In addition, students will organize a public literary reading.

Guidelines and Policies (5 hours, lecture)</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> A. Research submission guidelines and publication policies from other periodicals. B. Identify important criteria for the campus literary journal. C. Create submissions guidelines and publication policies. <p>III. Promotion (10 hours, lecture)</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> A. Using a variety of media, create advertisements publicizing the magazine. B. Post advertisements and promote submissions throughout campus. C. Typical Assignment Using Primary Method of Evaluation:	After reviewing two literary journals (one hard copy, one electronic), write a 1,000 word blog entry that analyzes each in terms of its content, theme, design, and overall quality.
Critical Thinking Assignment 1:	In a two- to three-page essay, describe and analyze design elements utilized in the selection process for a literary magazine.
Critical Thinking Assignment 2:	Create a promotional event from inception to completion that will meet at least one of the following objectives: <i>1) increase awareness of Myriad, 2) increase followers on social media, 3) increase the number of submissions to Myriad.</i> After the event, write a one-page analysis of the successes and challenges of your event.
Other Evaluation Methods:	Class Performance, Essay Exams, Fieldwork, Multiple Choice, Reading Reports, True/False, Written Homework
