


## El Camino College Financial Aid Office Return to Title IV Funds (R2T4)

Federal student aid is awarded to a student with the understanding that the student will attend college for the entire semester or term for which they received aid. When a student completely withdraws, the student may no longer be eligible for the full amount of federal student aid that the student was originally scheduled to receive.

At El Camino College, please contact the Financial Aid Office <u>immediately</u> if you have completely dropped <u>all</u> classes or registered for classes but <u>never showed up</u> on the first day of class. Please refer to the chart below for instructions:





## What happens if I drop all classes and keep the Pell Grant?

Based on the day of your withdrawal the Financial Aid Office will calculate how much of your Pell Grant you "earned" from the beginning of the semester/term until the day you dropped all classes. If you received more Pell Grant funds than what you were entitled to, the Financial Aid Office will send you an overpayment letter to your mailing address on-file with the El Camino College Admissions & Records Office.

You have 30 days from the date of the overpayment letter to pay the overpayment in full to El Camino College.

If you do not pay the overpayment within 30 days, the El Camino College Financial Aid Office will report your overpayment to the National Student Loan Database Systems (NSLDS) and **you will not** be eligible to receive federal student aid at El Camino College or any other college or university.

Students who owe funds to El Camino College will not be able to register for subsequent terms and will not be able to request an official transcript.
