I am in receipt of your letter dated March 2, 2010 wherein you proposed an extension of the Agreement between El Camino Community College District and El Camino College, Federation of Teachers, Local 1388, AFT, AFL-CIO for a period of one year to expire June 30, 2011.

As you are aware, the District is facing significant cutbacks in federal and state funding. Unfortunately, this will necessitate a careful review of our programs, our budget, our staffing and many of our contract provisions. We are therefore not willing to extend the existing contract to June 2011.

The District anticipates sunshining articles that we want to discuss no later than the May Board Agenda. We look forward to participating in a productive negotiation with the Federation of Teachers,

Dear Superintendent/President Fallo:

I hope this letter finds you well, and that you are having a productive spring semester. I am writing to update you on an exciting federal effort to increase access to higher education.

Since I last wrote to you, I attended the President's State of the Union Address, where he spoke about the importance of the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act, and reminded the audience that community colleges are a career pathway for the children of many working families. I was honored to have Julia Frost, a student at Coastal Carolina Community College, attend the address as my guest. I am truly inspired by Julia's commitment to her country as a former Marine and current Marine Corps spouse, and her commitment to completing her education. I plan to travel to additional campuses in 2010, and I am looking forward to meeting more students like Julia, and dedicated faculty and administrators like those who are helping her make her dream of becoming a teacher a reality.

As you may know, the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act, which includes a historic investment in community colleges, is currently pending in the Senate. If passed, this legislation would reform the Nation's student loan system, raise the maximum Pell Grant amount, and increase the availability of Perkins loans. These provisions have the potential to have a real impact on your institutions by increasing federal financial aid for your students, and allowing you to compete for funds to bolster student success and completion efforts. It also includes an opportunity for you to apply for funding, through your states, to expand and upgrade facilities so that you can better meet the needs of your students.

I am excited to spread the word about the tremendous value of community colleges. They are the place where students of any background can find the job training programs they need to improve their economic prospects, and those of our country. On January 27th, I spoke at the Center for American Progress about the importance of community colleges in generating economic opportunity in America. As you know, community colleges offer training in the skills that are needed in a rapidly changing job market, and your institutions are major contributors to our economic recovery and our country's economic prosperity in the future

Finally, I want to thank you for continuing to update me about what is happening on your campuses. I know that many of you are facing barriers due to state budget cuts. But I have also heard from many of you about the innovative ways you are meeting student needs. Please continue to share your thoughts by writing to me at communitycollegecorner@ed.gov.

On March 7, 2010, several members of the Honors Transfer Program of El Camino College attended the Tenth Annual Student Research Conference at UC Irvine. This conference is sponsored by the Honors Transfer Council of California to give community college students an opportunity to present their undergraduate research in a university setting and to have their abstracts printed in a university publication.

El Camino College sent 19 students to share their research with students and faculty from all over the region. Some gave oral presentations while others displayed their information on informative posters. The topics were broad, as can be seen by the attachment, and the research was sophisticated. The student presenters are currently working on abstracts based on their research presentations; these abstracts will be printed in the UCI publication "Building Bridges" later this year.

The 19 students were mentored by ten generous instructors. Moreover, several faculty were at UC Irvine to support their honors student: Lucy Alamillo from Fine Arts, Amy Himsel from Behavioral and Social Science, and Steve Leonelli from Natural Science all came to support their mentees. Even though the presenters and mentors are crucial, their work may have not been noticed were it not for the ASB which contributed 500 dollars to cover the cost of registration for El Camino's students.





RESOLUTION NO. 2009/10-11 SANTA CLARITA COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES

In the Matter of the State Budget Crisis and Local Education Impact

Whereas, the State of California faces a multi-billion dollar budget shortfall and lacks the necessary revenue to support needed expenditures; and

Whereas, all sectors of education in California - K-12, California Community Colleges, California State University, and University of California - have seen substantial budget cuts; and

Whereas, the Santa Clarita Community College District saw its ongoing revenue reduced by \$12.3 million during the 2008-09 and 2009-10 budget years, and could have offered 3,455 more class sections with with that funding; and

Whereas, the Santa Clarita Community College District has cut 793 class sections during the 2009-10 academic year when enrollment demand continues to increase due to record unemployment levels in California and fewer students being admitted to the California State University and University of California campuses; and

Whereas, more than 4,500 students were on waitlists for classes in the Santa Clarita Community College District in Fall 2009; and

Whereas, the Santa Clarita Community College District has seen a 28.5 percent increase in admission applications between Fall 2007 and Fall 2009; and

Whereas, the impact of the budget cuts has been exacerbated by the State's deferrals of payment to local community college districts; and

Whereas, the Santa Clarita Community College District has not laid off permanent staff, but has been forced to severely limit hiring, which negatively affects the programs and services most used by students; and

Whereas, the Santa Clarita Community College District is an engine of economic growth and development in the region, as it served 3,213 employees, 507 companies, and secured \$1.6 million in revenue to serve business during 2008-09;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Santa Clarita Community College District, its Chancellor, its faculty, its staff, its administrators, and its students will work with interested parties in the gommunity and in the state to advocate for a balanced approach to resolve State fiscal issues that Juhibit the delivery of education in our community.

Cosmetology Program History:

The Cosmetology Program is one of the original programs on campus sometime between 1947-1949. Cosmetology was first part of the SCROC program on campus. The program has four full-time and three part-time instructors.

Enrollment:

For 2009-10, enrollment is remains at 137 students per semester, which includes both day and evening programs. Students are required to complete 1600 hours to qualify and take for the Cosmetology State Board Exam.

Certificates and Completion:

In 2008-09, 39 Certificate of Achievements were completed. Cosmetology averages about 20 program completers a semester.

Program Scheduling:

Day program is 40 hours /5 days a week. -Average program completion time is 1.2 years

Evening program (part-time) is 20 hours/ 4 days a week. – Average program completion time 2.6 years

New Program Changes, 2009-10:

Although there was a reduction in classes and student enrollment, the Cosmetology faculty had a brilliant idea of changing the program days and hours. To increase evening student opportunities to work on more clients (lab time) the days of operation were changed as follows::

Wednesday thru Friday until 7 p.m. and Saturday 9-2 p.m. to serve more clients and students have more lab and practice time.

(Actually, I went to Cerritos College and saw their Cosmetology evening program and it looked like Super Cuts. Students have the experience of truly working in a super busy Salon).

The Saturday class has been very successful and well-received by the community.
