The ensembles include trios, quartets, quintets, and larger ensembles and may be combined with non-string instruments to complete the instrumentation appropriate to the selected literature. Emphasis is placed on stylistic and historical performance practices, instrumental techniques, and musicianship. Performances are held on campus and in the community.

They will evaluate the instrumental sound, in written form and orally with accurate use of music terminology, and focus their comments on instrument playing elements such as: Tone, intonation, balance, blend, pitch and rhythm accuracy, stylistic approach, and musicality. The results will be reviewed by the conductor of each instrumental group who will assess areas of strength and weakness. This will allow each instructor to improve the learning curve and implement the changes necessary. Results will also be shared with student section leaders.
