





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INTRODUCTION

The El Camino College (ECC) Annual Factbook is a reference source containing trend data about students, student outcomes, and instructional programs and services. The data in the factbook provides background information to facilitate policy analysis and decision making. It is a useful tool in college and departmental planning, grant preparation, and in the accreditation process. It is our hope that the information provided is used to objectively evaluate programs and practices as well as visualize the trends that affect El Camino College's current and future operations.

The Annual Factbook presents tables and graphs that contain enrollment trends for the last five academic years. Pie charts represent enrollment for the most recent academic year. Information has been disaggregated by age, gender and ethnicity where appropriate.

Data Sources

Demographic and enrollment data on ECC students was provided by the Chancellor's Office. Some of the data in the Special Programs section was extracted from the college's student database. In addition, data from the National Student Clearinghouse was used to provide transfer destination information. The National Student Clearinghouse is a national, non-profit organization that offers access to enrollment and degree records.


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




Age

When looking at unduplicated student enrollment, in the last five years 69% of enrolled students were less than 25 years of age. Working adults ages 25-44 comprised 25% of enrolled students, while 5% of students were ages 45 and older. From 2017-2018 to 2018-2019, there was a 7% increase in enrolled students ages 19 or younger. Additionally, enrollment among students ages 25-34 and 35-44 both decreased by 4% from 2017-2018 to 2018-2019.






Ethnicity

Latinos represent the largest ethnic group on campus, comprising 52% of the student population. This student population experienced a 13% increase enrollment in the past five years. Other ethnic groups' enrollment have remained stable, with the exception of African-American students, whose representation has declined by 3% in five years.







Gender

Overall, 10% more women than men have attended ECC in the last five years. The greatest difference was found in 2018-2019 when 11% more women than men attended ECC. The gender gap was smaller in 2014-2015 when 8% more women than men attended ECC.



Gender by Age



In 2018-2019, 59% of African-American students were female, while 54% of Latino students were female. Over half of Asian and White students were male.






Residency

In 2018-2019, 47% of students enrolled at El Camino College lived within the El Camino Community College District (ECCCD). Thirty-two percent of students resided within 7.5 miles of the college, while 21% lived beyond a 7.5-mile radius of El Camino College. The number of students enrolled who live within the District increased by 14% in the last year.





CalWORKs

CalWORKs is the community portion of the California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids Act. CalWORKs funds assist single parents who are receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), and those transitioning off welfare. This program helps students achieve long-term self-sufficiency through coordinated student services. Approximately 1% of the student population participated in CalWORKs in 2018-19. In the last five years, the number of CalWORKs participants has steadily decreased. This is a reflection of a decrease in CalWORKs participation statewide.



Disabled Student Programs & Services

About 5% of ECC students have a registered disability. The most common disability is learning disabilities followed by psychological disabilities. In 2016-17, students with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and autism spectrum were reported for the first time. In 2018-19, 9% of ECC students with a registered disability had ADHD, while 14% were on the autism spectrum.






Extended Opportunity Programs & Services

Extended Opportunity Program and Services (EOPS) is designed to assist low-income and educationally disadvantaged students achieve their educational goals at El Camino College. It provides eligible students with support services in the areas of counseling, peer support, financial assistance, transferring and tutorial services. Approximately 5% of ECC students were in EOPS and CARE, a single parent support program for EOPS. In 2018-19, the number of students who participated in EOPS and CARE increased by 2% from the previous year.







Student Athletes - Males



Award Type

Sixty-three percent of all El Camino College students received financial aid in 2018-19, an 11% increase from the previous year. The largest financial aid program is the California College Promise Grant with 58% of all ECC students receiving the award. In 2018-19, there was an 8% increase in California College Promise recipients from the previous year.






Successful Course Completion Rate

The successful course completion rate is the percentage of students who receive an A, B, C, or Pass as a final course grade out of all students enrolled as of the census date.

ECC has an ACCJC Institution-Set Standard of 65% and an Institutional Effectiveness (I.E) Outcome goal of 74% by the year 2019-2020.

Course Completion Rate

The course completion rate is the percentage of students who remain enrolled through the end of a course out of all students enrolled on census date. It is the percentage of students who did not drop late or withdraw.

ECC does not have an ACCJC Institution-Set Standard or Institutional Effectiveness Outcome goal for course completion rate.

Course Completion Rates by Course Type

The successful course completion rate for transfer level courses averages 73%, slightly higher than the overall and basic skills courses. The average course completion rate for transfer-level courses (84%) is also slightly higher than the course completion rate for basic skills courses.

The average successful course completion rate for credit/degree-applicable courses is the lowest, and the average course completion rate is the second lowest in comparison to the basic skills, transfer or career and technical education courses.

The average successful and overall course completion rates for Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses are higher in comparison to basic skills, transfer and credit/degree-applicable courses.



Course Completion Rates by Ethnicity

Successful course completion rates for African-American students have gradually increased over the last five years. In 2018-19, African-American students had a rate of 63%, an increase of 6% from 2014-15. Latino students' successful course completion rate was 69%, while both White and Asian students had a rate of 81%.


Successful course completion and course completion rates for female and male students have gradually increased over the last five years. 

Retention

Student retention refers to the tracking of student enrollment over several terms. Retention rates are based on five fall cohorts over four semesters, looking only at fall and spring enrollment. For the overall fall cohorts, retention to second, third and fourth semesters have remained relatively unchanged over the last five years.

Student Retention Over Four Semesters Fall 2014 to Fall 2018



Retention - First-Time Students

The fall 2018 first-time, full-time cohort second semester retention rate decreased 2% compared to the previous year's cohort. First-time, full-time cohorts typically have a higher retention rate than overall fall cohorts.

First-Time, Full-Time Student Retention over Four Semesters Fall 2014 to Fall 2018






Degrees & Certificates

In 2018-19, 4,282 degrees and 1,634 certificates were awarded at El Camino College. The number of Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) increased by 30% from the previous year. The number of certificates awarded in 2018-19 increased by over 120% from the previous year. This is due to an increase in CSU and IGETC* certificates that were awarded in 2018-19.







Transfer Destinations

In 2018-19, 2,588 El Camino College students transferred to a four-year university. The top California State University (CSU) destinations were Dominguez Hills and Long Beach with 483 and 412 transfers, respectively. The top University of California (UC) transfer destinations for ECC students were UCLA and UC Irvine. In 2018-19, 671 ECC students transferred to either a private or out-of-state university.








Workforce Distribution

Fall 2018

In fall 2018, the El Camino workforce was made up of over 1,440 employees, a 4% increase over the last five years. Forty-three percent of the workforce was comprised of temporary (part-time) academic instructors, and 23% were academic tenured-track (full-time) instructors. Thirty-one percent of the workforce were classified staff.









In fall 2018, 51% of the El Camino College workforce were ages 35-54. Another 34% were ages 55 and older.






In fall 2018, nearly half of the El Camino College workforce was White. In the last five years, there has been a steady increase in the number of Asians and Latinos employed by the College.





White employees at El Camino College are more likely to be 45 years or older, while Latino employees are more likely to be between the ages of 18 to 34.







In fall 2018, 54% of the El Camino College workforce was female. From fall 2017 to fall 2018, there was an increase in the number of male employees at ECC.



Gender by Age


In fall 2018, the largest gender differences were among ECC employees age 18-34 and age 35-44, with females comprising nearly 60% of these age groups.
