


El Camino Financial Aid Office Return to Title IV Funds (R2T4)

Federal student aid is awarded to student with the understanding that student will attend college for entire semester or term for which they are received aid. When student is completely withdrawn, student(s) may no longer be eligible for the full amount of federal student aid that student was originally scheduled to receive.

At El Camino College, please contact the Financial Aid Office <u>immediately</u> if you have completely dropped <u>ALL</u> classes or registered for classes but <u>NEVER SHOW UP</u> and dropped by teacher as <u>NO SHOW</u> on the first day of class for each semester. Please refer to the chart below for instructions:

Received a Pell Grant but dropped all classes prior to the 60% mark of each semester/term or registered for classes but never show up or stopped attending?



Return Pell Grant check immediately to the Financial Aid Office

What happens if I drop all classes and keep the Pell Grant Check?

Based on the day of your withdrawal the Financial Aid Office will calculate how much of Pell grant you have "earned" from the beginning of the semester/term until the day you dropped out completely. If you received more grant funds than what you were entitled to, the Financial Aid Office will send you an overpayment letter to your mailing address with Admissions & Records Office

You have 30 days from the date of the overpayment letter to repay El Camino overpayment in full. If you do not pay the overpayment after 30days, the El Camino Financial Aid office will report your overpayment to the National Student Loan Database System (NSLDS) and **you will not** be able to receive federal student aid at El Camino College or any other colleges, universities.

Students who owe funds to El Camino College will not be able to register for subsequent terms and will not be to request an official transcript.
