This course will require 2 hours of homework hours outside of class to practice independent parts to be performed together in the larger ensemble. As much of the class time will be devoted to issues regarding expression, techniques, and other ensemble skills, students who take valuable classroom time to study their parts will be disruptive to the delivery of the course content. Given that the materials they will be practicing are simpler in nature than solo guitar music, and there will be a prescribed procedure for learning the parts (as learning innovative practice strategies are a part of the class), 2 hours of work outside of class is calculated to be sufficient.
