Purpose: To provide faculty the means for full participation in the formulation of policy on academic and professional matters relating to the college, including those in Title 5 (§53200-53206). The Board of Trustees will normally accept the recommendations of the Academic Senate on academic and professional matters in the following “10+1” areas in the senate purview (BP 2510). If a disagreement arises, the Board and the Senate must mutually agree to any changes or new policies.

1. Curriculum, including establishing prerequisites and placing courses within disciplines
2. Degree and certificate requirements
3. Grading policies
4. Educational program development
5. Standards and policies regarding student preparation and success
6. District and college governance structures, as related to faculty roles
7. Faculty roles and involvement in accreditation process, including self-study and annual reports
8. Policies for faculty professional development activities
9. Processes for program review
10. Processes for institutional planning and budget development, and
11. Other academic and professional matters as mutually agreed upon between the Board of Trustees and the Academic Senate.”

A postsecondary educational institution shall not uphold any rule, requirement, standard, or other limitation that prevents a student of that institution participating in intercollegiate athletics from earning compensation as a result of the use of the student's name, image, or likeness.

The District shall maintain an organized program for students in intercollegiate athletics. The District will offer equal opportunities for participation in athletics equally to male, female, and transgender students consistent with state and federal law and California Community College Athletic Association standards.

- On Tuesday 5/24, the CCC will conditionally approve three courses for the HyFlex Pilot for Fall (Art History, English, Law)
- Based on feedback from the pilot, the CCC will formally review and revise the DE Addendum to include the HyFlex option

English Prerequisite and Recommended Preparation Verbiage

- In 2020, to comply with AB 705 regulations, the English prerequisites and recommended preparation verbiage was changed to:
- **English 1 or eligibility for English 1A or qualification by appropriate assessment**
- Based on AB 705, courses that are below transfer level are no longer being offered.
- After extensive deliberation, the CCC voted to change the verbiage to “Eligibility for English 1A”
- This verbiage encompasses current multiple measures such as appropriate assessment and covers any future changes
- If English courses (such as English 1) are reinstated, this statement will automatically include them.

CAGP 2.0 -- Institute #2, April 27-29

- Attendees: President Brenda Thames, VP Ross Miyashiro, Jenny Simon, Janice Pon-Ishikawa, Ricky Gonzalez, Betty Sedor, Nayeli Qvilia, Anna Brochet
- Working institute to discuss Pillar 2: "Entering the path." We examined ECC's current onboarding practices and reimagined it using the **Ask-Connect-Inspire-Plan framework**.
 - The ACIP framework is based on CCRC's research with almost 120 community colleges across the country that are implementing guided pathways reforms.
 - **Ask:** Every student is engaged in an ongoing conversation about their interests, strengths, aspirations, and life circumstances with the aim of helping them explore programs of study and career paths aligned with their goals.
 - **Connect:** From the start, colleges organize opportunities for every student to meet with faculty, students, alumni, and employers in fields of interest to them and access college and community resources that can help support their needs.
 - **Inspire:** Every student takes at least one course in term 1 on a topic of interest that "lights their fire" for learning.
 - **Plan:** Every student is helped by the end of their first term to develop a full-program educational plan that shows them a path to their goals.
- ECC Takeaways:
 - **Ask:** Personal Success Plan (PSP) intake form (currently developing questionnaire and expanding it for all students. Ask about interests, life circumstances etc.
 - **Connect:** One application to fill out for all support programs. Will determine which programs student is eligible for and prevent students that need support being asked over and over to demonstrate their need.
 - Getting courses: Improve adding process for students after self-registration ends. Help "crasher" students that need classes find open sections with available seats.

The ECCCD will evaluate these programs and use the results of the evaluation as the basis for improvement.

The Flexible Calendar Coordinator shall annually submit to the State Chancellor an affidavit that contains all of the following:

- A statement that El Camino College (ECC) has an advisory committee, composed of administrators, faculty, classified staff, and student representatives, which makes recommendations on staff, student, and instructional improvement activities;
- Confirmation that ECC has completed a campus professional development plan for the current and subsequent fiscal years; which includes an assessment of needs and a plan of activities (55730), and attendance accounting data, for the purposes of calculating the flex adjustment. (55728)

The District shall establish a professional development advisory committee composed of representatives from each of the following: administrators, faculty, classified staff representatives, and students.

The purpose of the Professional Development Advisory Committee is to make recommendations on staff, student, and instructional improvement activities, especially campus-wide professional development. This committee will be a sub-committee of College Council. For classified staff professional development, the advisory committee collaborates with the Classified Professional Development Committee. For faculty professional development, the advisory committee consults with the Academic Senate, through the Faculty Development Committee.

Members of the Committee stands as follows:

- Administrator for the Profession Development department/Flexible Calendar Coordinator (chair)
- A second manager member appointed by the College President
- Chair of the Faculty Development Committee, or their designee
- 2nd Faculty member appointed by Academic Senate President
- Chair of the Classified Professional Development Committee, or their designee
- 2nd Classified member appointed by the College President
- Two student members to be appointed by the Associated Student Organization

The Classified Professional Development Committee collaborates with the Professional Development and Learning office on planning and decision making about classified staff professional development. Contractual changes are made in negotiation with the ECC Classified Employees.

The Faculty Development Committee (FDC), a subcommittee of the Academic Senate, represents the faculty in planning and decision making about faculty professional development. Per BP 2510, policies and procedures for faculty professional development are made in collegial consultation with the Academic Senate and changes are made in mutual agreement with the Board of Trustees.

Contractual changes are made in negotiation with the ECC Federation of Teachers. Obligations for faculty professional development are negotiated with the ECC Federation of Teachers and may be found in the Agreement available on the District website.

To ensure that district and employee needs are being met, professional development activities will be planned and presented based on:

1. Institutional planning priorities, including equity, diversity, inclusion, and accessibility; and student success
2. Results of needs assessment surveys and evaluations of previous professional development activities
3. Input from the college constituent groups
4. Legal mandates

All El Camino College faculty are required to complete **Senate-approved professional development that addresses systemic racism and/or racial equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI)**.

Professional development may include, but is not limited to:

1. Improvement of equity, diversity, inclusion, and accessibility
2. Improvement of teaching
3. Improvement of services to students
4. In-service training for vocational education and employment preparation programs
5. Intersegmental exchange programs
6. Development and maintenance of current academic and technical knowledge and skills
7. Institutional effectiveness and training to meet institutional needs and priorities
8. Development of innovations in instructional and administrative techniques and program effectiveness
9. Courses and training implementing equity programs and equal opportunity employment practices, policies, and legal mandates
10. Instructional and workforce technology
11. Training required by laws, codes, and regulations
12. Other activities determined to be related to educational and professional development.

Professional development activities, guidelines, plans and processes including information about the professional development program are published within the District designated platform, accessible on the District website.

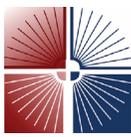

Board Policy 5700 Athletics

The District shall maintain an organized program for men and women in intercollegiate athletics. The program shall not discriminate on the basis of gender in the availability of athletic opportunities.

The Superintendent/President or designee shall assure that the athletics program complies with the California Community Colleges Athletic Association Constitution and Sports Guides, and appropriate Conference Constitution regarding student athlete participation.

A postsecondary educational institution shall not uphold any rule, requirement, standard, or other limitation that prevents a student of that institution participating in intercollegiate athletics from earning compensation as a result of the use of the student's name, image, or likeness.

Academic Senate Equity, Diversity, Inclusion, and Access Committee Accomplishments 2021-2022

1. Land Acknowledgment Toolkit.
 - The EDI Standing Committee formed a task force last fall 2021 semester that continues to work with the campus community in developing and implementing the Land Acknowledgment Toolkit. VP of EDI began rolling out the Land Acknowledgment Toolkit with a presentation to the Academic Senate and hosting workshops during PD Flex day, as well as during the spring semester. We will be presenting at the open assembly for fall PD Flex day and for the afternoon two breakout sessions on this and related matters to "The History that We Stand On". During fall of 2021 worked in collaboration on a Resolution Recognizing the Gabrielino-Tongva Tribe. Resolution passed by Academic Senate.
2. EDI Certificate Program: EDI Champions: Honoring ECC's Community.
 - EDI Standing Committee formed a task force to investigate and develop a plan to recognize individuals within the ECC community conducting EDI work. Task force receives feedback and recommendations from the standing committee to formalize a plan that will be presented to the Academic Senate in Fall 2022.
3. Mental Health.
 - EDI Standing Committee formed a task force to identify mental health barriers our faculty and students are facing post-covid. Three goals were developed out of this taskforce and presented to the standing committee (1) endorse and promote the mental health needs assessment (Healthy Minds Study), (2) develop a mental health resolution in consultation with various campus constituents, and (3) inquire with division deans if an internal log/reporting system is in-place within each division that document incidents occurring in their divisions. EDI Standing Committee will present resolution to the Academic Senate during fall 2022.
4. Informed & Inspired.
 - Since September of 2021, EDI Standing Committee partnered with the Faculty Development Standing Committee on the Informed and Inspired: Lunchtime Faculty Development Series. See the FDC summary of highlights for details on these I&I sessions.
5. Impact Equity Grid Training.
 - Since September of 2021, members of the EDI Standing Committee received training on how to use the Impact Equity Grid. During the Spring 2022 semester, members of the EDI Standing Committee looked at ECC's logos, seal, other images, and its name and applied it to the impact equity grid as a tool to assess inequities. EDI Standing Committee will begin present recommendations and findings to the Academic Senate starting fall 2022.
6. Developed a survey/questionnaire for the ECC Campus Community inquiring about EDI programs and projects. The goal is to bring together in one place ECC EDI work being done across campus.
7. Correspondence and Collaboration.
 - VP of EDI collaborated and corresponded with USC Race and Equity, Compton College, and other California Community Colleges on EDI related matters that help to guide and support the EDI work and efforts that advance EDI here at ECC.

Faculty PD Needs Assessment

Carolyn Pineda presented results from the Faculty PD Needs Assessment administered this semester. The assessment indicates interest in technology trainings related to increasing student engagement and academic integrity in online classes, as well as course design using Canvas tools. Other areas of interest for professional development and learning include: student-centered, discipline-specific pedagogy; addressing student wellness and basic needs; cohesive anti-racist/equity-minded policy and practice; and fostering collegiality among faculty, staff, and leadership. The majority of respondents prefer to attend one-time sessions (48%) or short-term two to three-day series of sessions (32%) on a variety of professional development topics, while 12% prefer to conduct a deep investigation of a topic on their own, and 8% would like to collaborate with colleagues in a semester-long community of practice. Results indicate faculty most prefer to attend synchronous virtual PD sessions midmorning on Fridays and during the college hour on Thursdays.

Collaboration with POCR Leads to Develop Online Course Design PD

After attending the last FDC meeting with his POCR co-lead Rhea Lewitzki, Moses Wolfenstein returned for a follow-up discussion on plans for a new PD series in the fall that will kick-off during PD Power-up Month. The committee suggested collaborative efforts for a SITE PD Power-up Month session and the session hosted by Rhea and Moses as both will center on developing communities of practice for the fall semester. Recommendations for recruiting faculty to participate in the communities of practice were also discussed, including reaching out to faculty within the same meta-major via the meta-major success teams.

Spring 2022 PD Day Evaluation Results

CM provided analysis of qualitative data from the Spring 2022 PD Day evaluation. Overall, results were overwhelmingly positive. Respondents noted an appreciation for the diverse voices represented during the general session and the overall optimistic messages about the return to campus. Appreciation for the reports from each of the VPs and President Thames was also expressed. Suggestions for the future included a request for more information specifically related to staff in the content and end-of-session announcements.

FDC 2021-22 Summary of Activities

The committee briefly reviewed a draft of the FDC 2021-22 Summary of Activities. SA encouraged members to review more carefully on their own and provide any recommended changes by Friday morning before the document is forwarded to Darcie McClelland for inclusion in the next Senate packet.

Fall 2022 PD Day

SA reported that only 15 breakout session proposals for Fall PD Day and PD Power-up Month have been received; however, additional proposals are expected. Members were encouraged to assist with recruitment efforts for additional proposals.

Informed & Inspired – Teaching for Excellence: From Theory to Practice

SA reminded the committee that *Informed & Inspired: Care Makes Learning Possible: Supporting Mental Health for You & Your Students* will take place on Thursday, May 26, 1:15-2:15 and Friday, May 27, 10:00-12:00. Presenters for Thursday's webinar include SHS clinical psychologists Dr. Victoria Kwon and Dr. Vianey Midgette, as well as SHS faculty coordinator Susan Nilles, and professor of childhood education Cynthia Cervantes. AM will close the session by discussing the significance of caring in culturally-responsive teaching while LK will facilitate the two-hour follow-up workshop on Friday. The new two-day format for I&I this semester has been quite successful and will likely remain in place moving forward.

College Book Club

LC reported that the College Book Club will meet on Zoom to discuss Chapters 8 and 9 of *Engaging African American Males in Community Colleges*, edited by Ted N. Ingram and James Coaxum III on Friday, June 3rd, 11:00-12:00. She reminded the committee that faculty, staff, and managers are invited to join and attendance at prior sessions is not required. Unlimited access to the e-book is available via the Schauerman Library.

SITE Report

LK reported that SITE has opted to forgo the summit they had planned to host at the end of this semester. Instead, they will host the Final Friday SITE Social at The Great Room in Redondo Beach. LK will host the final Equitable Grading Gatherings (EGG) of the semester on Friday, June 3rd, 12-1:30pm. LK, AM, and RC have submitted a proposal for a two-hour workshop during PD Power-up Month. The session will be a two-hour workshop intended to encourage faculty to form communities of practice for the fall semester.

- Consulted on the College Technology Committee's upgrade of approximately 152 classrooms.
- Consulted on the HyFlex classroom implementation and pilot program.
- Planned and executed the annual Educational Technology Conference: a two-day event with virtual, in-person, and HyFlex attendance options. The event included approximately 100 attendees, 5 vendors, a keynote speaker, and 10 workshops.

The ALC, Assessment of Learning Committee, is mainly charged with establishing and maintaining assessment and reporting practices and standards (in line with ACCJC standards) for Student Learning Outcomes, Program Learning Outcomes, and Institutional Learning Outcomes. Kevin Degnan chairs the committee with Catherine Schult-Roman from Math. The committee's membership is mainly made up of Division SLO Facilitators, who used to get stipends for this work until we split from Compton. The Facilitators establish and maintain assessment and reporting practices within their own Academic Divisions and carry back any actions or directives from the ALC as a whole. Aside from SLO Facilitators from the Academic Divisions, our membership also includes representatives from curriculum, Academic Affairs, Library & Learning Resources, and Student Services. Those representatives advise the committee on their area's perspective and help us identify stakeholders in those areas.

Fall 2021 Activities

Transition to upgraded Nuventive

- Met continually with Nuventive representative to configure an upgraded version of the Nuventive platform to better meet the assessment reporting needs of El Camino.
- Composed trainings to orient faculty on the new Nuventive platform and distribute those trainings via email and ECC website.

Entry of courses missing due to faulty communication between Curriculum Committee & ALC

- Approximately 140 new courses had gone through the curriculum process of approval, but had not reached the ALC so they could be entered into Nuventive and faculty could begin assessment reporting.
- With the work of Janet Young, Catherine Schult-Roman, and Kevin Degnan, a new workflow process was created and the relevant bodies on campus were informed so that this issue would not be repeated in the future.
- Worked with Curriculum and ALC members as well as Nuventive rep to enter all the missing courses into Nuventive.

Beginning of Canvas Outcomes project

- Worked with the ALC and Online & Distance Education department to establish a method of working that would enable us to collect SLO data via Canvas Outcomes, which will ultimately enable us to work with Institutional Research & Planning to disaggregate SLO data by discrete student population, a noted recommendation by the ACCJC in their 2020 visit.

Finalization of Guided Pathways ILOs & approval by Academic Senate

- In order to more fully work with Guided Pathways as a college, the Institutional Learning Outcomes were rewritten to follow the pillars of Guided Pathways. Working with the Guided Pathways advisory board, particularly Jenny Simon, we wrote and revised new ILO statements and got them approved by all relevant bodies in the collegial consultation process with gathering of assessment data to begin in Spring 2022.

Spring 2022 Activities

Planning for assessment of new Guided Pathways ILO 1

- In discussion at the ALC, most significantly with the members from Institutional Research & Planning, we established a more specific, concrete set of assessment methods that are relevant to ILO 1.
- Data will be gathered and analysis begun on this assessment method in Summer and Fall 2022.

Identification of likely gateway courses

- Conversations about gateway courses had begun in Summer 2021, and in consultation with Guided Pathways colleagues, a process for identifying gateway courses for each program was created.
- Through reviewing curriculum, enrollment, and in consultation with colleagues within the Divisions and programs, a set of gateway courses broken down by program was established to focus SLO & PLO assessment efforts as well as Program Review processes.

Establishment of wider scale Canvas Outcomes pilot for assessments in Spring 2022

- The work on Canvas Outcomes has continued and appears close to fruition.
- Gateway courses that had at least one SLO due to be assessed in Spring 2022 and were a good candidate to participate in a Canvas-based assessment were identified and their SLOs were loaded into Canvas Outcomes through the efforts of the SLO Coordinators and Online & Distance Education department.
- Training materials were composed by SLO Coordinators in cooperation with the ALC members' noted needs for their respective Divisions and Programs. These materials have been distributed to the SLO Facilitators and all members of the ALC so SLO data will be collected on a significant scale via Canvas.
- This data will be examined over Summer and Fall 2022 so detailed reports on SLOs will be able to be composed with equity data.

The Academic Program Review Committee (APRC) is a cross-campus committee charged with leading yearly Program Review trainings and supporting faculty and administrators in the completion of their Program Review document every four years. Kevin Degnan, Irena Zugic, and Carolyn Pineda lead the annual training at the end of spring semesters. As the departmental teams complete their documents, we support them in addressing any questions they have about the document and getting needed data or the Program Review's ultimate place in the planning process. Faculty have one contracted semester (fall) to complete the document, but this often includes summer and winter, should they choose to use those as well. Then, in spring semesters, the APRC meets with the team who composed the Program Review document to offer detailed feedback to support them in making their program look as good as possible in the document and to most effectively present any requests that may ultimately make it into planning and other processes. While this process is generally quite static and the only changes are the programs on the timeline to meet with, there are occasionally large changes, such as the recent overhaul of the Program Review template and timeline.

Fall 2021 Activities

The committee was largely dormant in Fall 2021 as faculty were completing their Program Reviews, but the committee chairs and Institutional Research and Planning representatives were working to support those faculty in finding needed data and fielding various inquiries from faculty composing the Program Review document.

Spring 2022 Activities

The committee became active again in Spring 2022 to collect the various programs' Program Review documents, distribute them to committee members to read, review, and compose feedback, and meet with the programs' faculty (and sometimes Dean and/or Associate Dean) to discuss the document.

The APRC met with 11 Programs and had to reschedule two programs' Program Review cycle due to a lack of full time faculty in departments due to retirement in CADD and the tragic passing of Darilyn Rowan of Photography.

The APRC offered constructive feedback to the 11 programs we were able to meet with and have collected revised, final drafts of those Program Review documents, which will be posted to the college's Program Review web pages early in Summer 2022.

The APRC also met to discuss clarifying edits to the Academic Program Review template, to be considered at Senate at the very end of Spring 2022 or early in Fall 2022.
