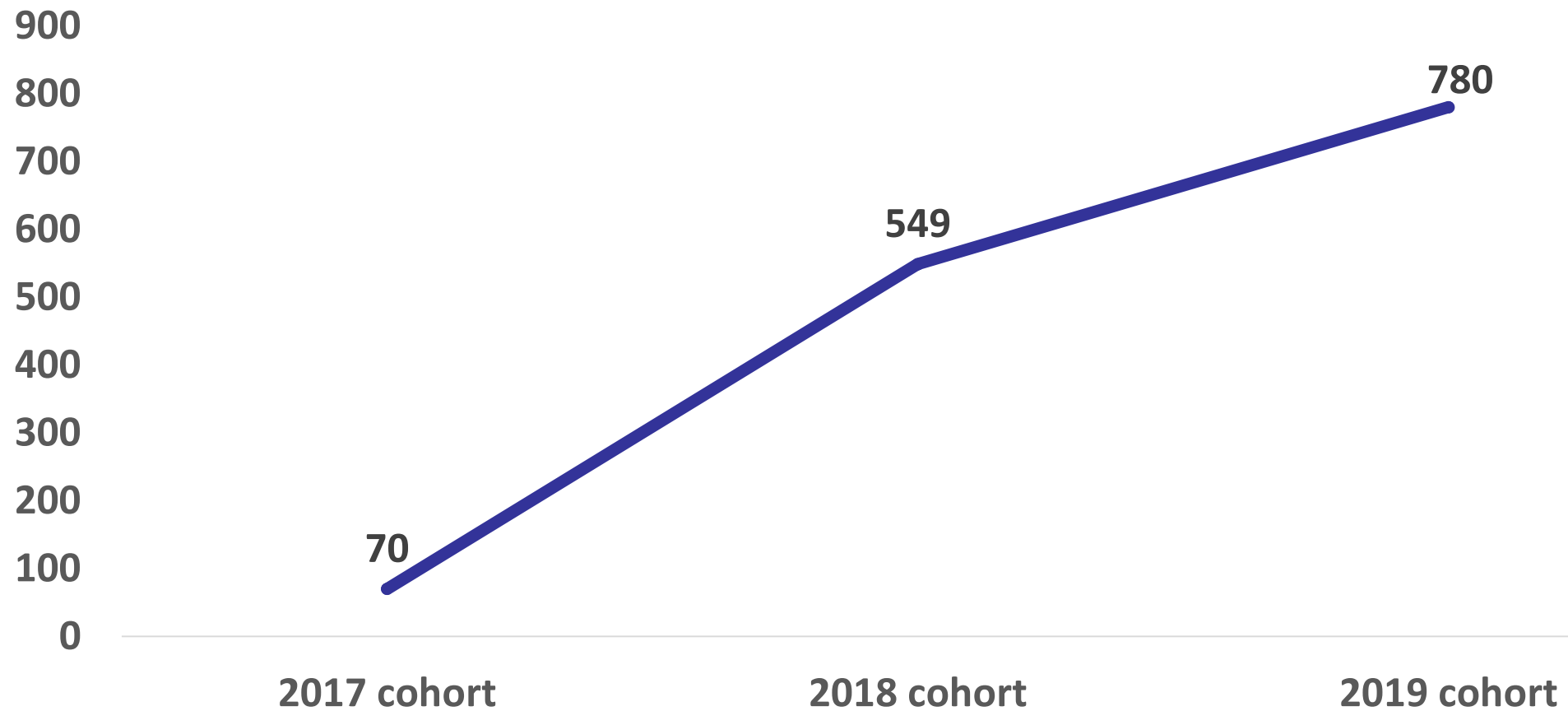
Research Interest

- Present outcomes of African-American students in the South Bay Promise 2019 cohort to see how the Promise relates to African-American students' academic progress.

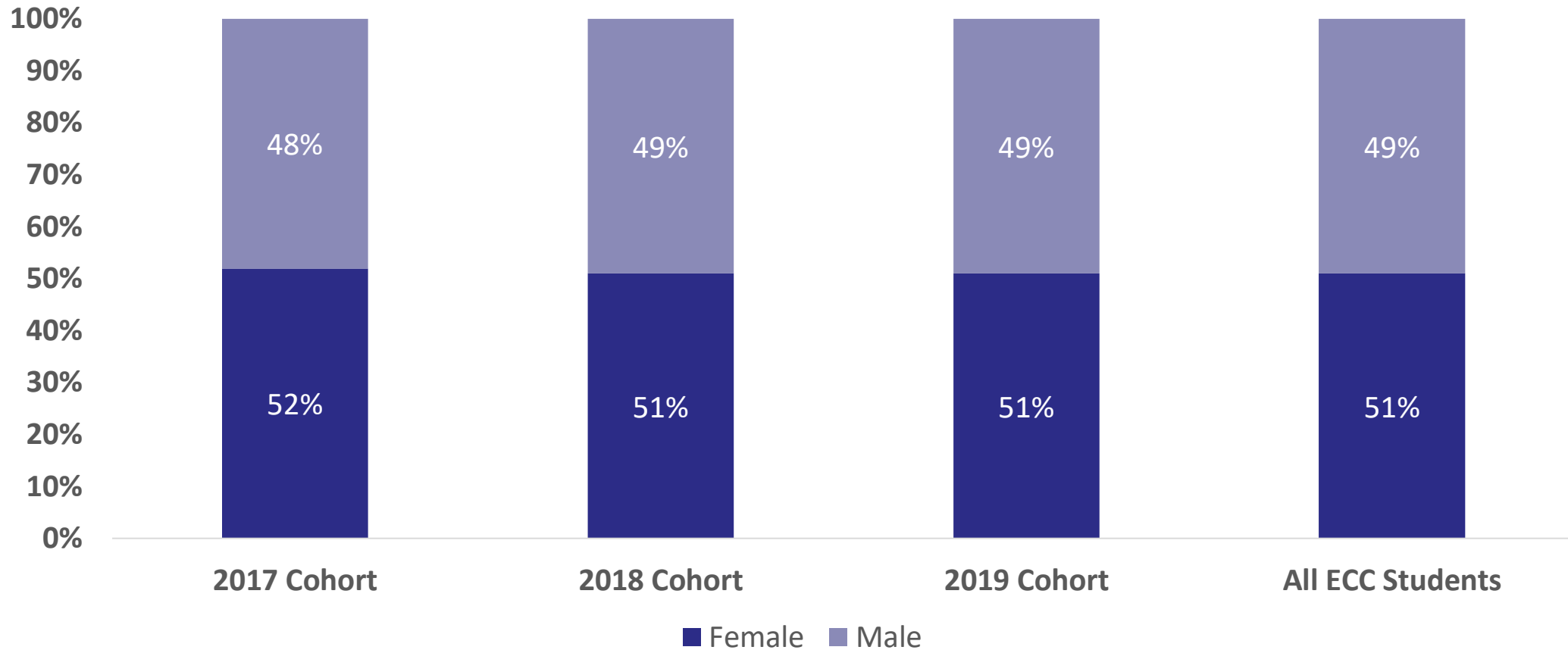

South Bay Promise Participants

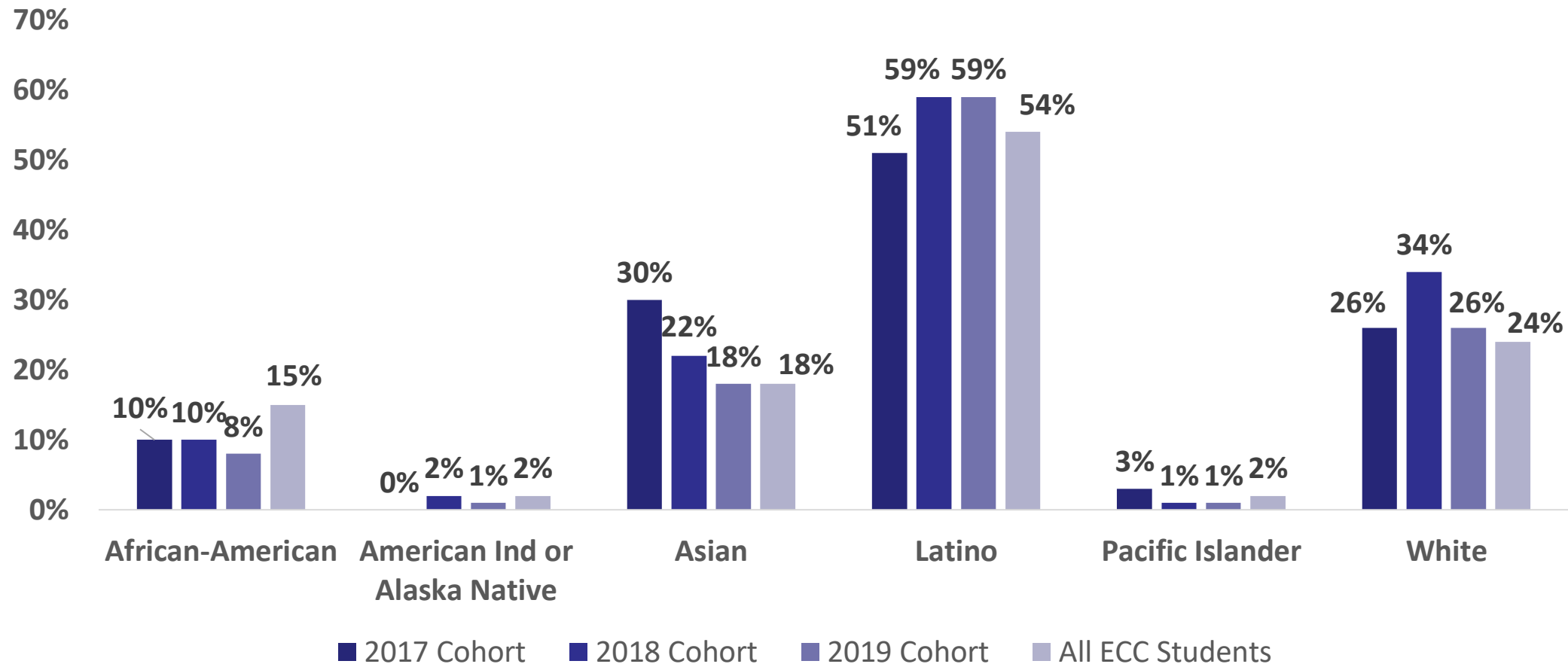


South Bay Promise Gender

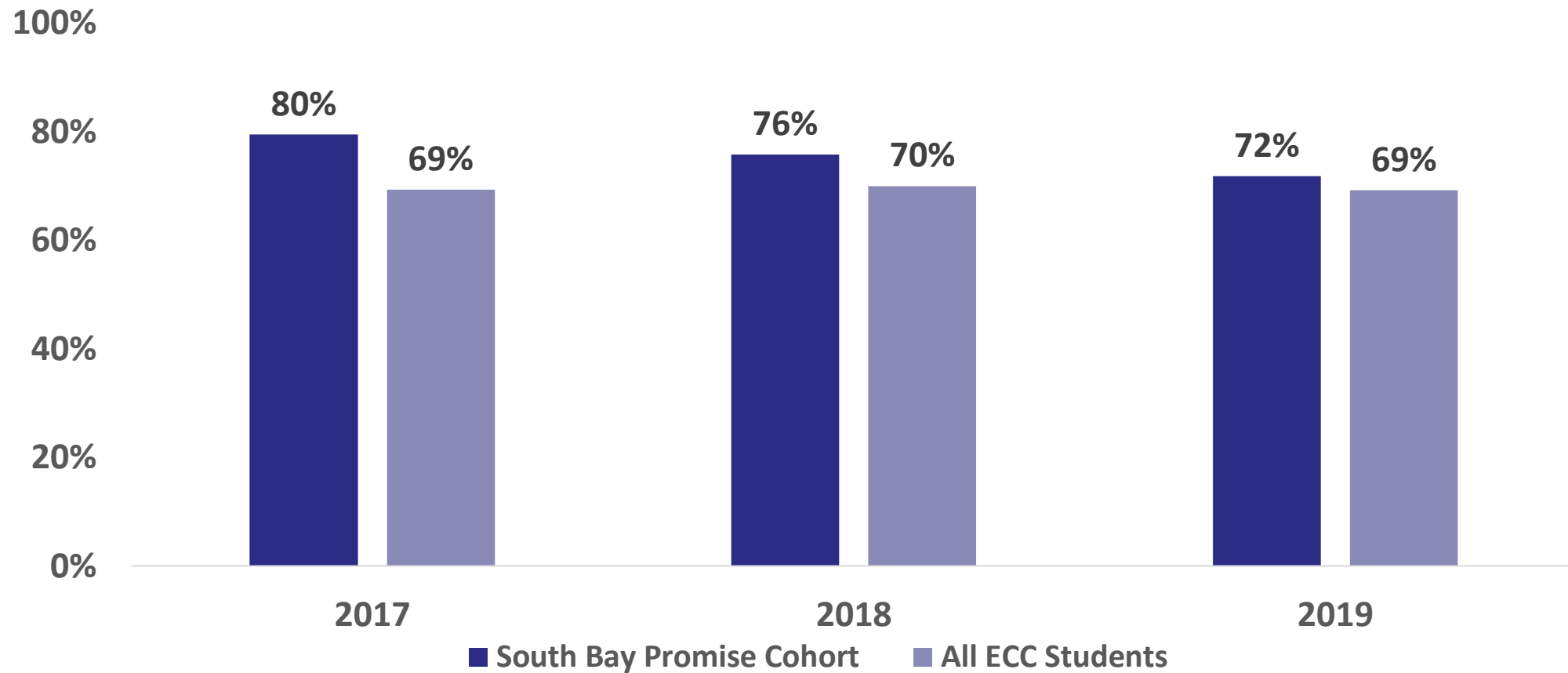


South Bay Promise Ethnicity

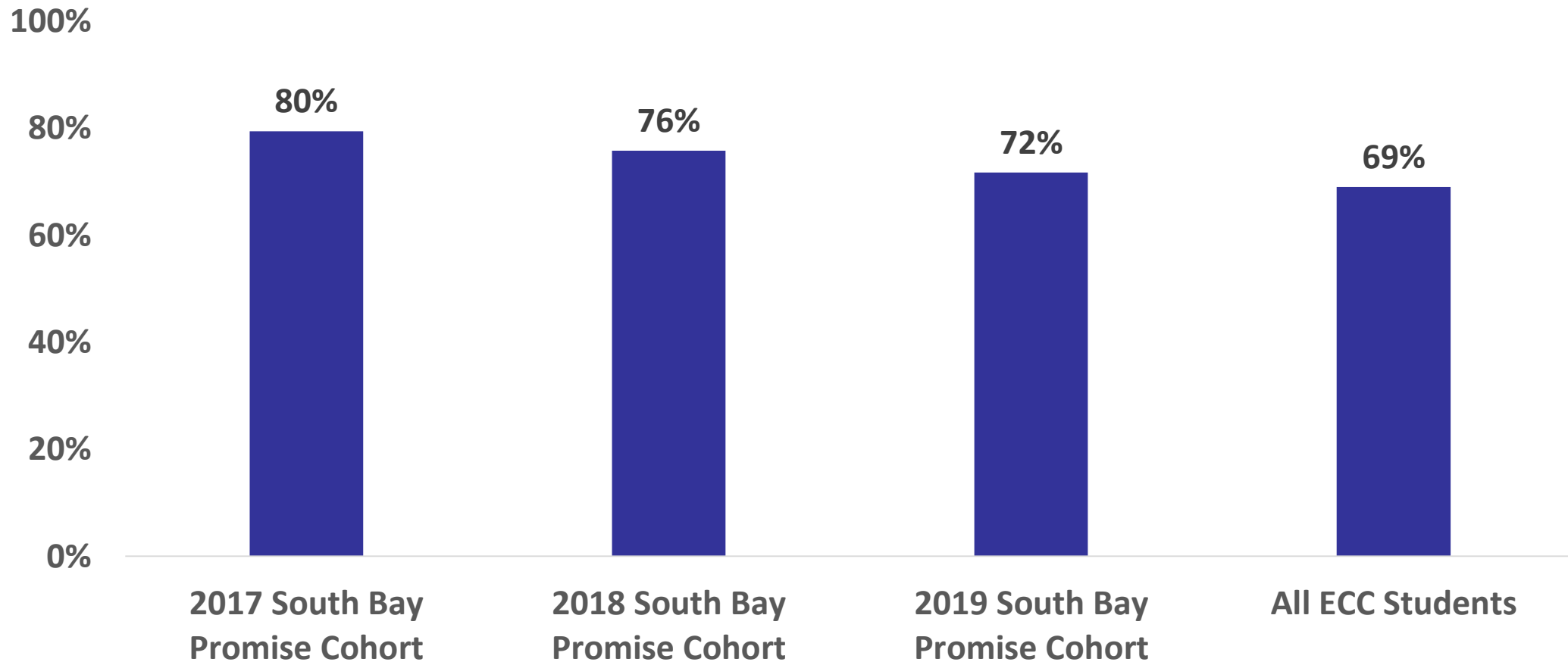
Annual percentages sum up more than 100% since students who reported more than one ethnicity were included in the count for each ethnicity category they reported.



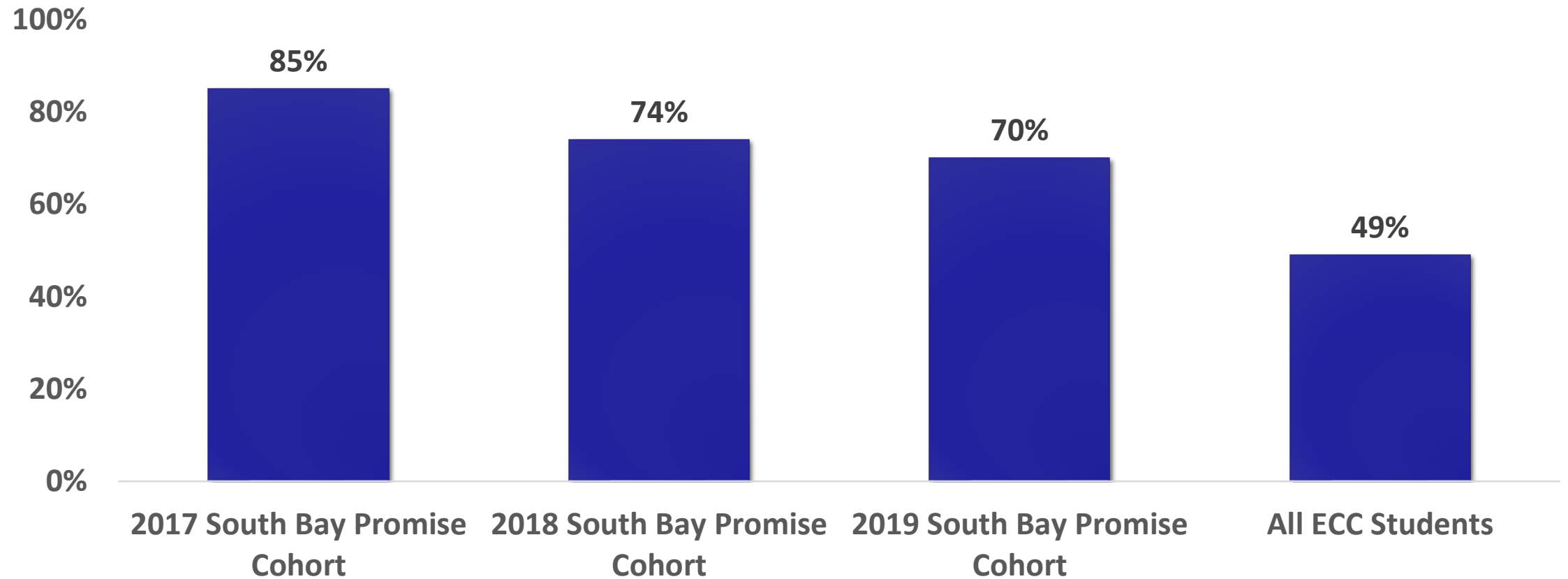
Successful Course Completion First Term



Student Retention Fall to Spring



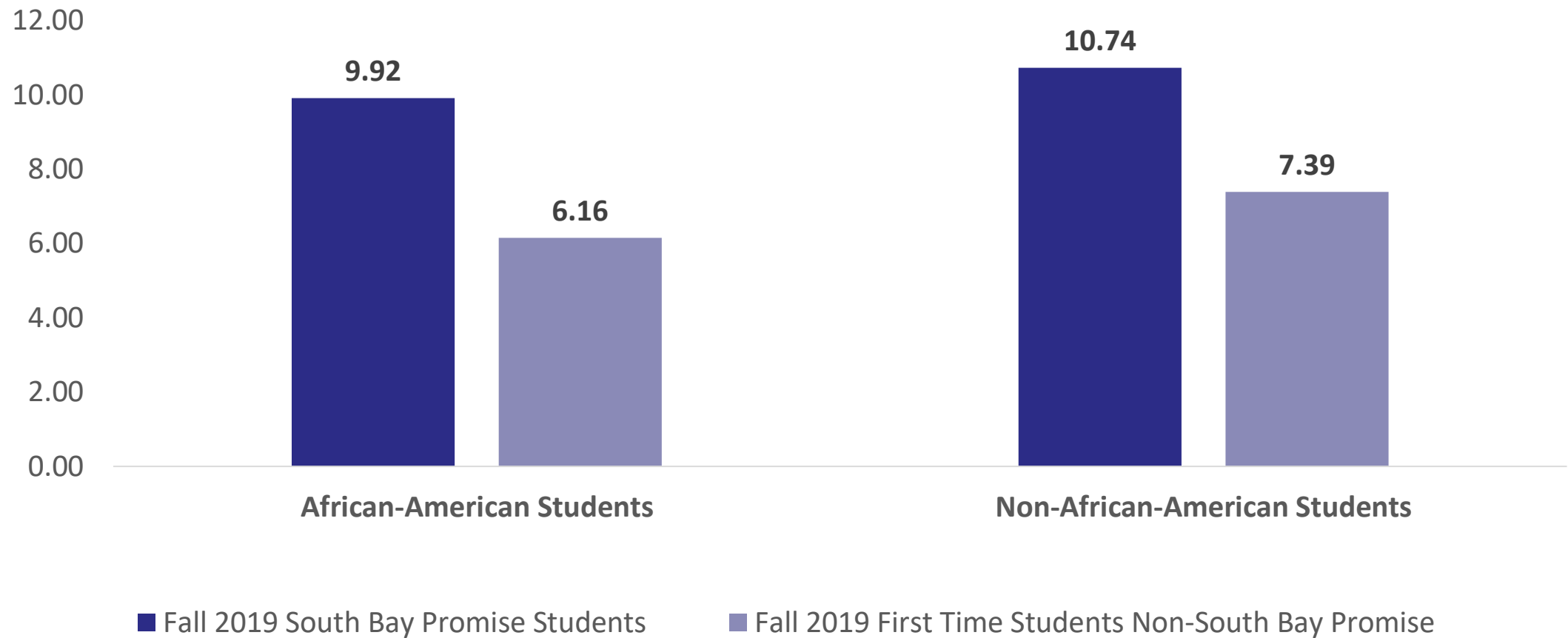
Student Retention Fall to Fall



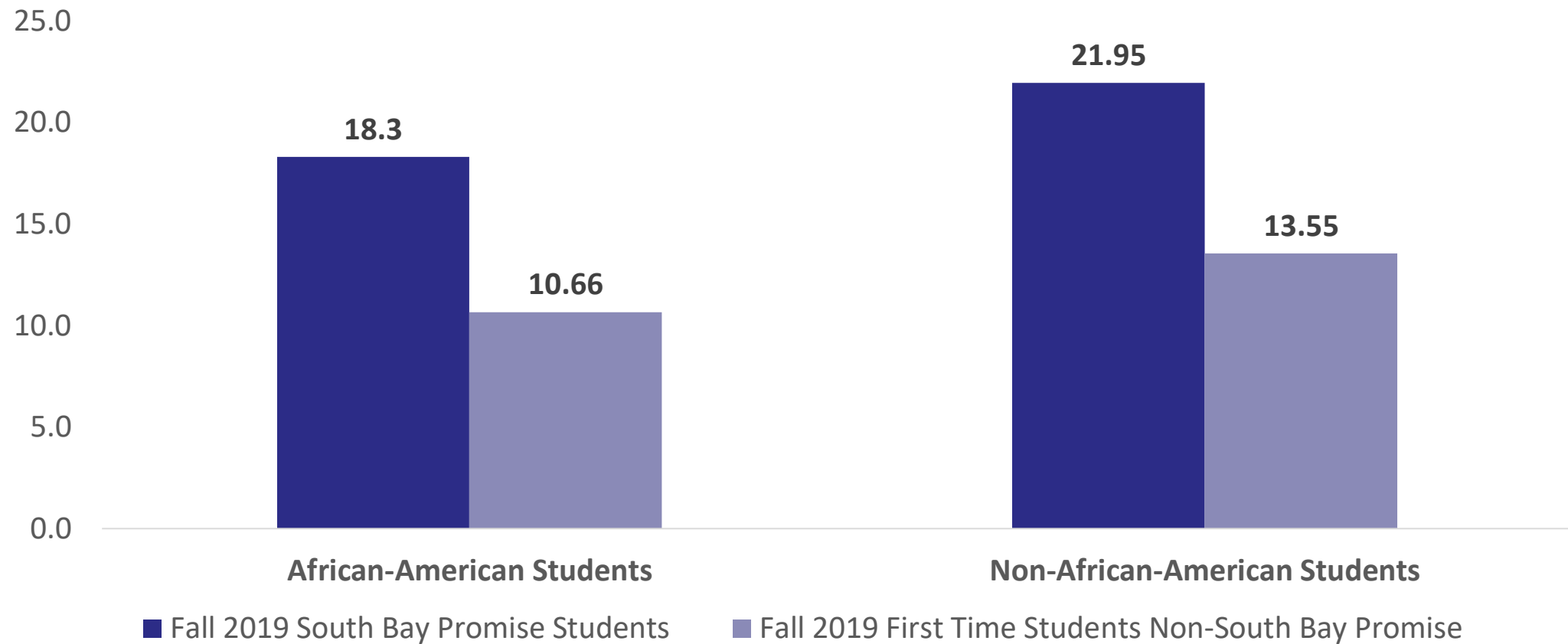

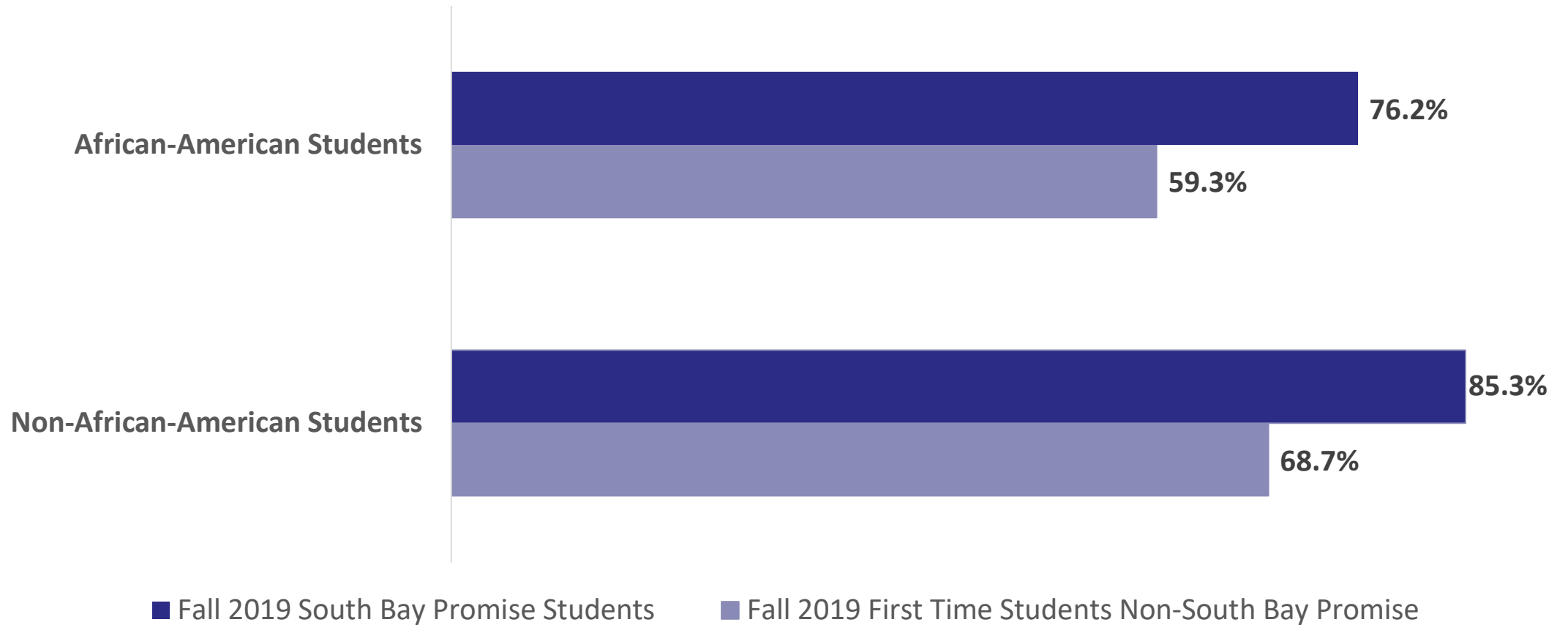
Average Units Earned – Fall 2019



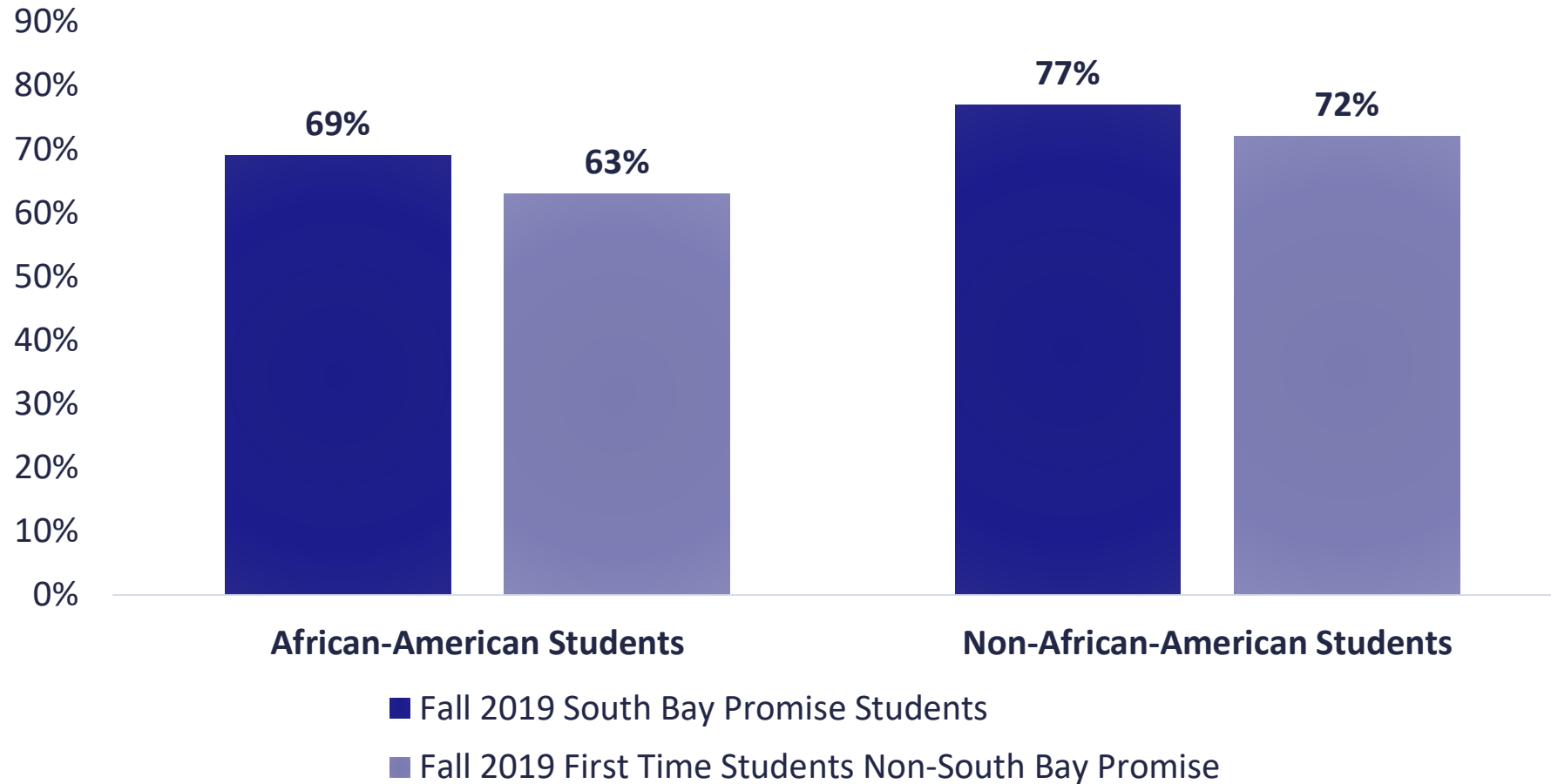
Average Units Earned – 2019-20



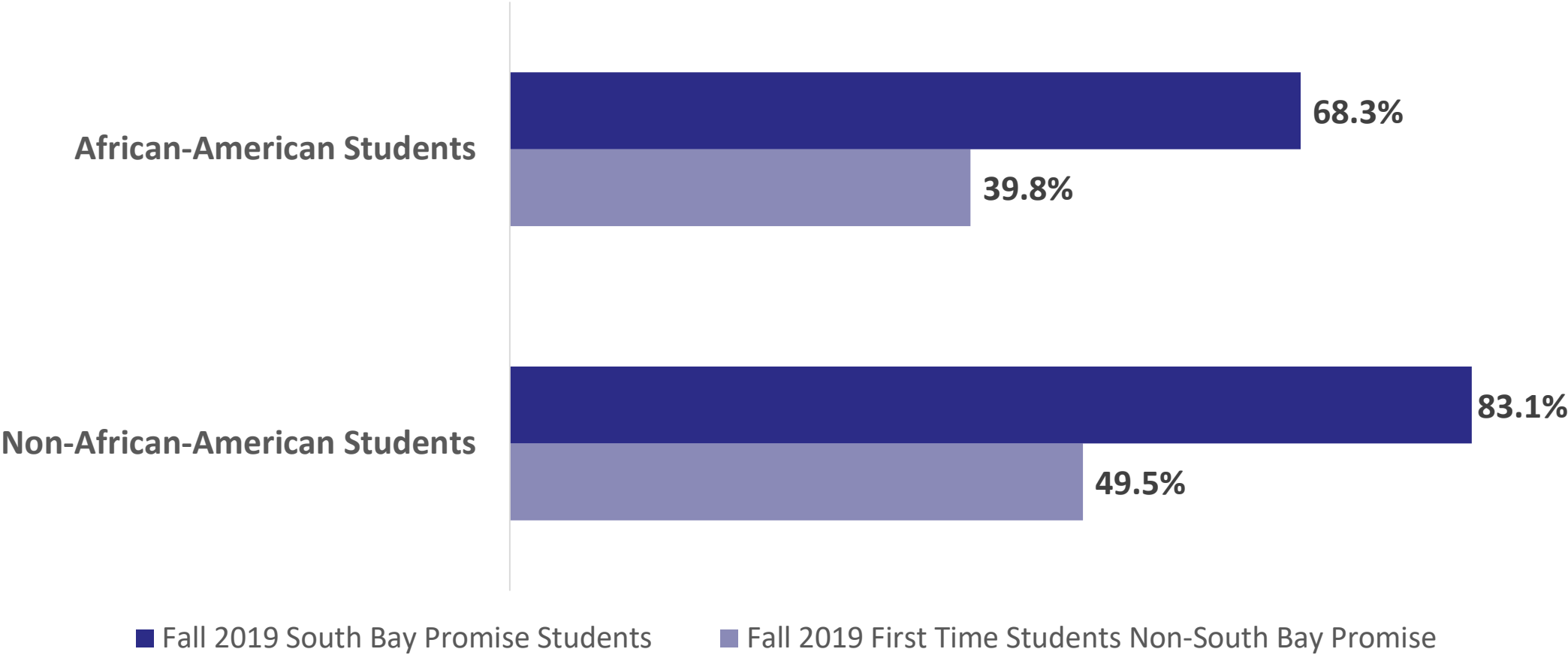
Student Retention Enrolled in Spring 2020



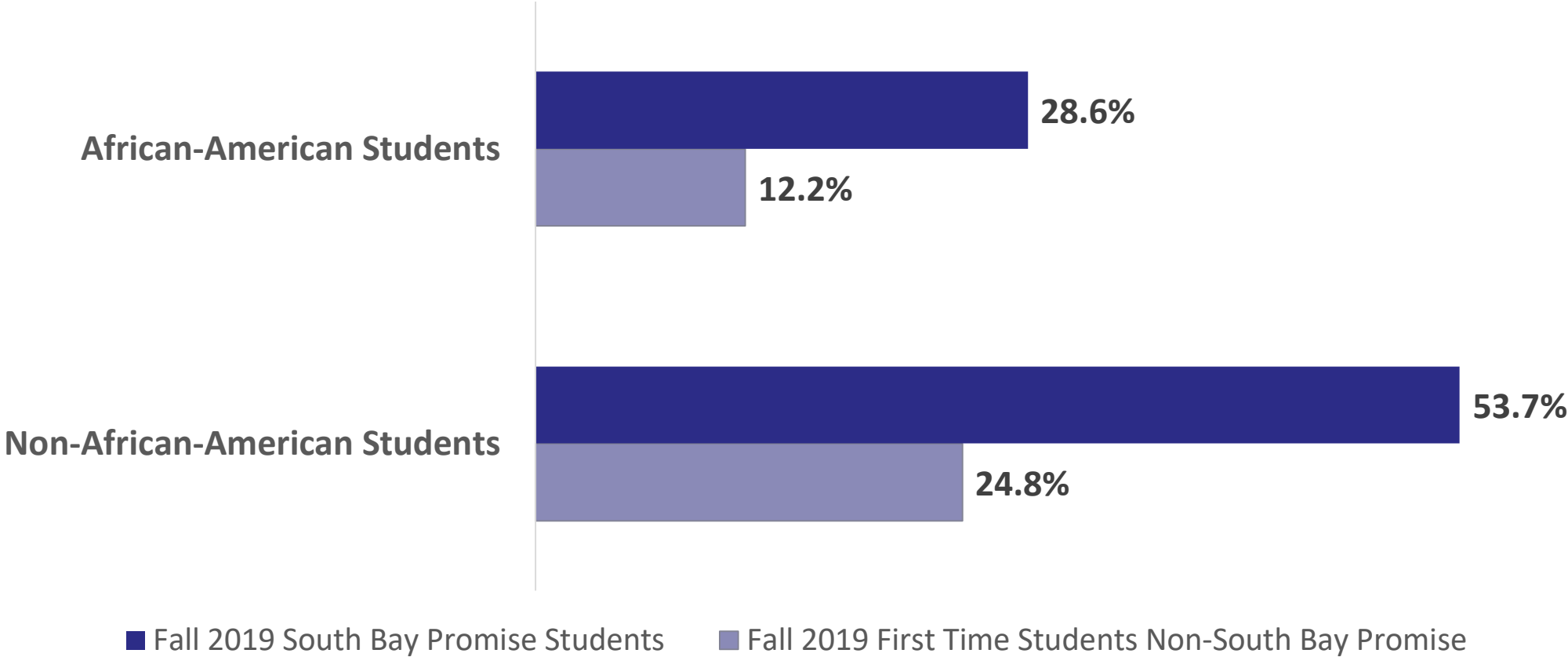
Successful Course Completion



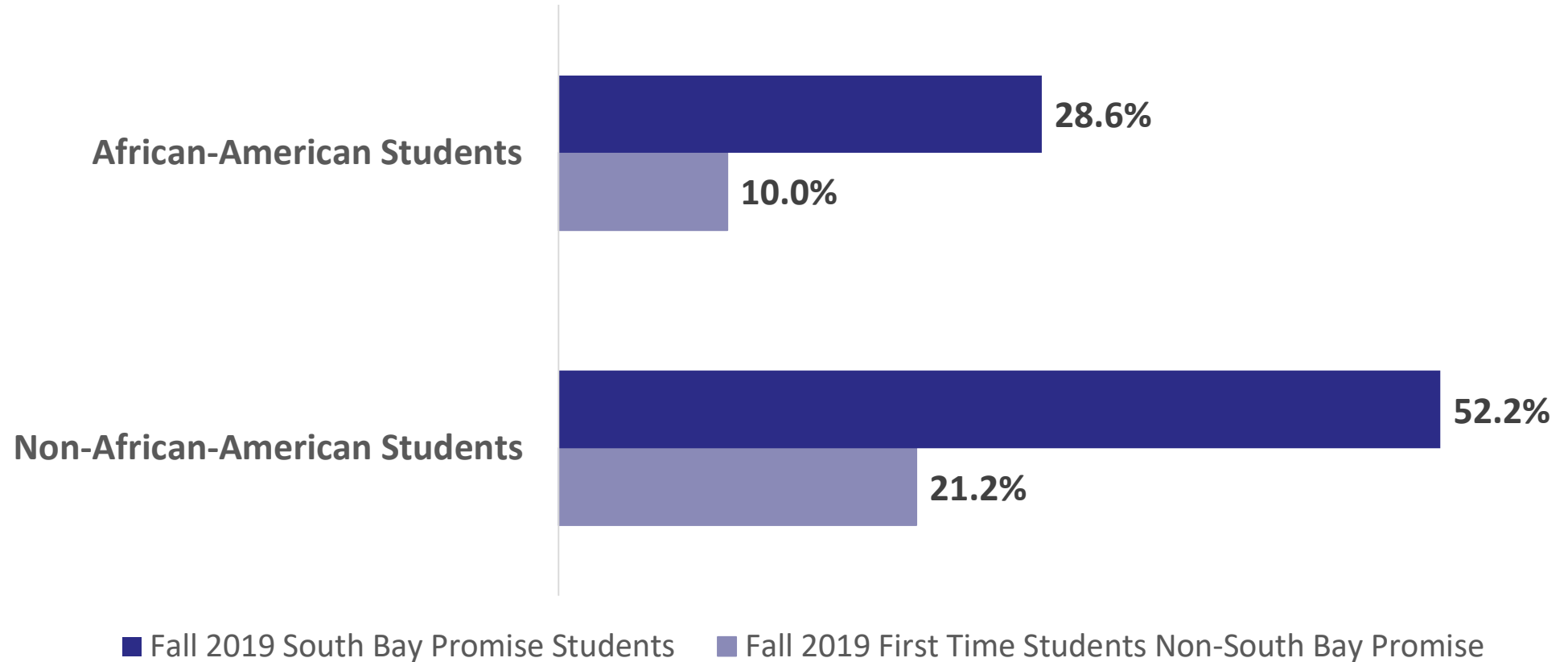
Completion Transfer Level English

Summary

- Generally, students in South Bay Promise perform better than their non-South Bay Promise counterparts.
- While African-American students have lower outcomes than non-African-American students, the increases seen in South Bay Promise African-American student outcomes demonstrate a reduction in the equity gap seen in the overall new student population.

Recommendations

- Expand information and awareness of the Promise at area high schools with larger African-American populations to increase the number of SBP African-American students.
- Identify SBP cluster of best practices to use them as a broad framework in the design of other ECC student support initiatives, programs and/or services.
- Increase collaboration with K–12, four-year institutions, and community sectors to augment AB 19 funding (California College Promise legislation requires CCs to partner with local education agencies to receive funding).
- Offer professional development opportunities to guide ECC teams design, communicate, evaluate, and implement a more robust and equitable SBP.
- Incorporate explicitly the equity dimension into the SBP requirements, in accordance to the Chancellor’s Office Call to Action (June, 2020) .
