TRANSFER TERMINOLOGY

7-Course Pattern – To be eligible for UC admission, students must complete the following 7-course pattern requirements, earning a grade of C or better in each course: two transferable courses in English composition; one transferable college course in mathematics and four transferable courses chosen from at least two of the following subject areas: arts and humanities, social and behavioral sciences, physical and biological sciences.

Application Fee Waiver – Exempt of payment of the admission application fee for those students with demonstrated financial hardship.

Articulation Agreement – A written agreement that lists courses at one college that are equivalent (or acceptable in lieu of) courses at another college.

ASSIST – A Web-based student transfer information system which contains information about how courses taken at a California Community College can be applied when transferred to a University of California or a California State University campus.

Associate Degrees for Transfer (ADT: AA-T/AS-T) – A transfer degree that meets CSU admission requirements and ECC's Associate degree requirements. An ADT also provides priority consideration to the CSU.

ADT Verification – Confirmation sent by El Camino College to CSU showing you are on track to earn your ADT (AA-T or AS-T). This happens automatically once you submit your Intent to Graduate petition by the deadline.

Bachelor's or Baccalaureate Degree – A Bachelor of Arts, Science or related degree is awarded upon completion of a program of study.

Cal-GETC – The general education pathway that community college students can follow to satisfy the lower-division GE requirements for the University of California (UC), the California State University (CSU), and some private and out-of-state institutions.

Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) – An academic support program that provides services to students who may have economic, educational or social disadvantages.

Elective – Courses not required for the major or general education but are acceptable for credit. An elective course may be in the student's major area of study or any department of a college.

Filing Period – The period of time during which campuses will accept applications for students wishing to enroll in a particular semester or quarter.

General Education Certification – Refers to a notation on the final official transcript that indicates a student has completed the lower division general education requirements for the CSU General Education Breadth or IGETC patterns. Certification exempts students from taking lower division general education courses at the CSU or UC campus to which they are transferring.

General Education Requirements – A group of courses, in varied areas of the arts and sciences, designated by a college as one of the requirements for a degree.

Golden 4 – Four critical courses that a student must complete with a 'C' or better to be eligible for admission to a CSU. They include Oral Communication, Written Communication, Critical Thinking and a transferable Math course.

Impacted Major/Campus – When the number of applications received is expected to be larger than the number of spaces available. Additional criteria are then considered in making an admission decision and students must apply during a specified time period.

Independent College/University – In California there are more than 75 accredited colleges and universities which are not supported by public funding.

Intent to Enroll / Statement of Intent to Register (SIR) – The process of officially accepting an offer of admission to a college or university. CSU refers to this as the "Intent to Enroll," while UC calls it the "Statement of Intent to Register (SIR)". A deposit may also be required to hold your spot.

Local Area Admission – A CSU admissions policy that offers priority admission to students that attend a "local" community college determined by the individual CSU campus. Out-of-local area applicants may be held to higher or additional admission criteria.

Lower Division – Courses at the freshman or sophomore level of college. Community colleges offer lower division courses.

Minor – A secondary field of study outside of the major that is declared at the four-year university. It often requires substantially less course work than a major.

Pre-requisite – Requirement that must be met before enrolling in a particular course.

Professional Schools – Law, medicine, dentistry, veterinary science, pharmacy and other health science schools which require or recommend specific undergraduate preparation.

Quarter System – Approximately 10 weeks of instruction offered three times a year, during the fall, winter and spring. Some institutions also offer a summer quarter.

Resident/Non-Resident Status – Student status based on place of legal residence. Non-residents (out-of-state) often have to pay higher fees and meet higher admission requirements at state financed colleges and universities.

Semester-System – Approximately 16-18 weeks of instruction offered two times a year, during the fall and spring.

Transferable Grade Point Average (G.P.A) – The indication of the overall level of academic achievement in transferable courses.

Undergraduate – A student enrolled in coursework leading towards a bachelor's degree.

Units – The measure of college credit given a course, usually on the basis of one unit for each lecture hour per week or for every two to three laboratory hours per week.

Upper Division – Courses at the junior and senior level offered at four-year institutions.

2025-2026 TRANSFER TIMELINE FOR UC & CSU

May 1 - 31, 2025 - UC TAG filing period for Winter/Spring 2026 (*UCM only)

July 1 – 31, 2025 – UC application filing period for Winter/Spring 2026 (*UCM and UCSC open)

August 1 – **31, 2025** – CSU application filing period for Spring 2026. To check which campuses are accepting applications, visit: https://www.calstate.edu/apply/

September 1 – 30, 2025 – UC Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG) application filing period for Fall 2026. Submit online TAG application at https://uctap.universityofcalifornia.edu. You must also submit a UC application between October 1 - November 30, 2025.

September 2025 – Begin working on your UC Personal Insight Questions (PIQs) early so you have drafts ready for the Fall PIQ open labs. Have someone review your responses. Start searching for scholarships (highly recommended for AB 540 students).

Mid-September 2025 – Check the Transfer Center website for a list of CSU/UC application workshops and open labs (registration required): https://www.elcamino.edu/academics/transfer-center/events-and-workshops/transfer-workshops.aspx

October 1 – December 1, 2025 – CSU application filing period for Fall 2026. Apply for admission at https://www.calstate.edu/apply/. Be sure to attend a CSU application workshop and open lab for support. If you are planning to earn an Associate Degree for Transfer (AA-T/AS-T), make sure to indicate it on your application.

October 1 – **December 1, 2025** – UC application filing period for Fall 2026. Apply for admission at <u>apply.universityofcalifornia.edu</u>. Be sure to attend a UC application workshop and open lab for support.

October 2025 – March 2, 2026 – Submit the 2026-2027 FAFSA at https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa or the Dream Act application at https://dream.csac.ca.gov/ (for AB 540 students only). For maximum award eligibility, apply early and be sure to list all UC, CSU, and Private/Out-of-State institutions to which you plan to apply.

January – February 2026 – If you plan to earn an AA/AS or AA-T/AS-T degree at the end of Spring 2026, complete the appropriate Intent to Graduate online form by the posted deadline. Forms are available at: www.elcamino.edu/support/counseling/graduation.php. AA-T and AS-T transfer applicants file your form in January so Admissions & Records can submit verification on your behalf by the March 15, 2026 deadline.

January 2026

- 1. Update your UC/CSU application with your final Fall 2025 grades and verify your Winter/Spring 2026 coursework.

 - CSU: https://calstate.liaisoncas.com/applicant-ux/#/login.
- 2. Some CSU campuses require a supplemental application to be completed and may also require you to submit official transcripts with Fall 2025 grades from all colleges or universities attended.

March 1 – **May 1, 2026** – Campuses begin sending admissions decisions. Check your email and campus portals for admissions status. Notify the Transfer Center where you were admitted by completing the Accepted to the University form: https://bit.ly/acceptedtouniversity.

May 1 – June 1, 2026 – Submit your Statement of Intent to Register (SIR) to the UC or CSU you plan to attend.

May – **June 2026** – Attend the Transfer Center **Admit Reception/Celebration** at ECC. For event details and the RSVP link, visit: https://www.elcamino.edu/academics/transfer-center/events-and-workshops/admit-reception.php

June 2026 (end of semester) – Once you have been admitted and decided which university you will attend, request the following through the ECC Admissions webpage (https://www.elcamino.edu/admissions/):

- 1. Request your final official transcript to be sent to the university you are attending by the their posted deadline:
 - If you are earning an AA-T or AS-T, make sure your degree is posted on your transcript before sending.
 - Request CSU-GE or IGETC certification and confirm it is posted on your transcript before sending.

CSU ADMISSIONS CHECKLIST

1. 	B. Complete the "Golden Four" early — transferable Math, English Composition, Critical Thinking and Oral Communication — to be considered for admission to the CSU.
	C. Take major prep courses to be better prepared for upper-division coursework when you transfer to the university. Refer to www.assist.org .
	D. If you took AP exams in high school, meet with a counselor to review your AP scores. CSU campuses evaluate AP scores differently than El Camino College.
2.	Understand CSU impaction. Refer to the Undergraduate Impacted Program database (https://www.calstate.edu/attend/impaction-at-the-csu) to check if your intended major or campus is impacted. If so, visit the specific campus website to review the admissions criteria and when requirements must be completed (i.e. grade point average, major prep courses).
3.	Learn about Local Area Admission Priority. CSU campuses give priority to applicants from their local service area. Refer to the https://www.calstate.edu/apply/freshman/documents/csulocaladmission-serviceareas.pdf to
	determine which CSU's apply local area admissions policies.
4.	Explore Associate Degree for Transfer (AA-T/AS-T) Options. Ask about the benefits of earning an AA-T or AS-T. Majors include: Administration of Justice, Anthropology, Art History, Business Administration, Communication Studies, Early Childhood Education, Economics, Elementary Teacher Education, English, Geography, Geology, History, Journalism, Kinesiology, Mathematics, Philosophy, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Social Justice Studies, Sociology, Spanish, Studio Arts, and Theatre Arts. <i>Note: Additional majors may become available.</i>

UC ADMISSIONS CHECKLIST

1. 	B. Complete transferable Math and English courses early (preferably by the end of the fall term you are applying) to be more competitive when you apply.
	C. Complete major preparation courses early. The more major courses you complete before applying, the more competitive you will be. Use www.assist.org to see the major preparation coursework expected by each UC campus.
	D. If you took AP exams in high school, meet with a counselor to review your AP scores. UC campuses evaluate AP scores differently than El Camino College.
2.	Find out if your UC campus or major is highly selective. If so, review the admission requirements carefully, including GPA expectations, major prep, and any supplemental materials (e.g., portfolios, auditions, or interviews). Be aware when requirements must be completed to be considered for admission.
3.	Learn about UC Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG) programs. ECC has TAG agreements with most UC campuses. To explore eligibility criteria, the TAG Matrix, and the online TAG application visit: https://admission.universityofcalifornia.edu/admission-requirements/transfer-admission-guarantee-tag.html .
4.	Ask about the benefits of joining the Honors Transfer Program. Please visit www.elcamino.edu/support/resources/honors-transfer/

6.	Apply broadly. Apply to at least four UC campuses, especially if your first choice campus is selective. Apply on time and meet all UC deadlines. Most campuses accept fall applications only, typically a year before enrollment. If your first-choice major is selective, list an alternate if possible. Note: Fee waivers are available for eligible students.

UC Personal Insight Questions



What are the Personal Insight Questions? These questions are about getting to know you better — your life experience, interests, ambitions and inspirations. Think of it as your interview with the admissions office. Be open. Be reflective. Find your individual voice and express it. While this section of the application is just one part we consider when making our admission decision, it helps provide context for the rest of your application.

The Basics

- You will need to answer 4 questions total: One question is required, and you must also answer 3 out of 7 additional questions.
- Responses to each question should be between 250-350 words.
- Which three questions you choose to answer of the seven are up to you: But you should select questions that are most relevant to your experience and that best reflect your individual circumstances.
- All questions are equal: All questions are given equal consideration in the application review process, which means there is no advantage or disadvantage to choosing certain questions over others

Transfer Questions & Brainstorm Exercises

Required Question:

Please describe how you have prepared for your intended major, including your readiness to succeed in your upper-division courses once you enroll at the university.

Suggestions for the Required Question:

- How did your interest in your major develop? Do you have any
 experience related to your major outside the classroom such
 as volunteer work, internships and employment, or participation
 in student organizations and activities? If you haven't had
 experience in the field, consider including experience in the
 classroom. This may include working with faculty or doing
 research projects.
- If you're applying to multiple campuses with a different major at each campus, think about approaching the topic from a broader perspective, or find a common thread among the majors you've chosen.

Additional Questions: You will also need to answer <u>any three</u> of the following seven questions.

1) Describe an example of your leadership experience in which you have positively influenced others, helped resolve disputes, or contributed to group efforts over time.

Suggestions for Question #1:

- A leadership role can mean more than just a title. It can mean being a mentor to others, acting as the person in charge of a specific task, or taking lead role in organizing an event or project. Think about your accomplishments and what you learned from the experience. What were your responsibilities?
- Did you lead a team? How did your experience change your perspective on leading others? Did you help to resolve an important dispute at your school, church in your community or an organization? And your leadership role doesn't necessarily have to be limited to school activities. For example, do you help out or take care of your family?
- 2) Every person has a creative side, and it can be expressed in many ways: problem solving, original and innovative thinking, and artistically, to name a few. Describe how you express your creative side.

Suggestions for Question #2:

- What does creativity mean to you? Do you have a creative skill that is important to you? What have you been able to do with that skill?
- Was there ever a problem where your imagination and intuition guided you to the solution? What are the steps you took to solve the problem?
- How does your creativity influence your decisions inside or outside the classroom? Does your creativity relate to your major or a future career?
- Do you have a passion for music, theater, visual art, dance, etc.? What have you gained from it that has affected other parts of your life?
- 3) What would you say is your greatest talent or skill? How have you developed and demonstrated that talent over time?

Suggestions for Question #3:

- If there's a talent or skill that you're proud of, this is the time to share it. You don't necessarily have to be recognized or have received awards for your talent (although if you did and you want to talk about it, feel free to do so). Why is this talent or skill meaningful to you?
- Does the talent come naturally or have you worked hard to develop this skill or talent? Does your talent or skill allow you opportunities in or outside the classroom? If so, what are they and how do they fit into your schedule?
- 4) Describe how you have taken advantage of a significant educational opportunity or worked to overcome an educational barrier you have faced.

Suggestions for Question #4:

Feel Free to speak about either an opportunity or a barrier. It's OK if you've experienced one and not the other.

- Educational Opportunities: An educational opportunity can be anything that has added value to your educational experience and better prepared you for college. For example, participation in an honors or academic enrichment program, or enrollment in an academy that is geared toward an occupation or a major, or taking advanced courses that interest you just to name a few. How did you take what you learned and apply it to your schoolwork or other aspects of your life?
- <u>Educational Barriers</u>: Have you faced any barriers or challenges
 related to school and/or your schoolwork? How did you
 overcome or strive to overcome them? What personal characteristics or skills did you call on to overcome this challenge? How
 did overcoming this barrier help shape who you are today?

5) Describe the most significant challenge you have faced and the steps you have taken to overcome this challenge. How has this challenge affected your academic achievement?

Suggestions for Question #5:

- A challenge could be personal, or something you have faced in your community or school. Why was the challenge significant to you? This is a good opportunity to talk about any obstacles you've faced and what you've learned from the experience. Did you have support from someone else or did you handle it alone?
- If you're currently working your way through a challenge, what
 are you doing now, and does that affect different aspects of your
 life? For example, ask yourself, "How has my life changed at
 home, at my school, with my friends or with my family?"

6) What have you done to make your school or your community a better place?

Suggestions for Question #6:

- Think of community as a term that can encompass a group, team or a place – like your college, hometown, or home. You can define community as you see fit, just make sure you talk about your role in that community. Was there a problem that you wanted to fix in your community?
- Why were you inspired to act? What did you learn from your effort? How did your actions benefit others, the wider community or both? Did you work alone or with others to initiate change in your community?

7) Beyond what has already been shared in your application, what do you believe makes you stand out as a strong candidate for admissions to the University of California?

Suggestions for Question #7:

- If there's anything you want us to know about you, but didn't find a question or place in the application to tell us, now's your chance. What have you not shared with us that will highlight a skill, talent, challenge or opportunity that you think will help us know you better?
- From your point of view, what do you feel makes you an excellent choice for UC? Don't be afraid to brag a little.

Next Steps: As you filled out the worksheet, were there any topics that seemed particularly interesting? You might consider answering those questions as part of your application. But the choice is yours! Take your time in selecting which questions to answer and how to answer them. Remember, the personal insight questions are just that—personal. The important things is expressing who you are, what matters to you and what you want to share with the UC.

Suggestions for Answering the Personal Insight Questions

Answer the question. There are no right or wrong answers to these questions. They are about you and your life thus far. Take time and think about each suggestion before you start writing. Use details and examples to make your point. Use your words strategically; is there a reason behind your example? Write to add context and depth, not to fill space.

Give yourself time to edit. Start writing then go back and review the word count, content, and overall message. You may not have space to tell us everything so make your words count.

Be you. Remember to talk about yourself so that we can get to know your personality, talents, accomplishments and potential to succeed at the UC campus.

Use your own voice. Your answers should reflect your own ideas and be written by you alone, but others — instructors, counselors, advisors, family and friends — can offer valuable suggestions. Use plenty of "I" and "my" statements in your responses.

Stick to one topic per response. Present your information and ideas in a focused, thoughtful manner. Making a list of accomplishments, activities, awards, or work will lessen the impact of your words. Expand on a topic by using examples and facts for maximum impact to an Admissions reader.

Proofread and edit. Although you will not be evaluated on grammar, spelling or sentence structure, you should proofread your work and make sure your writing is clear. Grammatical and spelling errors can be distracting to the reader and get in the way of what you're trying to communicate.

Brainstorm Topics. When you are answering the Personal Insight Questions <u>consider</u> including:

- Personal triumphs or challenges—If you decide to talk about a challenge or triumph, do not forget to explain what you learned from the experience.
- Leadership opportunities—We value leadership at many levels (e.g. family, school, or community).
- Experiences outside the classroom—Consider experiences that have made an impact on your life (e.g., travels, church/temple, work, youth groups, or your family).
- Disabilities—If you are living with a disability, feel free to talk about it in the context of your ability to succeed.
- Culture—If your culture has influenced who you are, talk about it. Let it add to the picture we form of you.

Stay focused. Avoid common mistakes such as:

- Inappropriate use of humor.
- Creative writing (poems, scene setting, or clichés).
- Quotations—We want to know your thoughts and words, not someone else's.
- Generalities—Stick to facts and specifics you want us to know about yourself.
- Repetition—Do not talk about the same topic in each response. Give us new information we cannot find in other sections of the application.
- Lists of accomplishments or activities.
- Philosophy—Do describe your world in facts and examples.
 Don't ask questions without answers.
- Don't be campus specific. You're talking to all the UC campuses in your response.

ASSIST

(Articulation System Stimulating Interinstitutional Student Transfer)

ASSIST is the official course transfer and articulation system for public California colleges and universities. It provides the most accurate and up-to-date information on how credits earned at a California Community College transfer to a California State University (CSU) or University of California (UC) campus. Note: ASSIST also includes articulation agreements with some California private/independent four-year institutions.

**ASSIST is designed to help students and counselors work together to develop a clear transfer path. It is a valuable planning tool, but it should not replace meeting with a counselor for personalized guidance.

What You Can Do on ASSIST:

- Check Transferable Course Lists: Determine whether a particular course from any of California's 116 community colleges is transferable to a CSU or UC campus.
- **Review Major Agreements**: Identify CSU and UC courses for a specific major and find the equivalent community college courses that satisfy those lower-division major requirements.
- **Explore Majors:** Discover which CSU and UC campuses offer your intended major and any areas of emphasis listed for that program.

The California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) is the singular general education pathway for California Community College (CCC) students to fulfill lower-division general education requirements necessary for transfer and admission to both the California State University (CSU) and the University of California (UC). Completion of the Cal-GETC is not an admission requirement or admission guarantee for transfer to the CSU or UC, nor is it the only way to fulfill the lower-division general education requirements for students at the CSU or UC. However, Cal-GETC may be a requirement for some programs (e.g., if an ADT is required). Students may choose to complete coursework to meet the CSU or UC campus-specific breadth requirements of the university program to which they plan to transfer.

- All courses taken to meet Cal-GETC requirements must be completed with a grade of "C" or better. A grade of Credit or Pass may be used if the college's policy states it is equivalent to a grade of C or better.
- No more than 14 semester units (21 quarter units) of Pass/No Pass (Credit/No Credit), excluding credit by examination, may be used toward Cal-GETC certification
- Although courses may be listed in multiple general education areas (1-6), a course can be given credit in only one GE subject area.
- Courses from foreign institutions cannot be used for Cal-GETC certification, however, international courses can be evaluated at the receiving CSU or UC and applied to their campus-specific breadth requirements.

UC TAG Criteria:

- Complete 60 UC-transferable semester units by the end of the spring before you transfer (prior to fall admission).
- Have a least 30 UC-transferable units completed by the end of the summer before you submit your TAG.
- You can only submit a TAG to <u>ONE</u> of the six participating UC campuses.

Loyola Marymount University (LMU)

LMU TAG Criteria:

To qualify for guaranteed admission to LMU, students must:

- Meet the minimum Cumulative GPA for your major:
 - 3.25 Bellarmine College of Liberal Arts, College of Communications and Fine Arts, and College of Science and Engineering
 - 3.50 College of Business Administration
- Maintain full-time enrollment for two or more consecutive terms (e.g., Fall and Spring) with a minimum 3.0 GPA each semester.
- Complete a minimum of 30 transferable units, plus any additional major coursework required. Some programs require specific major preparation and GPA requirements (please check with a counselor).
- Note: All majors in the School of Film and Television are NOT eligible for TAG.

Arizona State University (ASU)

ASU TAG Criteria:

Admission to ASU is guaranteed if you meet $\underline{\text{one}}$ of the following conditions:

- Earn an Associate Degree with at least a 2.5 GPA.
- (OR) Have a high school diploma or GED <u>AND</u> a fully certified IGETC or CSU-GE with at least a 2.5 GPA.

How to Calculate your Transferable GPA

STEP 1–Obtain a copy of transcripts from all colleges attended; line out the classes that are not transferable (refer to the ECC catalog to find out what classes are transferable or go to the ASSIST website www.assist.org).

STEP 2– Add up the units attempted for each class and the grade points for those classes. Grade points are calculated by multiplying units attempted by the grade point value for the grade received in each class.

A = 4 points

B = 3 points

C = 2 points

D = 1 point

F = 0 points



STEP 3– Once you have added all the units attempted and the grade points, compute your GPA by dividing the number of grade points by units attempted.

Grade Points ÷ Units Attempted = GPA

Example:

<u>COURSE</u>	UNITS ATTEMPTED	<u>GRADE</u>	GRADE POINT
Psychology 101	3	A = 4	3x4 = 12
Business 151	4	F = 0	4x0 = 0
English C1000	4	B = 3	4x3 = 12
History 101	3	B = 3	3x3 = 9
Spanish 1	4	D = 1	4x1 = 4

Total: 18 (transferable units) 37 (grade points)

37 grade points ÷ 18 units attempted = 2.06 GPA

Note: F's are calculated into the GPA.

CR/NC and non-transferable courses and W's are not calculated into the GPA.

SCHOLARSHIPS

What is a scholarship?

A scholarship is an award of financial aid for a student to further their education. Scholarships are awarded on various criteria, which usually reflect the values and purposes of the donor or founder of the award. Scholarships are FREE MONEY!

What are the requirements?

Requirements vary from scholarship to scholarship. Most often requested materials are transcripts, letters of recommendation, essay, and/or verification of college enrollment.

Searching for Scholarships

Step 1: Build a toolkit before you start your searches:

- Prepare a detailed personal statement about yourself
- Prepare a cover letter and resume
- · Prepare a scholarship tracking worksheet

Step 2: Start scholarship search

- Visit the scholarship office at El Camino College located in the Administration Bldg., 1st Floor - Room 160
- Search within your community; contact community organizations.
- Use the Internet to find scholarship database websites; create a custom profile of yourself.


