I) Enrollment and Scheduling

The department reviewed its enrollment over the past three years. Although the number of sections declined from 33 in Spring 2018 to 31 in Spring 2019 (due to budget cuts in January), the number of enrolled students increased slightly from 677 to 688 and fill rates rose from 68% to 78%. However, FTES declined from about 58 to 55. David Mussaw is investigating to see why FTES would decline when enrollment has slightly risen. He suspects it is likely related to the new offerings of online classes. Online classes have only 54 contact hours per student compared to 54.4 in face-to-face classes. Chris will report back to the HDEV faculty when she hears back from David.

II) Audit List

Due to the nature of the discipline, the department determined that none of their classes should be available to audit. Noncredit classes are being developed and any students interested in auditing could be directed to those classes in the future.

III) SLO/PLO Assessments

Assessments for HDEV 105 and HDEV 115 are due this Spring. Juli will take the lead on 105, and Yun will take the lead on 115. Juli is the SLO lead for the department and reported that the department is on track with assessment.

IV) Curriculum

This semester all HDEV classes were updated with an addendum that allows for them to be taught in the hybrid format. In a past hybrid section of an HDEV class, many students expected it to be a fully online class and dropped when they found out it was hybrid.

V) Guided Pathways

HDEV is appearing on many of the BSS AAT pathways and on pathways outside the division. Some disciplines are asking for HDEV 115, while others are requesting HDEV 110. The department

recommends that disciplines put HDEV 110 on pathways, because the class includes a significant career component, in addition to content that will assist students in the soft skills necessary for career success. HDEV is looking forward to doing its part to support Guided Pathways. The department reviewed the list of degrees and certificates awarded by BSS in 2013/14 through 2017/18.

VI) OEI/Finish Faster

The Dean explained the changes to the OEI Course Exchange, and the department viewed the FinishFaster website. ECC online classes should be posted on the site soon. The Distance Education Office is developing a quick start guide to help students use the Finish Faster site.

VII) Dual Enrollment

a) Adjunct feedback

Nancilyn has experienced behavioral problems and a lack of motivation in the students at Lloyde Continuation High School. The department discussed some of the problems faculty have faced in dual enrollment classes. The Dean will share those concerns with the dual enrollment office. We will meet again to further discuss the issues and to problem solve ways we can help ensure that our instructors receive the information and support they need at the high school sites.

b) Ed Planning

The educational planning assignment needs to be adapted for the dual enrollment classes. We may try to embed a counselor in the dual enrollment HDEV classes. Outreach counselors are already available at the high schools, and Nancilyn was able to arrange to have one work with her students at Lloyde Continuation High School. High school students should complete the worksheet component of the ed planning assignment. This would allow them to still achieve the SLO.

VIII) HDEV Textbook Updates

A new, 9th edition of the On Course textbook is available, but the full-time faculty will continue to assign the 8th edition because it is easily available at a cheaper cost to students. The department will be purchasing additional copies of the textbook to put on reserve in the library. Next year, the department will be working on creating a custom textbook that may be available in Fall 2020.

IX) Curriculum and Course Offerings

a) Honors

Juli will be teaching an Honors section of HDEV 110 in Fall 2019.

b) Undocumented Students

The department is considering offering a dedicated First Year Experience HDEV 115 section for undocumented students.

c) Noncredit Courses

The noncredit versions of HDEV 101 and 105 have passed through our local curriculum process and are waiting for approval by the Chancellor's Office. The department is also working on a noncredit certificate.

X) HDEV Scholarships Update

Kristie commended the Foundation for an excellent and meaningful scholarship event. Four HDEV students received scholarships. Two students received \$2,000 each for transfer scholarships, and two other students received \$1,000 each.

XI) Academic Senate Update

The ECC grading policy is being revised to include "EW," Emergency Withdrawal. This is required by the state. The revision is going into a second reading in the Senate in a couple days. EW is only for extenuating circumstances.

XII) Department Activities

Thanks to Hatien, Sarah, and Amanda for helping at the HDEV table at the Career and Majors Fair. Also thanks to Hatien for helping with the HDEV table at the PRIDE Fair.

XIII) Counselor's Report

Cheryl announced an upcoming TAG workshop on May 22 from 1-3:00 pm. This is for students with at least 30 units. The Admit Reception is on June 12 in the East Dining Room.


