Dear Members of the Board:

Welcome to the mid-summer, Thursday, August 19, 2010, 4 p.m. Board meeting packet. Those of you who have remained in town realize summer has yet to start. We can be assured the warm weather will start by Monday, August 30th—the first day of classes.

The Board agenda includes various items necessary for the start of the fall 2010 semester and is highlighted by the following:

- 1. Academic Affairs includes a request for Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement (MESA) students to attend the Society for Advancement of Chicanos and Native Americans in Science conference in Anaheim, California.
- 2. Student And Community Advancement includes an item requesting approval for two Student and Community Advancement employees to travel to Hong Kong, as part of the Green Export Enabler Program. According to the Green Export Enabler Program (GEEP) and Market Development Cooperator Program (MDCP) Grant, the Center for International Trade Development (CITD) is required specifically to participate in trade shows to China as part of the GEEP/MDCP Grant Application of June 2009. The Commerce Department selected the Eco Expo Asia show in Hong Kong this year for the CITD's participation. Bronwen Madden and Kerry Bonner will deliver GEEP promotional and matchmaking services during the Asia show.
- 3. Student and Community Advancement also presents a Timeline for Accreditation activities during 2010-2011 for your information.
- 4. Administrative Services presents the Quarterly Fiscal Status Report and Notice of Public Hearing for the 2010-2011 Budget and projected adoption of the Budget at our September 7, 2010 Board meeting.
- 5. Administrative Services, Measure E Bond Fund, includes a contract with tBP Architecture to design and construct the Shops building replacement. You will note several change orders as the Humanities Plaza, Phase 3 Infrastructure, and Bookstore projects are being completed. For more information regarding the Change Order presented in Item G, please see memo from Vice President Higdon to me.

- 6. Human Resources presents routine personnel changes including revised classified job descriptions.
- 7. The Superintendent President's section includes recommendation that the Board excuse Trustee Jackson from the July 19, 2010 Board meeting and an information item outlining steps to Accreditation.

There will be no closed session.

Unfortunately, the California State Budget has not been approved by the Legislature, therefore, our final budget will be based on educated guesses. On the date of our Board meeting, August 19th, I will join the Planning and Budgeting Committee in analyzing our September 7th Final Budget recommendation to you.

In response to a question raised at the last Board meeting, enclosed is a letter from Francisco Arce to Mr. Victor Coutin regarding Course Offering Reduction in the Fine Arts Division.

Memo from Claudia Lee to Francisco Arce dated August 11, 2010, gives an update on the Inglewood City Honors Program.

Also enclosed is a letter from Judith L. Smith, Vice Provost for Undergraduate Education, University of California, Los Angeles, dated July 20, 2010, regarding students transferring from El Camino College.

The purpose of this document is to provide additional information related to the above change order.

The four-level Math Business Health Sciences building is under construction on the site of the old Business building. The design of the foundation system was based in part on a soils report prepared by Koury Engineering. Soil borings were made around the perimeter of the old building which was in place at that time. One of the factors evaluated was the expansiveness of the soil, which is the amount the soil would expand or contract in volume depending upon moisture content.

One of the necessary steps to prepare for placement of the foundation system is the excavation and compacting of the existing soil in an area five feet outside the building footprint and five feet below the lowest point of the foundation. During this process it was discovered the existing soil was substantially more expansive than previously known. Three alternatives were available to address this problem; modification of the foundation system, mixing sand with and drying the existing soil or removing the existing soil and replacing with less expansive.

Modifying the foundation system would have required resubmission of the design to the Division of the State Architect delaying construction indefinitely. Three major negatives would be associated with choosing this alternative. One, the District would have been exposed to an expensive delay claim by the contractor. Two, the cost of modifying the foundation system would still need to be negotiated through the change order process. And finally the occupancy of the building would be postponed.

The alternative of amending and drying the existing soil also has notable negatives associated with it also. Due to the large volume of soil that would require treatment, an

area larger than the construction site would be needed, the results would have be difficult to predict and an extended time would be required to perform the treatment. Again the District would be exposed to a delay claim and the cost would be subject to the change order process.

Due to the drawbacks of the other two alternatives, removing and replacing the existing soil was judged to be the less costly alternative and in terms of schedule the most expeditious.

Accomplishing the chosen alternative required removing and importing 2,897 truckloads of soil, totaling 40,390 cubic yards of soil (a cubic yard is 3' feet in width, 3' feet in length and 3' in height).

The cost for this added work was negotiated to be \$410,801 and it was agreed to add ten days to the construction schedule.

Subject: Course Offering Reduction

In response to your inquiry regarding El Camino College's music course reductions in Fall 2010, the course offerings were reduced by 14 sections in fall 2010 compared to what was offered in fall 2009. The percentage of reductions to the music program was appropriate and will continue until such time when the State budget is increased to fund enrollment growth. Overall, the fall 2010 schedule was reduced by 297 course sections. The class schedule was reduced overall in response to State budget cuts and ECC's unfunded above cap enrollment.

It is unfortunate that State budget cuts are negatively impacting students and making it more difficult for them to complete their educational plans. While the situation is not unique to El Camino College, it can be difficult for students and community members to understand the necessary reductions, especially when they have been accustomed to plentiful course offerings in the past.

Please be assured that careful consideration is given when building a class schedule, including the efficiency and cost of the schedule. The El Camino College class schedule is first and foremost designed to meet students' educational needs.

Attached for your information, is a list of the music courses offered in fall 2008, fall 2009 and fall 2010.
