A. Selection Process for Trustee Area One

- I. It is recommended that the Board of Trustees discuss and select candidates to be interviewed for Trustee Area One on December 13, 2010. The following process is suggested.
 - 1. Applications for the position of Trustee Area One were due to the Superintendent/President's Office by 4:00 p.m., Thursday, December 2, 2010.
 - 2. All applications were forwarded on December 3, 2010, to each Board member for review.
 - 3. "Trusteeship in a Nutshell" was provided to Board members on December 3, 2010, as a guide in evaluating each application.
 - 4. All applications were posted to the El Camino College website on December 3, 2010.
 - 5. The Board of Trustees will discuss and determine how many total applicants they recommend for interviews. Interviews will take place during the Regular Meeting of the Board on December 13, 2010.
 - 6. At the December 6, 2010 Special Meeting of the Board, each Board member will provide the names of the three candidates they recommend be invited to an interview on December 13 not ranked in priority order to the Superintendent/President on a card provided.
 - 7. All names submitted by the Board will be publicly announced once each Board member has submitted their three potential candidates.
 - 8. The Board members will determine which applicants will be invited for an interview.

B. Candidate Selection for Trustee Area One

- It is recommended that the Board of Trustees discuss and select the interview process for candidates for Trustee Area One. The following process is suggested.
 - 1. On December 7, 2010, all applicants selected for an interview will be notified and invited to the December 13, 2010 Board meeting, 4:00 p.m. in the Alondra Room.
 - 2. Each candidate will be given 1 minute for an introduction/opening statement; each candidate will be given 2 minutes to answer each prepared question a timekeeper will be present to notify candidates of their time limits
 - 3. Each Board member will prepare one question to be asked of the selected applicants on December 13 for the interviews. Each question will be provided to the Superintendent/President on cards. *
 - 4. Questions will rotate, so each candidate answers one questions first; and Board members will rotate asking prepared questions of the candidates.

^{*}If more than one question is similar, the Superintendent/President will work with Board members to develop a different question.

I think it's essential that Board members have access with the people they represent as well as possess a knowledge and immersion into the respective communities. My experience with students and schools from this area would be immensely beneficial to the Area 1 seat.

3. What is your understanding of the primary responsibilities of the Board; and how do you envision your role as one member of the Board?

The Board is the policy-forming body of the school and Board members, or Trustees, are legally obligated to place the best interest of their beneficiaries – in this case El Camino's Students, Faculty and Staff – above all else. I believe that though my work in science, engineering, job training, and education, I've developed a keen sense of community and a commitment to continue to work with a diverse group of students and faculty. I have vast experience teaming with colleagues, University faculty and strategic corporate partners towards the success of curriculum development, career guidance, funding identification, and Career & Technical Education (CTE). Since I have worked closely with many of El Camino's educational partners such as Compton College, CSU Dominguez Hills, and local high schools, I look forward to helping motivate students in STEM and CTE careers as they transfer into competitive bachelor's program.

4. What do you see as the major educational issues facing California community colleges in the next 3-5 years?

I believe the there will be many issues facing California community colleges in the next 3-5 years but the biggest will be the rising cost of education. California Colleges Universities are facing this right now as operating costs and limited student funding such as FAFSA or Pell, limits those who can afford to go to school.

5. What do you see as the major educational issues facing the communities of Inglewood and Ladera Heights in the next 3-5 years?

Besides having affordable and accessible education, I believe the major educational issue we will see in our community will be the quality of education available to our students — especially those in underserved pockets. I believe we will see lower socio-economic groups falling farther and farther behind academically as they leave High School affecting their ability to enroll in 4-year baccalaureate programs or employment. We need to make sure there is a bridge in place and established for students to cross between secondary and post-secondary education.

6. Who do you believe you will be representing if you are appointed to the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees?

In general, if appointed, I will represent all students, faculty and staff in the District, but more specifically, I will bring a voice to those constituents residing in Area 1. Because of El Camino's unique relationship with Compton College and partnership with CSU Dominguez Hills, it is the duty of the Board of Trustees to represent the best interest of those communities as well.

7. How would you ensure that all constituent groups – internal and external – have a voice in the governance of El Camino College?

First I would encourage constituents to attend Trustee Board meetings to voice their concerns directly to policy makers and also see first-hand the process of policy making and oversight. For issues that might take longer to understand and resolve, I would also ask interested parties to commit to helping the Trustees, Board, and College with specific challenges that face the school and district. Everyone should be able to reach out to their Trustee to communicate their concerns and be able to give their recommendations.

1. Please describe your understanding of the role of a California Community College District Trustee and explain why you are interested in serving as a Trustee for El Camino College.

I believe the role is similar to the role I played as a member of the Inglewood Unified School District Board of Education.

I attended numerous district events such as graduations, award/recognition ceremonies, elementary-middle and high school presentations/parades, ground breaking ceremonies, as a board member attended municipal events and parades, and made presentations at city townhall meetings.

I traveled to board education training conferences, interstate board conferences (Chicago, New Mexico, Florida), met with the Department of Education in Sacramento with the superintendent and the director regarding the child development center which the Department was to terminate if a particular budget issue was not resolved (it was).

I would report information to the Board and/or the superintendent of school events/meetings (i.e. PTSA, Measure K) that I attended and parents/students brought up district/school issues, informed parents, students, and community members of the role of board members and the roles of the superintendent and administration regarding district or school issues.

I participated in and attended all board meetings—brought information of interest to other members in closed and open sessions with the understanding that all student and employee issues are protected by the right-to-privacy and all closed session discussions and decisions are privileged.

A member of the board has a fiduciary duty to the parents, students, administration, employees, and the community at large and must understand, acknowledge, and accept that the power of the board comes into being when there is a quorum, that a quorum can not occur without a noticed meeting and agenda, that the "member" has the power of the vote to approve or not approve a properly noticed agenda item, and that the "individual" has no authority or power by having a position at the Board.

2. Briefly share your public service and involvement in the Trustee Area 1 (Inglewood and Ladera Heights) communities, and how this service would enhance your position as a member of the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees.

I have been very actively involved at all levels of community service in the city and the school district since 1999 to the present date as partially stated in the application. From the Inglewood Proposed Area Committee for the Redevelopment Agency to many city and district events/parades such as Cesar Chavez and Martin Luther King; Census Count Committees in 2000 and 2010; while serving on the Board responding to Ladera Heights residents application to the State to withdraw from the Inglewood Unified School District to the Culver City School District which I believe is in the appeal process because it was denied; bringing a non-profit, Parents for Unity, which gave about 12 sessions to Spanish and English speaking parents free of charge; made a presentation before the Ladera Heights Homeowners Association in 2009 to try to begin a dialogue between Inglewood and Ladera Heights residents; to the present service as a two-year term member of Crozier Middle School School Site Council to just name a few activities of involvement. I believe that my past service to the Inglewood

and Ladera Heights communities and in many cases their personal knowledge of me would enhance my position as a member of the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees.

3. What is your understanding of the primary responsibilities of the Board; and how do you envision your role as one member of the Board?

From my experience and understanding one of the primary responsibilities of the Board is to maintain the trust of those it serves (students, employees, the community at large); trust in that the Board acts in the best interest of all the parties involved in promoting El Camino's vision, mission, philosophy, values, and goals; committed to perform all duties and responsibilities in a prepared and timely manner; act in an honest and tempered manner knowing that it reflects upon the presence and reputation of the college and the community it serves; to communicate with a clear and sincere interest; to cooperate, respect, and value the roles of each and all board members, the administration, the students, the employees, and the community at large; and to understand the needs of each trustee area and how it relates to the needs of the whole in the decision making process. I envision my role as bringing people/parties of interest together and given my profession to resolve issues in a pragmatic manner balanced by what is in the best interest of all the parties involved in providing all the services at El Camino Community College.

4. What do you see as the major educational issues facing California community colleges in the next 3-5 years?

The major educational issues will be caused by the growth in student enrollment as reported in the Daily Breeze on November 21, 2010 and in the Los Angeles Times on November 22, 2010. The growth is fueled by the change in population demographics and increased tuition in the universities and four-year colleges. In my opinion the growth will also be fueled by the educational needs of our local high school students who seek to supplement high school courses that may not be offered at their school or seeking credit toward an AA degree with their high school diploma. The challenge will be to plan and prepare for that increase where possible in a cost effective and fair manner to build the necessary capacity to fulfill the El Camino Community College mission and services which is further complicated by the financial budget crisis in the state.

5. What do you see as the major educational issues facing the communities of Inglewood and Ladera Heights in the next 3-5 years?

The most serious issue in my opinion is the different and conflicting educational needs between Inglewood and Ladera Heights parents and students. Inglewood needs the economic funds/property taxes from Ladera Heights for the school district to exist. Ladera Heights educational needs at the middle and high school levels are not being met and they feel it will never be met given the present financial and academic state of the Inglewood School District. Ladera Heights parents send their children to private schools or outside the district at the middle and high school levels for the most part. La Tijera Elementary School was demolished and is in construction as a new school. The building of this school has been very controversial with the surrounding residents. Because local parents do not send their children to this school, it is populated by Inglewood students which are brought to the school by bus or their parents. The local residents fear that IUSD will bring in middle and high school students which the local residents prefer not to have around their properties. Inglewood students are about 60%+ Hispanic/Latino and Ladera Heights students are 90%+ African-American. Inglewood and Ladera Heights residents come from different educational-economic levels and cultural backgrounds. Therefore, there are educational, economic, social, and local residential issues affecting both communities. The solution I have offered is to change the manner in which school board members are elected from at-large to area such as the El Camino Board. In my opinion by Ladera Heights electing

it's own area representative it would have that community buy-in to and partner with the Inglewood community and in time build and improve a district that would service their needs.

6. Who do you believe you will be representing if you are appointed to the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees?

If I am appointed to the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees, I will be representing everyone described in 5 above which I have done when I served on the Inglewood Unified School District Board of Education. Many people do not understand that you cannot represent or act on the behalf of only one person/one group to the exclusion of everyone else. Fortunately, our educational system is not built that way, although, some may be trying to change that.

My parents are both from Mexico. I am bilingual in English and Spanish. I have lived in the City of Inglewood since 1968 and have practiced law in the city since 1985.

I believe that I am well known by the Hispanic/Latino and African-American communities in Inglewood. And given my participation and service in committees and events sponsored by the City of Inglewood, as a candidate for elective office, and as a former IUSD Board Member, I believe that I have a good and positive relationship with each community, the city, and school district officials.

7. How would you ensure that all constituent groups – internal and external – have a voice in the governance of El Camino College?

As a former board member of the Inglewood Unified School District, I found that it is not easy to give a "voice" to everyone at the same time. But it is possible, if it's one voice at a time. What is impossible is to meet everyone's expectations. Usually the expectation is based upon the belief that a board member has the "power" that he/she does not have.

The way that I ensured that all constituent groups at the Inglewood Unified School District as a board member had a voice was for me to "listen". Many times that is what it means or takes to give someone a "voice". I tried to respond to each "voice" by listening and explaining what a board member's role is to those that want their "voice" to be heard. In response I usually directed those "voices" to the appropriate persons or department with the power to resolve their issue. I tried to follow up on any referrals to be informed of the status of that referral. Many times it was a matter of helping that "voice" to determine what the "real" issue was and sometimes they found the answer.

In some circumstances I tried to explain that we have to understand the process and work within it, but if that is not satisfactory, then we must work within the system to make the necessary changes or reforms to reach the proper or preferred outcome.

1. Please describe your understanding of the role of a California Community College District Trustee and explain why you are interested in serving as a Trustee for El Camino College.

It is my understanding that the role of a California Community College District Trustee is to develop, oversee, and evaluate educational policies that are implemented by the administration. This includes budget planning and approval and the selection and evaluation of the Chief Executive Officer of the District. I will be working with the administration, fellow Trustees, faculty, staff, community members and the Citizen's Bond Oversight Committee to support and improve student success at the college. Moreover, as an elected official I would represent the community member's within the District and bring forth any issues they have regarding the higher education at the college.

I am interested in serving as a Trustee for El Camino College in order to actively participate in creating and implementing policy for El Camino College that assures El Camino College continues to provide a quality higher education for the people residing in Trustee Area 1.

2. Briefly share your public service and involvement in the Trustee Area 1 (Inglewood and Ladera Heights) communities, and how this service would enhance your position as a member of the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees.

The last two years I have actively participated in the Inglewood and Ladera Heights Communities. I am currently a rommissioner on the Housing Authority Commission and the Blue Ribbon Police Commission, and I am a graduate of the Inglewood Community Police Academy. In April 2009 I was appointed to serve on the Inglewood Housing Authority Commission. My responsibilities as a commissioner are to know the current rules and guidelines provided by the US Housing & Urban Development (HUD), attend the Housing Authority Commission Hearings once a month in which the entire commission is presented with individual cases of current Section 8 participants which have been proposed to be terminated from the program. The Commission must deliberate in these hearings and render final decisions. When the commission decides to terminate the participant, there is a monetary amount that must be repaid to the Inglewood Housing Authority which must be collected by the city. I enjoy serving on this commission because it is a way to positively enhance our community.

This past January I benefited by participating in a 10 week Community Police Academy that gave me an overview of the entire Inglewood Police Department. I learned more about the internal structure of the department; from the Police Chief to a patrol officer, from civilian employees and sworn police officers to the difference between Vice and Narcotics in addition to everyone's role in the department. The Academy allowed me to understand the department's leadership, structure, policies, and budget. By participating in the Academy, I realized that my role as a resident is much bigger than I thought when it comes to working and/or cooperating with the police department. What I learned in the Academy will help me immensely on the Blue Ribbon Police Commission.

Not only am I involved with the City of Inglewood, but also at my church. I am currently a Confirmation Catechist at St. John Chrysostom where I work with high school students once a week.

As a Trustee, I am representing everyone in the District. I must work collaboratively with fellow Trustees, College President, Citizen's Bond Oversight Committee Students, Faculty, Staff, and represent El Camino College. I feel that my service and participation in the Inglewood Housing Authority Commission and Inglewood Community Police Academy has prepared me with the experience and skill set that will enhance my position as a member of the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustee. I understand the role of the Board of Trustees in setting policy and evaluating how

policy is impacting the community. I am familiar with budget planning, financial forecasting, and the need to insure that the college is always on sound financial footing. I know how to integrate the needs of the residents into the educational planning of the college to sustain high quality programs and promote student success (e.g. completion and graduation of egrees and certificates).

3. What is your understanding of the primary responsibilities of the Board; and how do you envision your role as one member of the Board?

My understanding of the primary responsibilities of the Board is to develop, oversee, and evaluate policy. Secondly, is to monitor the short term and long term growth, success, and sustainability of El Camino College in accordance to the College's Master Plan and improve student success.

My role as a Board Member will be to help create, set and evaluate policy, monitor the attainment of the goals of the College Master Plan, and the State Wide Master Plan in accordance to Title V. Secondly, my role is to create a bridge and a partnership between the College and the community. We must recognize that the community is an integral part to the College's economic vitality because it is the homeowners that allow them to be taxed for education Bonds. Therefore, it is my responsibility as a board member to maintain the good will of the community at all times. And for those partnerships that already exist, it will be my role to build them and make them stronger. Thirdly, I envision myself making difficult decisions when it comes to the budget and policy of the College.

4. What do you see as the major educational issues facing California community colleges in the next 3-5 years?

I see college fees going up and a high demand of attendance as the major educational issues facing California community colleges in the next 3-5 years. This year we have seen the Cal State and UC systems both drop "student fees" and replaced it with "tuition". Many students fear that this will result in higher tuition to attend UC and the CSU. As a result of the increase in tuition for CSU and UC schools, Community Colleges will see a rise in enrollment. This will create a rajor challenge at El Camino because the College has to be mindful of not raising the cost of \$26 per unit to a price that will not be affordable to the residents of District 1. Moreover, drastically raising the cost to attend El Camino College may affect the availability of financial aid, which we know is already utilized by more than 50% of the students currently attending El Camino College...

Another major challenge for Community Colleges is that many of the students attending are not prepared to enter into college level mathematics and English. Many Colleges are spending additional resources for programs which help students in math and writing and often times courses in other areas (e.g. drama, art) have to be eliminated to provide sufficient pre-collegiate English and mathematics courses. This means that we have to look at our high schools and seek solutions to get the students ready to take college English and mathematics courses. This can be done by the College providing college level English and mathematics at the high schools and/or getting high school students to concurrently enroll in college level English and mathematics classes while they are still attending high school. In any event strong partnerships with K-12 to improve student academic preparation is an absolute requirement for student success.

5. What do you see as the major educational issues facing the communities of Inglewood and Ladera Heights in the next 3-5 years?

I see funding as a major educational issue facing the communities of Inglewood and Ladera Heights. Currently, with the increase of Charter schools in the community, schools are competing for the same children to attend public or charter school. The long term effect is that public schools are losing more funding and teachers, staff, school programs are being cut while we are still seeing the lack of student educational progress. In the end we are still facing the question of how to solve the lack of academic achievement of our students. One way is for everyone to forge partnerships, public, charter, and private schools, to create a master plan to improve the academic achievement of our students.

6. Who do you believe you will be representing if you are appointed to the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees?

If I am appointed to the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees not only will I represent my district, but also the dreams and aspirations of all the families attending El Camino College.

7. How would you ensure that all constituent groups – internal and external – have a voice in the governance of El Camino College?

would ensure that all constituent groups, internal and external, have a voice in the governance of El Camino by listening to their concerns, questions, and suggestions, and have as much transparency as possible. Together with the Administration, we can have town hall meetings, open forums, or even a questionnaire on the website in which we can have an open dialogue with the community.

For many today, and in the future, cutbacks and rising costs take what was once within reach and moves it beyond their grasp. The annual cost of attending a community college today is almost, if not more than, equal to the annual cost of attending a Cal State university 18 years ago.

5. What do you see as the major educational issues facing the communities of Inglewood and Ladera Heights in the next 3-5 years?

The major educational issues I see facing the communities of Inglewood and Ladera Heights in the next 3-5 years are adequately funded elementary and secondary schools which can adversely impact student achievement gains. I see the disparity in high school graduation rates in these communities compared to other communities which will affect the number of minorities attending college. Finally, with the presence of high stakes testing and NCLB, I see less of am emphasis to prepare students for post secondary school and more of an emphasis to prepare them to pass an exam. Because of this there has been an absence of elective classes and services exposing students to the possibilities of college.

6. Who do you believe you will be representing if you are appointed to the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees?

I believe I will be representing the members of the encompassing communities of Area 1. This includes all members of the family as I would want all members of the family to have the experience of attending college. It is not only children who can attend college. Many parents return to school to either complete or further their own education. I will also represent present students of colleges in the El Camino district.

Per my understanding, the primary role of the California Community College District Trustee are six-fold: 1) to set district policy and direction; 2) oversee college operations, ensuring compliance with legal, ethical and superior educational standards; 3) community liaison supporting consistent dialogue between the district and its students, residents, businesses and other stakeholders; 4) provides fiscal oversight and assures financial health of the district; 5) monitors institutional performance and play an active role in ensuring that an environment supporting academic excellence is created and sustained; and 6) be a visionary, consistently looking for growth opportunities and chances for institutional improvement.

I am interested in serving as a Trustee for El Camino College because I'm committed to the success of El Camino College, one of our community's greatest educational institutions. Education is the biggest civil rights issue of our day. Education is also the "great equalizer". Continued educational disparities in underserved and communities of color will not only have negative impacts on persons in these communities, but will have detrimental effects on our nation as we seek to compete in the global economy. Community colleges have always played a critical role in preparing students for careers and/or continued education at four-year universities. I believe that I bring skills and perspective that will prove valuable to El Camino College if selected.

I bring the perspective of a community and economic development professional. I understand the connection between community colleges and growing industries and the importance of ensure that we are training students for jobs of the future. I also recognize the direct correlation between an educated citizenry and the uplift of in the quality of life in low-income communities. I look forward to using my experience in facilitating linkages between industry, El Camino and our community. I also bring the perspective of a parent of three children in elementary, middle and high school in Inglewood. I'm actively engage at all three campuses as well as with members of the Inglewood Unified School District. I have a vested interest in seeing that students from Inglewood receive the best education possible.

2. Briefly share your public service and involvement in the Trustee Area 1 (Inglewood and Ladera Heights) communities, and how this service would enhance your position as a member of the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees.

I bring more than twenty years on nonprofit and community development experience. My entire adult career has been dedicated to improving the quality of life in underserved communities. I have expertise in developing and implementing youth, community and economic development programs, community technology initiatives, health and human service programs and affordable housing and child care facility development. I have been successful in raising more than \$13 million for various nonprofits in South Los Angeles, including Inglewood nonprofits.

My family purchased a home in Inglewood ten years ago and I have continued to work diligently in the community. I am the founder and Executive Director of Arts and Minds, Inc., a nonprofit with the mission of improving the quality of education in Inglewood and surrounding communities via engaging academic activities, building linkages with growth industries and by assess public policies that act as an impediment to students in underserved communities receiving the best education possible. I have built a strong collaborative relationship with schools within the district as well as with IUSD board members.

I also work closely with Mayor Daniel Tabor of the City of Inglewood as a Community Education Advisor. We are currently collaborating with local utilities, schools (including El Camino College), and businesses on a Youth Energy Conservation program wherein local youth will be trained to conduct home and small business energy audits. The program goals are to introduce students to the growing "green" industry, provide an opportunity to increase the number of elective classes offered at Inglewood high schools (ultimately offering college units), while helping the city meet its conservation goals. Arts and Minds, Inc. has also brought a robotics/remotely operated vehicle (ROV) team to Monroe Magnet Middle school My work with the Mayor has focused primarily on finding innovative strategies for linking schools, industry and community. My goal is to support excellence in Inglewood schools and to ensure that our students receive a top-notch education. I am confident that my partnership with the Mayor and IUSD schools will prove beneficial and will enhance my position as a member of the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees.

3. What is your understanding of the primary responsibilities of the Board; and how do you envision your role as one member of the Board?

It is my understanding that the primary responsibilities of the Board are to set policy, oversee college operations, assure fiscal health and act as a bridge between the college and the community. As a board member, I would approach the job as I have with all of my endeavors. I will be professional, diligent, fair, thoughtful, deliberate, and forward thinking. I will work collaboratively with other board members, while insuring that the particular needs of the residents of District 1 are voiced and addressed. I will work hard to advocate for and give voice to those who are traditionally underrepresented in higher education.

4. What do you see as the major educational issues facing California community colleges in the next 3-5 years?

The major educational issues facing California community colleges in the next 3-5 years would include continued decreases in funding as a result of the State of California budget crisis, ensuring that we are preparing students for 21st century careers and addressing the growing educational disparities and lack of access to living wage career paths for students in under-performing schools.

With a State budget deficit nearing \$20 billion, it is probable that California community colleges, as well as all educational institutions, will continue to face cuts and/or tuition increases. Cuts will require a paradigm shift and an investigation of innovative strategies for funding education. This could include increasing partnerships with corporations support workforce development, bridge programs with high schools and other methods to maximize existing resources.

It is estimated more than 70% of future jobs will require math, science and/or technology skills. El Camino College has done a great job remaining cutting edge and relevant in a consistently changing educational environment. It is important that the community colleges keep a "finger on the pulse" of the rapidly changing world economy by maintaining strong ties to growth industries to ensure that students are being prepared for the jobs of tomorrow, and not receiving training for obsolete positions.

Finally, community colleges must be positioned to respond to the needs of diverse students with varying educational foundations. Community colleges are frequently regarded as a first step toward a career path and the students entering range from individuals on track to transfer to a four-year university to displaced workers looking to be trained for a new career to those with build a career upon a shaky educational foundation. This versatility is where I believe that community colleges derive much of its strength.

5. What do you see as the major educational issues facing the communities of Inglewood and Ladera Heights in the next 3-5 years?

The major educational issues facing Inglewood and Ladera and similar to those faced by most school districts: cuts in educational funding, high drop-out rates and preparing students for the 21st century economy.

Inglewood Unified School Districts budget problems are exacerbated by the hemorrhaging of students entering middle and high school as a result of underperforming schools. Parents are pleased with the elementary schools, however they frequently remove their students upon entering secondary schools. One solution is to improve the quality of the middle and high schools by building upon successful programs (i.e MESA) and learning from best practices in comparable districts across the state and nation.

Finally, the high drop-out rate could be addressed by making the education practical and relevant for the students. Schools with more than one track to success seem to perform best. Schools must provide options to students with different life circumstances (i.e. half day programs for students who need to work to help support their families, bridge programs with local community colleges to allow student to receive their high school diploma and AA degree simultaneously, etc.) Furthermore, tracks leading to growth industries and living wage will help to encourage students to remain in schools. Community colleges can play a key role in improving and impacting K-12 education.

6. Who do you believe you will be representing if you are appointed to the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees?

If appointed I would be representing the residents of the City of Inglewood and Ladera. Not homogenous communities, this would mean that I would be representing individuals for various races, ethnicities, educational background and social standing. My obligation is to represent all the people in my community, while strongly providing a voice to those who have historically be voiceless in the higher education discussion.

7. How would you ensure that all constituent groups – internal and external – have a voice in the governance of El Camino College?

I would ensure that all groups have a voice in the governance of El Camino College by listening well, creating an environment where input is encouraged and respected and acting in good faith to respond to the needs of all constituencies.
