



The charter of the El Camino Community College District Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee is to inform the public concerning bond revenue expenditures and to actively "review and report" on the expenditure of these funds. Our committee comprises a cross section of the citizenry who have volunteered their time to represent various constituencies, and fulfill the responsibilities listed above.

During this eighth year of existence, our committee has met on a regular basis; reviewing expenditures, touring campus renovations, asking questions, and expressing our concerns and recommendations. This Annual Report of the El Camino Community College District Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee documents the results of these activities and serves to fulfill the basic tenets of our charter.

Within this report are the agendas and minutes of our open public meetings, as well as the independent audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010, performed by the firm of Vicenti Lloyd Stutzman LLP. Our committee examined and reviewed this audit, the results of which are contained herein.

Year Eight Commentary

July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010

During the eighth year of El Camino College's facilities master plan work, the college completed several new substantial projects, began the design phase of many more, and continued construction on others. Funding for this work has come from 2003 Series A, 2005 Series A refinance, and the 2006 Series B issuance. In addition \$1,403,317 of interest was earned during the fiscal year.

Milestones:

- Numerous safety and security upgrades continued throughout the year, at various locations
 around campus. Installation of high resolution video surveillance cameras and design of
 parking lighting improvements were implemented to enhance the safety of our campus.
- Construction began for a new four-story, 100,000-square-foot Math, Business & Health Sciences Building. Occupancy is planned for the Spring 2012 semester.
- Construction began to modernize the **Social Sciences Building.** Occupancy is planned for the Fall 2011 semester.
- Campuswide hardscape and landscape design began.
- Cooling upgrades were completed for the Math/Computer Science Computer Room.
- Construction continued on the Bookstore/Cafeteria building modernization project.
- Construction continued on the college's infrastructure modernization project.
- The **Humanities Mall Landscaping** and **Food Service Venue** project was completed and the facility opened for operation.

The process of updating the Facilities Master Plan began in March 2009. The new 2010 Facilities Master Plan was adopted by the Board of Trustees at its June 21, 2010 meeting. The plan features the construction of four new facilities: (1) Shops Building Replacement (2) Stadium & Track Replacement (3) Student Services Building Replacement and (4) New Parking Structure. Also included is the complete renovation of the current Math/Computer Science Building. The plan was developed in conjunction with the Educational Master Plan. Both of these plans are components of the District's Comprehensive Plan, which also includes plans for human resources and technology.

Challenge:


A continuing challenge is minimizing the disruption to campus programs and operations stemming from the large amount of construction activities.



General Obligation Bond Fund Expenditures Year 2009 – 2010 (by Type)



















General Obligation Bond Fund Expenditures Year 2009 – 2010 (by Category)








Health & Safety Improvements – \$10,886,585






Campus Site Improvements – \$269,443

General Obligation Bond Fund Expenditures Year 2002 – 2010 (by Type)













General Obligation Bond Fund Expenditures Year 2002 – 2010 (by Category)











Site Improvements - \$28,917,033

Continuing Disclosure Certificate

The Continuing Disclosure Certificate is executed and delivered by the El Camino Community College District in connection with issuance of \$63,700,000 General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2002, Series 2003A, \$40,252,335 in Refunding Bonds issued in 2005, and \$150,000,000 General Obligation Bonds, Series 2003B issued in 2006.

The Bonds are issued pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County adopted on February 11, 2003. The District Resolution and the County Resolution are heretofore referred to as the Resolution. 


Declaration of Indefinite Salaries for Retroactive Pay

California Constitution, Article 11, Section 10 prohibits officers or employees from receiving additional compensation for services already rendered. Courts have generally allowed retroactive pay within the constitution only if salaries were legally "indefinite."

Governing boards of community college districts can take action to provide for salary increases to certificated, unrepresented and management employees and classified, unrepresented and management and confidential employees retroactive to the beginning of the fiscal year only if they have passed a resolution declaring such salaries to be indefinite before the beginning of the current fiscal year. For this purpose, salaries must be declared indefinite prior to June 30 of the previous fiscal year.

Salaries for bargaining unit-represented employees automatically become indefinite upon expiration of a collective bargaining agreement. All of our bargaining agreements expired on or before June 30, 2010. It is not necessary for the board to take an action to declare salaries indefinite for these represented employees.

The board item presented as item C in the Human Resources Section of the Board Agenda, reflects the suggested language provided to us by Los Angeles County Office of Education and is one used previously by El Camino Community College District.

SUBJECT: Biennial Governing Board Member Elections, November 8, 2011

Pursuant to Education Code (EC) §5000, elections will be held on November 8, 2011, to elect members to the governing boards in most school and community college districts in Los Angeles County. A blanket "Order of Election," which will cover all governing board elections held on this date, will be issued by this office and transmitted to the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk (Registrar-Recorder). Governing boards of districts scheduled to hold elections on this date are required to take action to initiate the regular biennial governing board election by adopting the attached resolution (Attachment 1). In accordance with EC §5340, such governing board elections are required to be consolidated.

Most districts whose board elections are governed by a city charter calling for elections on dates other than November 8, 2011, will be working directly with their City Clerks. In turn, many of the City Clerks will request the Registrar-Recorder to perform some of the required procedures. Therefore, early contact with the appropriate City Clerk is essential. Those districts with an election set by a city charter and that is handled by the Registrar-Recorder are asked to have their governing boards order the election for the date set forth in their charters. The order is to be sent directly to this office 130 days before the election; we will transmit a copy to the Registrar-Recorder. Please refer to the attachment titled "Governing Board Member Elections - Districts Under City Charters" (Attachment 2) for the prescribed election date for your district.

For your information, we have also included a copy of the most recent (as of the date of this bulletin) "2011 Scheduled Elections," from the Registrar-Recorder's office (Attachment 3).

Please review the membership of your district's governing board carefully and construct the election resolutions accordingly, paying attention to the number of seats up for election and the terms of current board members. Our office will forward the information concerning your district's governing board to the Registrar-Recorder based on the 2010 Governing Board Information submitted to this office by districts.



Attached please find the "ECC Academic Senate Guidelines for Budget Cuts and Reductions on the Torrance Campus" for inclusion in the supplemental Board meeting information for the April 18, 2011 meeting of the Board of Trustees. These guidelines were voted on and approved by the Academic Senate on Tuesday, April 5.

Given the severe budget crisis facing the state of California and the uncertainty of Community College funding over the next 3 years, the ECC Academic Senate understands the need to make tough choices about deep cuts across campus that will negatively impact faculty, students, staff and facilities.

The Academic Senate Guidelines stress that the depth of the budget crisis and the severe impact on students demand that the process be characterized by transparency, collegial consultation and strategic decision-making guided by data and evidence. The document also stresses the importance of preserving, to the extent possible, our core missions in transfer, degrees, certificates and Basic Skills.

I encourage you to carefully read the attached document.

ECC Academic Senate Guidelines for Budget Cuts and Reductions on the Torrance Campus

Given the severe budget crisis facing the state of California and the uncertainty of Community College funding over the next 3 years, the ECC Academic Senate understands the need to make tough choices about deep cuts across campus that will negatively impact faculty, students, staff and facilities.

ECC must avoid the appearance and/or reality that the urgency of budget cuts is being used to circumvent processes and collegial consultation on campus. The depth of the budget crisis and its severe impact especially demands a public and very careful decision-making process.

Budget cuts and reductions must be made in a transparent and strategic way that will:

- 1. Minimize the detrimental impact on students.
- 2. Abide by the collegial consultation process and adhere to agreed-upon Academic Procedures.
- 3. Carefully adhere to Board Policies, thereby respecting the wishes of the ECC Board of Trustees.
- 4. Provide sufficient data and evidence that published guidelines and principles are being followed.
- Respect the budgeting and planning processes on campus that were required for accreditation by the ACCJC and provide evidence of the cost savings of suggests cuts.
- 6. Abide by the terms of the ECCFT contract and negotiable items.

In the interests of full transparency and collegial consultation, recommendations for cuts and reductions need to directly explain whether the cut/reduction is intended to be permanent or temporary and to what extent restoration is guaranteed or intended. Possible contingencies may be described to clarify the intention.¹

¹ Consistent use of language is necessary to clarify the intention of cuts/reductions. The Academic Senate asserts that the following terms imply temporary cuts/reductions and the intent to restore the items under discussion once the budget recovers: freeze, suspend, temporary cut, cancel and temporary reduction. On the other hand, discontinue, permanent cut and permanent reduction imply the intent not to restore the items under discussion once the budget recovers. Efforts should be made to avoid using vague language like "cut" and "reduction" without explaining whether the intention is permanent or temporary.

Additional Guidelines for Courses and Programs on the Torrance Campus

The Academic Senate agrees with campus administrators and the Planning and Budgeting Committee that "the college cannot continue to operate with the same number of class sections, programs and services that currently exist." As reductions necessarily occur throughout academic programs, the college should seek to preserve the core missions of the California Community Colleges and El Camino College while giving high priority to maintaining or increasing student success and minimizing the detrimental impact on students.³

In addition to the general guidelines on the previous page, the Academic Senate recommends that decisions regarding budget cuts to courses and programs:

- Focus on helping students complete their stated academic goals, by preserving instructional support services and courses that meet degree and transfer requirements and certificate requirements in career and technical education.
- Preserve, to the extent possible, courses needed for transfer to CSU and UC, particularly those that can meet multiple requirements in General Education and majors.
- 3. Continue to offer Basic Skills courses in reading, writing, math, study skills and ESL as we are able.

Decisions regarding section reductions should be based on data evidence of student needs, drawn from sources such as educational plans, historical degree and certificate patterns, and transfer rates. Future efforts should be made to align scheduling closely with student stated course needs in educational plans. Students should be encouraged to develop and follow educational plans and to declare a major as soon as possible.

³ The California Community Colleges mission encompasses transfer, Basic Skills, economic and workforce development, lifelong learning, and associate degrees and certificates. The mission of El Camino College is to offer "quality, comprehensive educational programs and services to ensure the educational success of students from our diverse community."

Additional Recommendations

- Preserve Study Abroad courses because of the unique and high impact experiences they offer to students who may have few other chances to travel abroad.
- Maintain winter session course sections because winter is the session/semester with
 the highest success and retention rates and provides opportunities for students to
 complete transfer requirements for the upcoming fall. The budgetary savings of
 eliminating winter is minimal and the administrative benefits of flexible scheduling do
 not offset the negative academic impact on students. Maintaining winter session
 would respect the wishes of students and faculty as expressed in the "Winter Session
 Resolution" passed by the Associated Students Organization, the Academic Senate
 and the Federation of Teachers.
- Clarify the difference between suspended and discontinued courses and programs, by keeping them in the college catalogue with a notation that the course or program is temporarily suspended due to budgetary considerations.

El CAMINO COLLEGE PARTNERS WITH HISTORICALLY BLACK COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

A California Community Counselor has developed an initiative that can dramatically simplify the admissions process for hundreds and potentially thousands of California Community College students seeking transfer to Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). The initiative takes the form of Transfer agreements modeled after the agreements that have been successfully forged between California Community Colleges and University of California and California State Universities. These agreements have assisted thousands of students transferring to Universities within the state.

Transfer agreements have been developed between with El Camino College in Torrance, California and six Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). These agreements will help increase the transfer pipeline and simplify the transfer process for California Community College students. The established Transfer Admissions agreements are with Johnson C. Smith in North Carolina, Morehouse College, Spelman College and Clark Atlanta University in Atlanta, Georgia, Hampton University in Hampton, Virginia and Howard University in Washington, D. C. The agreements signed by college and university presidents and provosts, specify the number of transfer units and grade point averages required for admissions. Some of the schools also offer priority consideration for housing and transfer scholarships. In addition, Hampton University and Johnson C. Smith University will waive application fees. The agreement is specific to each HBCU.

President Obama's administration granted HBCUs and Hispanic Serving Institutions \$2.55 billion over the next decade. They have also been given the mandate to increase enrollment and ultimately graduation. Because of the high number of students attending Community Colleges in California, agreements are very timely. In addition, many of the HBCUs have very high percentages of students from the state of California.

Several other universities have expressed interest in developing agreements. These institutions include Talladega, Albany State, Grambling State, Virginia State and Southern Universities.

Elaine Moore, an El Camino College counselor who spearheaded this project as part of her spring 2010 sabbatical, would like to see the work that has been accomplished with El Camino College expanded to other interested Community Colleges. Currently Elaine is working with three Community Colleges in Northern California to develop similar agreements with HBCUs.

Intersegmental Advocacy Day

On Tuesday, April 5, El Camino College participated with representatives from UCLA, CSU Long Beach and Dominquez Hills, and Long Beach City College for the second annual "Intersegmental Advocacy Day" in Sacramento.

We met with Assembly members Furutani, Mendoza, Bradford, and Bonnie Lowenthal; Senators Alan Lowenthal and Rod Wright. We also met with staff members from Assembly member Hall and Butler's offices; and a staffer from Senator Lieu's office.

During every visit we were told to plan for the worst possible scenario, but to hope that it is slightly better than an "all-cuts budget". We were also encouraged to continue contacting our legislative representatives, and to encourage our students to share their concerns and difficulties in completing a college education with legislative offices and the Governor.

The attached document is the handout distributed to each legislative office we visited. It includes proposed budget reductions for all five colleges and universities from our advocacy group.

California State University Long Beach

Assuming a \$500 million cut to the CSU and Tax Packages Passes:

- \$34 million state appropriation reduction
- 2,800 classes eliminated; 6,600 students affected; and potential effect on 265 staff
- Equivalent to eliminating two (of seven) medium size academic colleges (Business, Education, or Engineering) or the equivalent of eliminating the Library, academic advising, admissions and enrollment services, facilities management, half of the student affairs division which includes student health services, disabled student services, counseling and psychological services, and career development.

Assuming a \$1 billion cut scenario - Tax Package Does Not Pass:

- \$68 million state appropriation reduction
- 5,600 classes eliminated; 13,300 students affected; and potential effect on 535 staff
- Equivalent to eliminating four (of seven) academic colleges (all three above plus half of the College of Arts) or the equivalent of eliminating essentially all administrative departments.

California State University, Dominguez Hills

Assuming a \$500 million cut to the CSU and Tax Package Passes:

- The anticipated reduction to CSUDH with this cut will be approximately \$10 million.
- The challenge, after several years of reductions, is that the options for additional reductions are shrinking. Difficult decisions have already been made with a hiring freeze, the consolidation of services within the University, and other cost saving measures.

Assuming a \$1 billion cut scenario - Tax Package Does Not Pass:

- With an additional \$500 million cut to the CSU, all options would be considered to address a shortfall of this magnitude.
- It is estimated that this additional cut would mean a reduction of approximately \$20 million to CSU Dominguez Hills. The magnitude of this budget reduction will have a serious impact on student support services, course sections and enrollment. All scenarios will have a negative impact on our university.









IMPACT -- Cuts in access to thousands of students who seek a college education; increases in time to degree and cost for students that are enrolled; and loss of investments that would have met future job creation, work force development; technology innovation, and direct economic revival and incubation of emerging private business.

El Camino Community College

ECC cuts in scenario where tax package passes and Prop 98 is intact:

- Amount of funds cut by state: \$7 million
- Number of class sections cut: 195
- No layoffs, but 10 full-time faculty positions will remain vacant; six classified positions will remain vacant and all 5 current management vacancies will remain vacant
- Full-time equivalent students (FTES) funded will be 18,005 (2010-11 FTES funded is 19,400 in 2009-10 it was 20,533 and for 2008-09 it was 21,359).

ECC cuts in scenario where tax package does not pass and Prop 98 is suspended (Worse Case Scenario):

- Amount of funds cut by state: \$17.5 million
- Number of class sections cut: 681
- Possible furloughs also: 24 full-time faculty positions will remain vacant (currently vacant faculty positions due to retirements will remain closed), 17 classified positions will remain vacant, and the 5 management positions will remain vacant
- FTES funded will be 16,005

Long Beach City College

Assuming tax package passes and Prop 98 is intact:

- \$7 million reduction
- 222 course sections (approx.
 1,000 fewer full-time students)
- 33 employees (managers and classified staff)

Worse Case Scenario:

- \$14 million reduction
- Over 400 course sections (approx. 2,000 fewer full-time students)
- 5-6 dozen employees and closure of several programs

University of California, Los Angeles
