Scores were 90-100% - 18 students, 80 - 89% - 6 students, and 70-79% - 2 students. No students scored lower than 70%. Most students were able to create a nutrient-dense menu for their age/sex/activity level. For the students who struggled, one major weakness is that the menus did not include one or more major nutrients, including vitamins C and A, folic acid and iron (especially for women of childbearing age), and calcium. Students are weak in recognizing food sources of major nutrients, so struggle to create a nutrient dense menu of whole foods. The second major weakness was that some students cut-and-pasted very nutritious recipes, but probably lack the resources and skills to create these dishes. The instructor should present models or examples of nutrient dense menus, created form whole foods which are locally available, affordable, and easily prepared. Otherwise, this exercise is more theoretical than practical.
