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

Josh DuFault



ECC graduate Josh DuFault was recently awarded the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship and is now attending Stanford University. The U.S. Navy veteran and exemplary computer science student was also accepted to numerous highly selective universities from across the country, including Yale, Rice and Dartmouth.

Student Success Grant

A recent \$1.5 million, three-year grant from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office will help El Camino College better prepare students for success in college-level courses. Funding will support programs designed to ease the transition from high school to college and shorten the time between basic skills education and college completion. ECC is one of 43 community colleges statewide to receive funding from this \$60 million grant.

Pathways and Partnerships in Education

Through outreach partnerships with high schools, universities, local employers, community-based organizations, and workforce development agencies, El Camino College offers programs such as Career Pathways, CTE Transitions (high school to college), Engineering Technology/Project Lead The Way, and a Robotics Academy, among others. 

"With MESA, you're around students who want the same things you want – who want to transfer to a university and work in science or math or engineering," added Michael, who is now gearing up for graduate school. "I loved being around people like that, it really helped me."

GRAND OPENING CELEBRATION

Murdock Stadium

El Camino College celebrated the grand opening of the new Murdock Stadium and Athletic Complex with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on September 1. The brand new, state-of-the-art facility officially opened just in time for the first football game of the 2016 season. The \$48 million stadium and athletic education and fitness complex was funded by the 2002 Measure E facilities bond. Supporting the college's outstanding men's and women's athletic programs and kinesiology classes, the facility also includes a community walking track.





ATHLETIC COMPLEX HIGHLIGHTS

The modern stadium replaces the original 1949 structure, named after El Camino College founding President Forrest G. Murdock.

Features:

- 7,869-seat stadium
- synthetic turf fields for both football and soccer
- collegiate nine-lane running track with pole vault, high jump, long jump, and steeple chase
- athletic training facility, modern locker rooms and equipment room
- elevated viewing areas, roof-top filming deck, press box for both teams
- communication and technology: sitewide Wi-Fi, wireless radio/coach communications, and audio/visual systems
- practice field (completed 2013): serves classes and athletics and includes shot put, discus, javelin, and synthetic turf
- drought-tolerant plants and reclaimed water

New Season of Warriors Football in New Stadium

Warriors begin 2016 season with new head coach

The 2016 Warrior football season marked a time of new beginnings. The first game of the season was played in the new stadium led by new head coach Gifford Lindheim, who stepped in after ECC alumnus and venerable football head coach John Featherstone retired at the end of 2015 after more than 30 years.

SOUTH BAY PROMISE



The South Bay Promise provides a pathway from high school to El Camino College, and then on to California State University, Dominguez Hills, or another four-year university. In collaboration with the South Bay Workforce Investment Board, El Camino College partners with the Centinela Valley Union High School District, Inglewood Unified School District, and CSU Dominguez Hills to give students a head start on a college education. The program will expand to include Torrance Unified School District next fall.

Dakari Jones enrolled in the South Bay Promise as a senior at Leuzinger High School. Now she is a successful full-time student at El Camino College, with plans to transfer to a university to study theater.

"The South Bay Promise helped me navigate the college process so much more efficiently and effectively. I made friends, figured out what I want to do with my life, with my major, and the program helped me organize my life academically."

Honors Transfer Program: Pathway to University

Joseph Luck, the 2015-16 president of the ECC Honors Transfer Club, said he wasn't the most motivated student in high school. But after joining the Honors Transfer Program (HTP), he met a group of students who helped him kick his studies into high gear.

"HTP made me want to try harder in school," said Joseph, who graduated from ECC this past spring and is now at UCLA continuing his studies in business economics. "I liked being with all those motivated people."

This year, 150 HTP students transferred to universities such as UCLA or UC Berkeley. Another 200 students joined the program this fall. The HTP had the highest percentage – 93 percent – of honors students admitted to UCLA last year, as part of the Transfer Alliance Program. With a range of opportunities for students to present research and learn leadership skills, the HTP also prepares students for future academic and career challenges.


About FYE
