coursework with a grade of "C" or better in the content areas specified below.
