Definitions

(Draft)

Student Learning Outcome (SLO)— "the knowledge, skills, abilities or attitudes that students have attained by the end of any set of college experiences, classes, programs, degrees and certificates or encounters with college services. SLOs articulate the major goals of each experience, require higher-level thinking skills and usually result in a product that can be evaluated" (Cabrillo College). .Thus, a robust SLO consists of three components. They are as follows:

- An SLO statement
- An assessment instrument
- A rubric for evaluating the assessment with respect to the SLO

SLO Statement—a robust statement of the outcome to be achieved. An SLO statement consists of a <u>context</u> under which the assessment will be given, an <u>objective</u> to be achieved, and <u>primary traits</u> which a successful example should possess.

Assessment Instrument—the evidence of learning that the student will produce (e.g. test, essay, portfolio, demonstration) and which will be evaluated by the stakeholders (e.g. faculty, counselors, managers, public)

Rubric—a set of primary traits and guidelines for scoring and evaluating each assessment as agreed upon by stakeholders.

Program—a set of courses which culminates in a degree, certificate, or preparation for degree or certificate

Core Competency—"these college-wide skills describe what ... students are able to do at the end of their experience with the college. These also describe the competencies that students completing the General Education program and/or receiving an AA or AS degree from the college have mastered" (Cabrillo College). Core competencies can also be considered categories under which course- and program-level SLOs can be organized.

Course-level SLO—the outcome to be achieved at the end of a particular course.

Program-level SLO—the outcome to be achieved at the end of a particular program.

Student Learning Outcome Assessment Cycle—the process of first <u>identifying SLOs</u>, <u>assessing SLOs</u>, and <u>reflecting</u> upon the results of the assessments. At ECC, this is a three-semester cycle.
