META MAJORS

Meta-majors are groups of related majors with similar requirements, outcomes, or methodologies. Meta-majors were determined through group card-sorting activities scheduled throughout Spring 2019. In all 130 groups of 680 faculty, staff, administrators, and students completed a card-sorting activity; 75% were students.

How do meta-majors help students?

- Grouping majors into broad categories (meta-majors) helps guide student choice. Instead of being confronted with a list of over 200 degree and certificate programs to choose from, students can first select one of the seven meta-majors based on their general interest. Then, as they start their educational journey, they can have some time to explore the general interest area, be provided with “program maps,” which outline which courses to take semester by semester, and then make a more informed choice about their specific major.

What is the difference between a meta-major and an academic division?

- El Camino College organizes its administration and facilities around academic divisions. Each academic division has a dean, and each academic division is housed within a particular building. Academic divisions, however, are mostly separate from student support services, including tutoring and counseling, which are housed in separate buildings and have different and distinct administration.
- The idea of meta-majors is more student-centered. Majors were placed into meta-majors based not only on input from faculty, staff, and administrators but, most importantly, on input from students. Therefore, while the meta-majors, by and large, look a lot like the academic division structure (with exceptions), the process for determining the groupings was notably unique and student-centered. In addition, at the center of each meta-major is a success team, which is tasked with improving the experience for students in that meta-major. Finally, support services are being organized around meta-majors, starting with general counseling, which has assigned each counselor to a specific meta-major (see more information here).

Success Teams

- Currently, El Camino College has seven success teams, one for each meta-major. Success teams are working to improve outcomes for students in the following areas: Increase fall-to-spring retention; Increase the number of units students complete per year; Increase the number of students completing college-level math and English in their first year; Decrease the number of excess units students accumulate while earning their degree or certificate.

New and returning students (those with an absence of two consecutive primary terms: fall or spring semesters, excluding summer and winter terms) must complete an online application for admission.

Student must show completion of:

- Geometry in high school (min grade C-) or MATH 60 (min. grade of C) to enroll into MATH 170;
- Trigonometry in high school (min grade C-) or MATH 170 (min. grade of C) to enroll into MATH 180; and
- Pre- Calculus in high school (min grade C-) or MATH 180 (min. grade of C) to enroll into MATH 190.

ENGLISH PLACEMENT CHART

English Placement Chart

After filling out the placement survey at MyECC, you will be directed toward a particular English course. This chart is designed to help you understand your English placement.



HS GPA of 2.6 and above:
ENGL 1A

This is a college-level English course that is designed to teach academic reading and writing skills. In this 4-hour/week class, you will read challenging books and articles, and you will write multiple academic essays. The biggest assignment is an essay that is at least 2,000-words long, where you do your own research and find a minimum of 5 sources. This is a challenging course, but you can succeed if you commit your time and effort, and if you seek out the support of others.



HS GPA of 2.59 and below:
ENGL 1A + ENGL 1AS

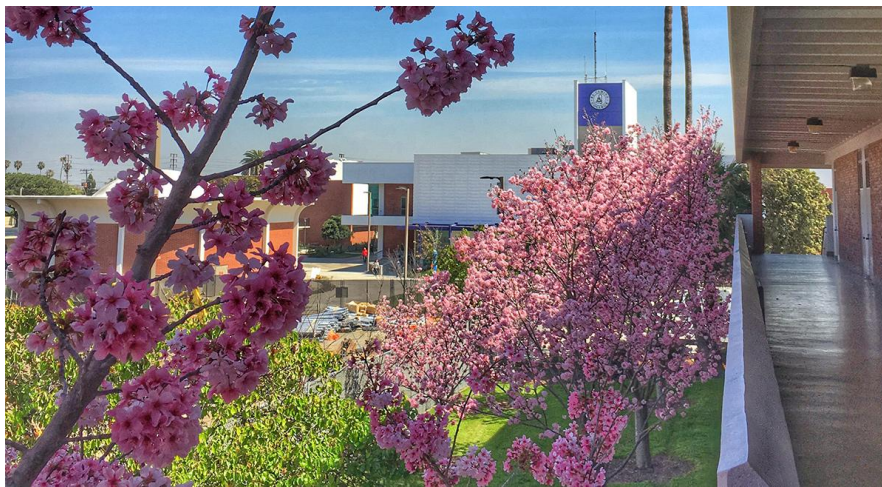
If your high school GPA is 2.59 and below, you will be required to take ENGL 1AS with ENGL 1A. This is a great deal because you will spend an extra 2 hours a week with your instructor, and you will have a tutor and a counselor dedicated to your class. The work you do in ENGL 1AS is tailored to help you succeed in ENGL 1A. Even if you have a 2.6 or higher, you can still choose to enroll in ENGL 1A + ENGL 1AS.



Optional but Recommended for
HS GPA of 1.89 and below:

ENGL 1

This is an optional course for students who would like an extra semester of preparation before starting ENGL 1A or ENGL 1A + ENGL 1AS. It is especially recommended for students with GPAs of 1.89 or lower. However, it is open to any student. Consider this course a “bridge” into college-level English, where you will be able to brush up on your reading and writing skills before starting ENGL 1A or ENGL 1A + 1AS. ENGL 1 is a more low-stakes class where students can adjust to the expectations of college and boost their confidence and skills.



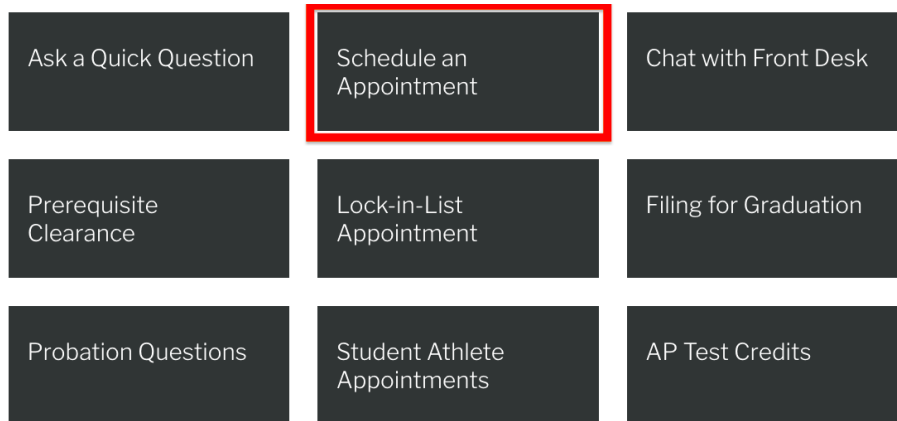

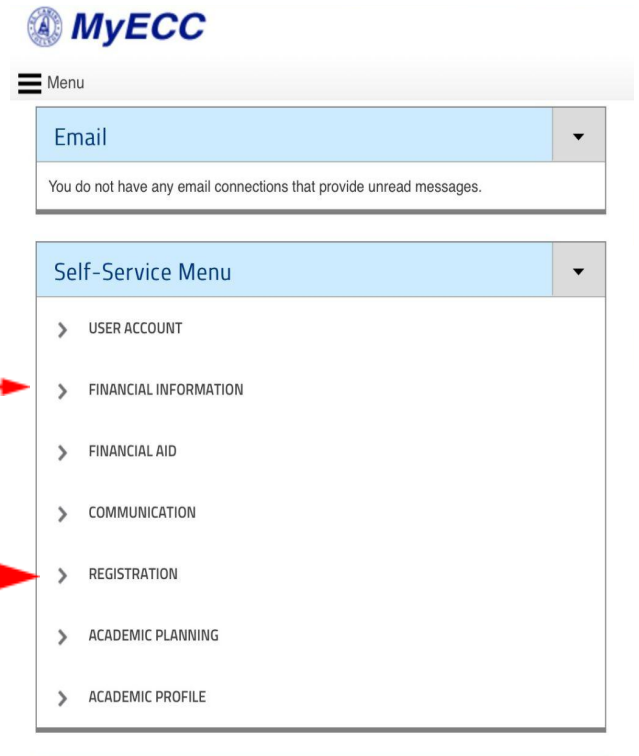

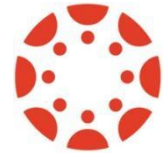

Canvas

Canvas is the online space El Camino College uses for distance education classes. Many of your professors also use it for on-campus courses to:



- Post the class Syllabus
- Post documents and handouts
- Have class discussions
- Post your grades
- Quizzes and tests, and much more!

Once you have **officially registered** for a class, you will be able to get to it on Canvas if your professor uses it for that course. Please note, even when your professor is using Canvas, you won't see your course in Canvas until one week before the term starts, and you typically won't be able to log into the course until the first day of the term.

Logging into Canvas

- Step 1** Go to <https://elcamino.instructure.com/login/saml>.
You can also get there by following the link for Canvas at <https://elcamino.edu>.
- Step 2** Enter your Canvas User ID, which is your ECC email address.* Examples:

- Step 3** Enter your Canvas password, which is the same as your MyECC password.

If you receive the error message, "Canvas does not have an account for that username," please contact the Distance Education office or by email at distanceed@elcamino.edu. Please have your student ID number ready when contacting the Distance Education office.

CLASS REGISTRATION

What is Registration?

Registration is the process by which you enroll into classes at El Camino College. Log in to MyECC and register for classes online on or after your Registration Appointment date and time (in the Self- Service menu, click Registration, then Registration Appointment). Before you register, make sure all prerequisites have been met.

College Catalog

The College Catalog is a detailed publication of college policies, regulations, major requirements, and course descriptions of every class offered at El Camino College. NOTE: Major Requirements will be based on the college catalog year you are enrolled in.

Class Schedule

The Schedule of Classes provides information about courses being taught during a specific semester, including time, day, units, instructor, method of instruction, and so forth.

Registration Appointment

- A registration appointment is a specific time and date in which the student can start registering for classes.
- They are available to qualified students who complete the admission requirements.
- They are issued before starting the registration cycle for continuing students and on a first-come, first-serve basis for new and returning students.
- To find your registration appointment, log on to MyECC: Click *Self-Service Menu -> Registration -> Registration Appointment*

Pre-requisites

Prerequisites are a condition of enrollment that a student is required to meet before enrolling in a course. A student can clear a prerequisite by earning a passing grade on the course labeled as the prerequisite or receive a clearance by a counselor

To clear a prerequisite, you must go to the Counseling website and complete an [Online Prerequisite Clearance Process Form](#) and include all supporting documents to support your request. Please allow 3-5 business days for a counselor to process online clearance requests.

Co-requisites

A required course taken simultaneously to enroll in another class (English 1A & English 1AS).

Units

A student needs to take 15 units per semester, 30-semester units per academic year, to graduate within four years (2 years at ECC and 2 years at a transfer institution).



CLASS REGISTRATION

Registration Priority

Students within a continuing student priority level will be prioritized by units earned at or through El Camino College. The more units earned, the higher priority up to an earned unit limit of 100. Continuing students with the same earned unit value will be prioritized randomly. Students within a new/returning student priority level will be prioritized by the submission date of their application for admissions. New/Returning students who applied on the same day will be prioritized randomly.

Two Ways to Register for Classes

Students can register for classes through MyECC. There are two ways to register for classes, adding to the shopping cart via MyECC class registration or using Schedule Builder.

Method 1: MyECC Class Registration

Before you register, make sure all prerequisites have been met and cleared by a counselor.

Register for Classes through MyECC

- Step 1** Log in to MyECC and click on the Self-Service Menu.
- Step 2** Under Self-Service Menu, click on Registration
- Step 3** Under the Registration tab, students can choose either of the following tabs:
 - Add to the shopping cart if you know Section #
 - Add to the shopping cart by searching for sections.
- Step 4** Search for your classes by using the specific section number or by searching by subject.

CLASS REGISTRATION

What is the Difference between Online, Online LIVE, and Hybrid Classes?

Online (Asynchronous)

These classes are entirely online without mandatory class meetings. You don't have to be online at a fixed day and time with your classmates and instructor. Your instructor and your classmates will communicate through Canvas, and you can interact with them and access class resources on your own time. You complete all the assignments and meet the deadlines set by your instructor. Your classmates and instructor are not necessarily online at the same time.

Live Online (Synchronous)

These classes are entirely online, with your instructor and your classmates meeting together at the same time. You attend live interactive class meetings facilitated by your instructor in Canvas. You also do additional work outside of class, just as you would your homework.

Hybrid

Hybrid Courses are partially online — meaning there are some on-campus meetings along with online instruction with assignments and deadlines. Hybrid Courses use ECC's Learning Management System, CANVAS, to deliver content and assess your learning. For hybrid classes, look for the class footnote in the Schedule of Classes for on-campus meeting dates and times

Flexible

Online, with no on campus requirement, but some required live, synchronous class meetings or required proctored testing. Limited meeting days. Please see the schedule notes for dates and times.

What Do Classes Look Like?

In online classes, you will have regular lessons each week, usually split up into different modules following along with chapters in your books or videos your instructor posts. Class lesson material and instruction will vary based on the instructor. You log in to the online learning management system, Canvas, and complete your class lectures, assignments, interactive activities, and tests to fulfill the course learning objectives. Your instructors will post their course materials, assignments, and announcements. The same learning objectives are used for all ECC classes, whether fully online, hybrid, or on-campus.

Could Not Register for a Class?

- **Waitlist** – When the class is full, you might have the option to waitlist for the course. Before the start of the semester, students will be notified via MyECC if they were moved from the waitlist into the class. If the student is still on the waitlist when the semester starts, the student can attend the course and try to add the class.
- **“Crashing” Classes** – During the first two weeks of the semester, you can show up to the class you couldn't get into and ask the professor if you can be added.
- **Adding Classes** – After the registration period is over and the term begins, the only way to become enrolled in a class is with an Add Code from the instructor.

How to Add a Class AFTER the term has started

- Step 1** Obtain an Add Code from the instructor.
- Step 2** Go to myecc.elcamino.edu
- Step 3** Log into MyECC with your ECC email and password.
- Step 4** On the Left, in the self-service Menu, click on “Registration” then “Online Add”.
- Step 5** On the next screen, enter the reference number and authorization code from the Add Code slip.
- Step 6** Click the Submit button.
- Step 7** Once you have successfully added the section, pay any fees by returning to the Self-Service Menu. Click on “Financial Information” and “View Account and Make Payments.”

ACADEMIC EXPECTATIONS AND PROBATION

What is Academic Probation?

A student, who has attempted at least 12-semester units, as shown by the academic record, will be placed on Academic Probation when the grade point average for total units attempted at El Camino College is less than 2.0.

What can I do to be removed from Academic Probation?

A student will be removed from Academic Probation when the cumulative grade point average is 2.0 or higher in total units attempted at El Camino College. The student must do the following to return to good academic standing:

1. **Repeat:** Students may repeat a course in which they have received a substandard grade (that is, D, F, or NC/NP) only once. Upon completion of those courses, the student's cumulative GPA will be recalculated. The new cumulative GPA will reflect only the passing grades of C or better. However, the student's transcript will show all grades earned.
2. **Academic Renewal:** The student can file a petition to have up to 24 units of D or F grades omitted from the cumulative GPA. You may file for Academic Renewal at the Admissions and Records Office if you meet the following criteria:
 - The student must have earned a GPA of 2.25 or higher in the last 30 units of graded work completed at any regionally accredited college or university, or a GPA of 2.5 or higher in the last 24 units of graded work completed at any regionally accredited college or university. Finally, at least two years must have elapsed since the substandard semester.
3. The student's remaining units must be completed with grades of C or better to reduce the effect of D's or F's in the cumulative GPA.

What is Progress Probation?

A student who has enrolled 12 or more semester units, as shown by the official academic record, will be placed on Progress Probation if entries of "W," "I," "NC" and "NP" account for 50 percent of the total units attempted. Courses dropped before the "No Notation" deadline are not considered "units attempted" and do not receive entries as "W," "I," and "NC/NP."

What is "CR", "NC", a "W" and an "I"?

"P/CR"	The student will receive unit credit toward graduation and/or full-time status but is not calculated into the G.P.A.
"NP/NC"	The student receives no credit for the courses taken.
"W"	Withdrawal from class.
"I"	Incomplete academic work for unforeseeable, emergency, and justifiable reasons that included circumstance beyond the student's control. The work must be completed by the sixth week of the regular semester following the "I" mark; otherwise, a letter grade will be assigned depending on the finished work.

What can I do to be removed from Progress Probation?

A student will be removed from Progress Probation when the percentage of entries of "W", "I", "NC" or "NP" is below 50 percent of the total units attempted.

ACADEMIC EXPECTATIONS AND PROBATION

What is Dismissal?

Dismissal Due to Academic Probation

A student on Academic Probation will be dismissed if the student earned a cumulative grade point average of less than 2.0 in all graded credit units attempted in each of three consecutive semesters. However, if a student achieves a 2.0 or higher during the most recent regular (fall, spring) semester while on probation, the student will continue on probation but will not be subject to dismissal. Terms shorter than 16 weeks (i.e. winter, summer) will not be considered a semester. A semester in which the student does not take any courses will not be counted as a semester.

Dismissal Due to Progress Probation

A student on Progress Probation will be dismissed if the percentage of units in which the student has been enrolled for which entries of "W," "I," "NC" and/or "NP" remains at or above 50 percent for three consecutive semesters. Terms shorter than 16 weeks will not be considered a semester. A semester in which the student does not take any courses will not be counted as a semester.

Appeal of Probation or Dismissal	Readmission Following Dismissal
A student who believes that there were extenuating circumstances that warrant an exception to the probation and dismissal standards set forth in this policy may submit a written appeal in compliance with administrative procedures.	A student who has been dismissed may return after sitting out at least one 16 week semester. A readmitted student will remain on probation until the cumulative average is above 2.0 and/or the percentage of "W", "I" and "NC/NP" entries is below 50%.

Loss of Enrollment Priority and California College Promise Grant

El Camino College requires all students to meet academic standards, progress standards, and adhere to a unit cap to receive enrollment priority (priority registration) and the California College Promise Grant (formerly known as the BOG Fee Waiver). Academic and progress standards will apply once a student has attempted at least 12-semester units, as shown by the academic record. Former foster youth up to 24 years of age are exempt from this regulation.

ACADEMIC EXPECTATIONS AND PROBATIONS

Grade Change Policy

When grades are given for any course of instruction taught in the El Camino Community College District, the grade given to each student shall be the grade determined by the instructor of the course, and the determination of the student's grade by the instructor, in the absence of mistake, fraud, bad faith, or incompetency, shall be final. A student who alleges that a grade in a course was given as a result of a mistake, fraud, bad faith, or incompetency may appeal the grade within 18 months of the last day of the term in which the class was posted. Upon determination by the District that a grade in a course was given as a result of fraud, the District may change or remove the fraudulent grade from the student's transcript of record based on the recommendation of a faculty committee. Such action may be initiated upon determination of the fraud without regard to the time limits imposed on other grade appeal actions. Procedures for changing or removing grades in accordance with this policy have been developed by the President/Superintendent or his designees in collegial consultation with the Academic Senate.

Tutoring Hub

Math Study Center

The Math Study Center provides drop-in online tutoring through Zoom for Math and Computer Science courses.

The Learning Resource Center provides drop-in online tutoring through Zoom for a variety of subjects.

The Writing Center

The Writing Center is dedicated to helping students improve their writing, research, and presentation skills for all their classes.

Peer Assisted Study Sessions

PASS aims to provide a learning atmosphere that differs from the traditional tutorial environment. The focus is on integrating the course content (what to learn) with academic reasoning and study skill (how to learn).

SEA Village

The Student Equity and Achievement Village will continue to provide students with online tutoring support via Zoom. They offer drop-in online tutoring in Math & English.

SEA Success Center

The SEA Success Center offers free one-on-one tutoring in all subjects. Our trained specialists will work with students individually to instill reading strategies and comprehension techniques to benefit them throughout their academic careers.

Supplemental Instruction

ACADEMIC HONESTY AND STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

Academic Honesty

El Camino College is dedicated to maintaining an optimal learning environment and insisting upon academic honesty. To uphold the academic integrity of the institution, all members of the academic community, faculty, staff, and students, must assume responsibility for providing an educational environment of the highest standards characterized by a spirit of academic honesty.

It is the responsibility of all members of the academic community to behave in a manner that encourages learning, promotes honesty, and to act with fairness towards others. Students should not seek an unfair advantage over other students when completing an assignment, taking an examination, or engaging in any other kind of academic activity.

Standards of Conduct

Conduct at El Camino College must conform to the laws of the State of California, District policies, and campus rules and regulations. The El Camino College faculty, staff, and administration are dedicated to maintaining a positive learning environment. Optimal standards for behavior are essential to the maintenance of a quality college environment. These standards will apply to all students on campus, other college property or while attending any college-sponsored event. Violation of such laws, policies, rules, and regulations or behavior adversely affecting suitability as a student, will lead to disciplinary action. Disciplinary actions as noted in Administrative Procedure 5520 may be taken against any person who engages in behavior defined as misconduct.

The following misconduct shall constitute good cause for discipline, including but not limited to the removal, suspension, or expulsion of a student.

Dishonesty

Cheating, plagiarism (including plagiarism in a student publication), or engaging in other academic dishonesty including but not limited to:

1. Representing the words, ideas or work of another as one's own in any academic exercise (plagiarism), including the use of commercial term paper companies or online sources for essays, term papers, or research papers, whether free or paid.
2. Copying from another student or former student allowing another student to copy from one's work
3. Allowing another individual to assume one's identity or assuming the identity of another individual.
4. Changing answers on a previously scored test, assignment or experiment with the intent to defraud.
5. Inventing data for the purpose of completing an assignment, a laboratory experiment, or case study analysis with the intent to defraud.
6. Obtaining or copying exams or test questions when prohibited by the instructor.
7. Giving or receiving information during an examination or test by any means such as sign language, hand signals or secret codes, or through the use of any electronic device.
8. Using aids such as notes, calculators, or electronic devices unless specifically authorized by the instructor.
9. Handing in the same paper or other assignments in more than one class when prohibited by the instructor.
10. Any other action which is not an honest reflection of a student's own academic work.

ACADEMIC HONESTY AND STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

Other forms of dishonesty, including but not limited to, forgery or attempted forgery of any academic record; alteration or misuse of the college documents, records or identification; or knowingly furnishing false information to the District.

Unauthorized preparation, giving, selling, transfer, distribution, or publication for any commercial purpose, of any contemporaneous recording of an academic presentation in a classroom or equivalent site of instruction, including but not limited to handwritten or typewritten class notes, except as permitted by any District policy or administration procedures.

Disruptive Behavior, Inappropriate Conduct and Expression

1. Disruptive behavior, willful disobedience, profanity or vulgarity, or the open defiance of the authority of, or abuse of, college personnel.
2. Any acts of aggression including verbal or physical actions that are intended to create fear, apprehension, or bodily harm.
3. Lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct on District-owned or controlled property, or at District-sponsored or supervised functions.

Family Education Rights Privacy Act (FERPA)

All education records of students who enroll at El Camino College are kept in accordance with the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. A student may request access to his or her education record which personally identifies the student and may challenge the accuracy of the record or the appropriateness of its retention.

Student consent is needed for the release of records covered by the act to outside parties (e.g., prospective employers) except for those agencies entitled to access under the provisions of the act (e.g., campus officials, other schools, federal educational and auditing officials, and requests in connection with the application or receipt of financial aid). These provisions apply to records received and used after Nov. 19, 1974.

Students may request a copy of a record that the student has requested or consented to be released. The full text of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 is in the United States Code Annotated, Title 20, 1232g, pocket part, in the campus library reference room. Particular questions with respect to a student's prerogative under the Family Educational Right and Privacy Act of 1974 should be directed to the office of the Director, Admissions and Records.

Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) - *Apply at fafsa.ed.gov*

Completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the first step toward applying and receiving federal college aid. El Camino College will use FAFSA data to determine eligibility for state and school aid. The deadline to submit to qualify for a Cal Grant is March 2, 2022.

California Dream Act - *Apply at dream.csac.ca.gov*

The California Dream Act became law through two Assembly Bills: AB 130 allows students who meet AB 540 criteria to apply for and receive non-state funded scholarships for public colleges and universities. AB 131 allows students who meet AB 540 criteria to apply for and receive state-funded financial aid such as grants, community college fee waivers (like the CA College Promise Grant), Cal Grant, and Chafee Grant. The deadline to submit to qualify for a Cal Grant is March 2, 2022. (See page 10 for Ab 540 & Undocumented student information.)

California College Promise Grant

For eligible California residents, the California College Promise Grant (formerly known as the BOG Fee Waiver) permits the \$46 per unit enrollment fee to be waived. (Assistance for the purchase of books and supplies must be applied for separately.) Students who meet income and residency criteria may qualify.

Student Success Completion Grant

The Student Success Completion Grant pays Cal Grant recipients enrolled in at least 12 but fewer than 15 semester units \$649 per semester (\$1,298 annually). Cal Grant recipients enrolled in 15 or more semester receive \$2,000 per semester (\$4,000 annually). To be eligible a student must: Be a Cal Grant B or C recipient, have unmet financial need and maintain satisfactory academic progress.

Cal Grant Note

A Cal Grant award is limited to four academic years, except for students enrolled in an institutionally required five-year undergraduate program or for students with baccalaureate degrees admitted to and enrolled in a program of professional teacher preparation. A student needs to take 15 units per semester or the equivalent quarter units, or 30-semester units or the equivalent quarter units per academic year, to graduate within four years.

AB 540 AND RESIDENCY

AB 540 is a law that provides in-state tuition benefits for undocumented and out-of-state students who attend or will attend a public university in California. Under California law AB 540, individual nonresident students are exempt from paying nonresident supplemental tuition. SB 68 expands AB 540 to enable students to count years spent at a California Community College and Adult School towards AB 540 eligibility. If you are granted an AB 540 exemption, you will be charged in-state enrollment fees and not the supplemental tuition charged to nonresidents.

Resident (IN- STATE) Enrollment Fees

Who is Eligible?

Students (including undocumented students) who, for various reasons, are classified as nonresidents may be eligible. To qualify for AB 540 status, students must also meet the following eligibility requirements:

- A student must have attended a high school (public or private) in California for three or more years*
- A student must have graduated from a California high school or attained the equivalent (GED or CA HS Proficiency exam)
- Students previously ineligible for AB540, who have attended a college or university since high school graduation, may be eligible for AB540 through SB68.

Steps to Complete the AB540 Process:

- A student must be enrolled in an accredited California Institution of Higher Education
- A student must file an AB 540 California Nonresident Tuition Exemption Request Form that includes an affidavit stating they have filed (or will file) an application to legalize as soon as they can do so. Completed forms must be submitted to the Admissions and Records Office located in the Student Services Center
- Submit a copy of sealed high school official transcripts to the El Camino College Admissions office for verification. If the transcript does not show the graduation date, please bring in your high school diploma.

Federal Grant Requirement: Each semester, students must complete at least 67% of their cumulative attempted units, maintain a 2.0 cumulative G.P.A., not exceed 150% of their educational programs, and not have earned a degree.

California Promise Grant requirement: Each semester, students must complete at least above 50% of their cumulative attempted units and maintain a 2.0 cumulative G.P.A.

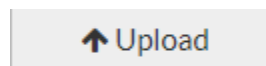

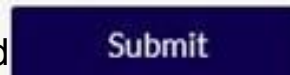

The Application

The El Camino College Foundation Online Scholarship Application is open and available for completion from June through December of every year. Simply apply online via *MyECC* and click on "Scholarship Application."

Requirements are:

- A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 or better
- Students must be enrolled in at least six units to qualify for a scholarship.

Please note: All incoming freshmen enrolled in the fall semester with a minimum of six units for college credit are eligible to apply, as your coursework will have been completed at the time of the review process.

- Try to make sure to ask teachers ahead of time for the recommendations so you can make the deadline and apply!

We realize that completing your studies online is challenging so you can qualify for the Laptop loan program if you are registered for a term, and have completed the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), or the California Dream Act application. Laptop supplies are limited and not guaranteed

CARES Act Aid for Students

The CARES Act, a \$2 trillion federal spending bill designed to provide some relief from hardships caused by COVID-19, includes funding of almost \$14 billion for colleges and universities. Of El Camino College's \$11.7 million allocations, \$5.8 million was designated as direct aid to students for their education-related costs such as textbooks, technology, and other similar expenses. Using guidance from the U.S. Department of Education, El Camino College has implemented a disbursement procedure. A student will receive an award of either \$250 or \$500 based on Title IV eligibility criteria, which include:

- Having completed a FAFSA application
- Having fulfilled any additional documentation requests for financial aid eligibility
- Meeting Satisfactory Academic Progress standards
- Being enrolled in 3 or more units
- Having financial need, calculated as the cost of attendance minus the expected family contribution

Students enrolled in 3 to 5 units will be awarded \$250. Students enrolled in 6 or more units will be awarded \$500. Funds will be received via the disbursement method a student has previously selected to receive financial aid (i.e., BankMobile, direct deposit, paper check, etc.). If a disbursement method has not been selected, the student will be asked to choose one. Students who have not completed a FAFSA application (Links to an external site.) for Spring Semester or Summer Session may still do so.

WARRIOR EMERGENCY FUND

Eligibility Requirements:

- CA Resident or AB 540 or AB 1899
 - A student's citizenship status does not affect their eligibility for an emergency fund.
- Must be enrolled for the semester you are requesting funds.
- **Must have a completed FAFSA or CADAA application on file with ECC Financial Aid Office and completed the verification process.**
- Students are only awarded once a semester (Fall and Spring only - students can reapply the next semester).
- Students must have accepted all federal financial aid they are eligible to receive.
- A student's citizenship status does not affect their eligibility for emergency funds.
- Students are awarded on a case by case basis of need.

CalFresh

The following information is dedicated to providing students with information on free and low-cost services to ease food, housing, technological, financial, and transportation pressures while also serving as a resource for all to reference.

CalFresh

What is CalFresh?

CalFresh is a nutrition assistance program that helps low-income individuals and families buy the food they need. CalFresh dollars help stretch a tight food budget and help many people afford to incorporate healthy foods like fruits and vegetables into their diets.

CalFresh is the name of the USDA-funded Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in California. Recipients receive a CalFresh benefits electronically via personal Golden State Advantage electronic benefits transfer (EBT) cards that look just like any other credit or debit cards

What can the CalFresh Outreach Program provide you?

- Eligibility Prescreen
- Application Assistance
- Required Verifications
- Interview Preparation
- Recertification
- Troubleshooting

Application Process






Step 1: Contact your CalFresh Outreach Team by completing the application prescreen at <http://bit.ly/calfresh4you> (Links to an external site.). The pre-screen will help us determine your eligibility for CalFresh.

Step 2: If you think you may be eligible, complete, and apply with your CalFresh Outreach Team. Although the application is available online (<https://www.getcalfresh.org/?source=elcamino> (Links to an external site.)), we encourage you to apply online with the help of your CalFresh Outreach Team because they are very familiar with the questions and will likely get you through the application faster.

Step 3: Once the county receives the application, your 30-day application period begins

Step 4: During these 30 days, you will need to do the following:

- Complete your INTERVIEW with the county office by phone or in-person (The county office will either call or mail you a date and time for your interview)
- Let your CalFresh Outreach Team know if you have not heard from the county within the first seven days

Individuals can receive \$16 - \$194 each month for groceries. CalFresh Food is California's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) that provides monthly food assistance for individuals and families with low incomes.

APPLYING IS EASY AND THE FIRST STEP ONLY TAKES 5-10 MINUTES.

You can apply for and receive CalFresh Food benefits without ever going into a county social service office. Apply online, talk to a county social service worker over the phone, and have your EBT card mailed to you.

 - a. The prescreen will help determine your eligibility for submitting a CalFresh application

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CalFresh

Step 5: You will then be required to provide verification documents [to your county office. This must also be completed during the 30-day period. Your application will not be approved if you do not submit verification documents that meet their requirements. Examples of verification documentation include:

- Copy of ID
- Proof of address
- Utility Bill
- Pay stubs
- Financial aid award letter and schedule (if a student)

Step 6: To keep your CalFresh benefits, you will be required to do the following:

- Complete a Semiannual Report (called a SAR 7 Eligibility Report) 6 months after your initial application is approved. The County will let you know when this is due.
- Complete a Recertification Application and be interviewed before the end of your certification period. The County will let you know when your Recertification Application is due and send you a letter confirming your interview's time and date. Most interviews will be conducted over the phone.

METRO U-PASS

What are the benefits of a Metro U-Pass?

El Camino College students who purchase a Metro U-Pass will be able to ride on the Metro, including Metro Rapid, Metro Rail, Metro Express Buses and the Metro Silver Line, as well as the GTrans (Gardena bus lines), Torrance Transit, and Long Beach Transit, Culver City Bus (Links to an external site.), LADOT DASH, City of Santa Monica's Big Blue Bus (BBB), and Norwalk Transit, Montebello Bus and Foothill (Local services)!

Who is eligible?

El Camino College students that are enrolled (enrollment verification will be required)

How do I purchase a Metro U-Pass?

- You will receive an email confirming that you completed the survey - save this email
- Request an El Camino College ID at the Warrior Welcome Center

- After receiving your ECC ID, go to the Bookstore.
- Show the Bookstore cashier your ID card or class schedule, and your confirmation email
- Pay the current metro U-pass fee
- Place the Metro U-Pass sticker on your ECC Student ID card?
- Show your Metro U-pass on your ID card before boarding and when asked by public transit staff.

May I use my financial aid to purchase a Metro U-Pass?

- Yes! Once students receive their financial aid disbursement, they may use their funding to purchase education-related expenses, including transportation costs.

What happens if my Metro U-Pass is lost or stolen?

- Email the Warrior Welcome Center to get another ECC ID and go to the Bookstore to get a replacement U-Pass sticker for \$2
- The Bookstore will deactivate the lost U-Pass sticker

TAP Cards

- The Metro U-pass is only available to El Camino College students. However, if you are an El Camino College employee or a community member who uses public transportation, you may purchase a TAP card at the Bookstore. TAP cards cost \$2.00 and then stored funds can be loaded.

Associated Students Organization (ASO)

What is the Associated Students Organization (ASO)?

The Associated Students Organization (ASO) is the student government of El Camino College. We serve as elected representatives for the student body. However, vacancies can be filled through an appointment process after the Spring elections.

- They use their leadership skills to stay informed on current issues about the students, and we commit to improving the quality of education and increasing student involvement on campus.
- Duties within ASO may vary with position. Some of our responsibilities are to serve on the Senate, Cabinet, ASO committees, and campus-wide committees. We also plan, promote, and volunteer for events to engage the student body.

Student Representation Fee (SRF)?

The Student Representation Fee is an optional \$2 fee. The fee supports both the El Camino College Associated Students Organization (ASO) and Student Senate for California Community Colleges (SSCCC) to advocate for California community college students. Both organizations provide students the opportunity to take an active role in higher education advocacy and policy development.

A RESOLUTION of the El Camino College Academic Senate to declare that the lives of Black students matter

WHEREAS, the El Camino College Academic Senate acknowledges the recent deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Aubrey, Eric Garner, Michael Brown, Sandra Bland, Trayvon Martin, Tamir Rice, and too many others; and

WHEREAS, these deaths are part of a long legacy of racial oppression and discrimination in this country and are indicative of a socio-economic divide that continues to grow and threatens the current and future well-being of our students of color; and

WHEREAS, we express solidarity with the thousands of protesters in Minnesota and throughout the nation who are peacefully expressing their outrage and frustration at the deaths of unarmed African Americans; and

WHEREAS, the killings of unarmed Black men, women, *trans men, and *trans women, have left our students searching for answers to incredibly complicated and infuriating questions; and

WHEREAS, schools should be places for the practice and enforcement of equity, for the building of understanding, creation of knowledge, and for the active engagement of all in creating pathways to freedom and justice for all people; and

WHEREAS, the El Camino College Academic Senate upholds the ideals of equal justice under the law, racial justice, and human dignity for all of our students;

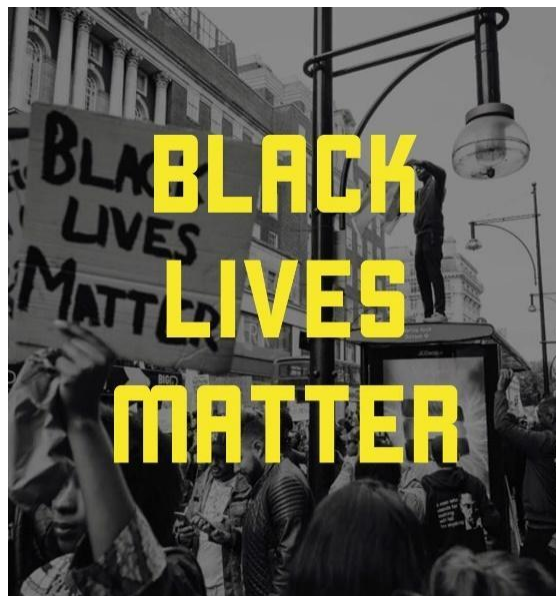

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that El Camino College Academic Senate invites faculty across disciplines and content areas to use resources that are inclusive of all of our diverse learners to enrich instruction throughout the whole year, not just one week or one month; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the El Camino College Academic Senate will stand in solidarity with students who lead non-violent on-campus demonstrations and other educational events related to systemic and institutional racism; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the El Camino College Academic Senate encourages ongoing critical reflection and for staff, faculty and administrators to have difficult and honest conversations concerning systemic racism, social injustice, racial and ethnic bias. SCHAUERMAN LIBRARY

The Schauerman Library is a hub for research, study space, and learning that supports student success with a wealth of resources. The Library contains both quiet study spaces and collaborative work areas, with group study rooms available for checkout.

The **Circulation and Reserves Desk**, located in the Main Lobby, is where students can check out textbooks, books from the general collection and access back issues of periodicals. The library does not have every textbook for all ECC courses and relies on faculty donations to provide them for student use. Textbooks may be borrowed for two hours at a time, and copy machines are located nearby so that students may replicate portions of text for homework purposes. Make sure to bring your ECC ID to check out materials and for making copies. You may get your student ID card activated here.

At the **Reference Desk** on the main floor, Librarians will work with students on research skills and citations while also providing guidance in navigating a college library environment. Understanding university admission requirements can sometimes seem complicated and overwhelming, but we can help you prepare and work towards becoming an eligible applicant. We can help you look at all of your university options, make the right decision on where to transfer, and plan a road map to the university of your choice. By utilizing Transfer Center services and attending our activities, you'll learn about potential transfer institutions, gain knowledge of transfer admission requirements, and increase your motivation and intent to transfer.

- Grade Point Average (GPA) needed for admission

Admission requirements may change from year to year, so it is to the student's advantage to select a transfer institution as early as possible and meet with an academic counselor, transfer center adviser, university representative, and/or articulation officer for updated information.

UMOJA-PROJECT SUCCESS

Umoja - Project Success is a program designed to increase the retention rate and to improve the academic performance of students who meet the Project Success admission criteria. The mission of Umoja- Project Success is to aid the successful transition of students from high school to El Camino College and beyond in order to achieve educational and career goals.



Currently, there are over 165 students and 60 mentors actively involved in Umoja- Project Success. The retention rate from the fall to spring first semester averages between 83-95%. This compares to a 50% retention rate of comparable first year students. Students who complete the program transfer to universities, both in-state and out-of-state, at a much higher rate, and students who transfer complete their bachelor degrees in less than three years after graduation from El Camino College.

- **Workshops/Presentations** – Workshops about everyday psychological topics (e.g. stress management, healthy relationships) in a more casual, discussion-based setting.

It is well known that college can be a time of transition and change, and working with a psychologist to discuss major or minor stressors, new or old symptoms, and life decisions can be helpful to adjustment.

Graduation vs. Commencement

Graduation

- Graduation is the act of receiving a diploma or degree from a school, college, or university. El Camino College confers degrees and certificates to students who have officially and completed all graduation requirements.
- Students must apply for the term (fall, spring or summer) they plan to graduate during the filing period. Graduation intents and petitions for certificates must be filed in the **Admissions & Records Office** by the deadline. **Late requests will not be considered.**
- Prior to filing the Intent to Graduate and/or the Petition for a Certificate, students are strongly advised to see a counselor before their final term at El Camino College. This will ensure that all requirements for the degree and/or certificate are met.

Commencement

- **Commencement** is a ceremony often referred to as “graduation.” El Camino College’s annual commencement is scheduled at the end of each spring semester, in celebration of students who are expected to successfully complete all graduation requirements by the end of the term. Students who complete requirements by the end of the previous summer or fall may also participate in the spring ceremony.
- Students participating in the commencement ceremony will receive a diploma cover when their name is read. Confirmation of degree completion will take place after official grades are posted. Degrees will be mailed to students at a later date, usually by October. The **Student Development Office** coordinates the commencement celebration and also manages caps/gowns, announcements and other services for graduates

A

Academic Probation

This occurs when a student has attempted at least 12-semester units, and their GPA falls below a 2.0 in all units taken at the college

Add/Drop Period

The time frame when students can add or drop courses without consequences or incomplete marks on their transcript

Articulation

The process of transitioning a student's work from one educational institution to another

ASSIST

An online student-transfer information system that shows how course credits earned at a public California Community College can be applied when transferring to a four-year California university

Associate of Arts (AA) and Associate of Science (AS) Degree

A two-year general studies degree that can provide students with skills to become more marketable in the workforce

Associate of Arts and Science Transfer (AA/AS-T) Degree

A guaranteed pathway for transfer into the California State University (CSU) system. The transfer degree is composed of 60 units, including general education, major prep, and electives

Associated Student Organization (ASO)

El Camino College's student government

that acts as a liaison for students and the community college. Elected representatives use their leadership skills to stay informed on current issues and commit to improving the quality of education and increasing student involvement on campus.

Asynchronous

Having the ability to log on whenever you'd like to complete your course work. This type of class does not have a specific log-in time.

Audit

"Auditing" a course gives students the chance to learn the material without receiving academic credit

B

Bachelor's degree (Baccalaureate)

A degree awarded by a four-year college in a particular field of study

C

CANVAS

ECC's Learning Management System used to deliver content and assess your learning on an online platform. It is a self-contained system where your instructors can post their course materials, assignments, and announcements

CCCApply

A website that provides an online admissions application to California Community Colleges

Certificate of Accomplishment

A program that requires the completion of courses in a particular field. This degree is not recorded on a student's transcript.

Certificate of Achievement

A program that requires the completion of courses in a specific field, and unlike degree programs, courses outside the field are not generally required. A Certificate of Achievement is also recorded on a student's transcript

Certificate of Competence

A minimum of 12 Computer Information Systems units must be completed at El Camino College, with a grade point average of 3.0 (B) for the required 30-31 units is necessary

Class Schedule

A college publication that lists all courses offered during a semester. Including class meeting times, instructors assigned to a class, class location, credit hours, and important registration information

Cohort

A group of students working through a curriculum at the same time

College Catalog

A publication that describes a college's academic programs, course requirements, and support services

Commencement

A formal graduation ceremony

Corequisites

Courses that a student needs to take simultaneously with another class

Credits

A unit that is used to show that you have completed and passed the courses needed for a degree. Each credit is equal to 1 hr. of lecture time per week

Cross Enrollment

This refers to a student enrolled at two academic institutions simultaneously

D

Distance Education

Distance education at ECC provides flexibility to your learning and studying. Unlike traditional, campus-based classes, distance education is a form of learning where you are not always physically present at school

Dual Enrollment

Current high school students taking college classes to get a head start on their educational and career goals

E

ECC Connect

ECC Connect is a system designed to provide a central location for students, instructors, counselors, and other support staff to connect and communicate

Electives

Classes students choose to fulfill a general education requirement or because they're interested in a topic outside of their major's core courses

F

Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

An application for federal, Cal Grant and campus-based financial aid

Federal Work Study (FWS)

The workstudy program helps college students pay for day-to-day expenses and tuition with part-time jobs

Final exam

A test that is given at the end of a term that usually includes subject matter from the entire class.

Financial Aid

Money students may be eligible to receive to help pay for college tuition or expenses

First-generation college student

A student who is the first in their family to go to college.

Flexible

Online, with no on campus requirement, but some required live, synchronous class meetings or required proctored testing Limited meeting days. Please see the schedule notes for dates and times.

Full- time Student

A student enrolled in at least 12 units or more during the Fall or Spring semester

G

General Education Courses

A curriculum that creates the foundation of a bachelor's degree. It generally includes lower-level courses in English, Mathematics, Natural Sciences, and

Social Sciences.

Grade point average (GPA)

Represents the average of a student's final grades in all of their courses. An "A" counts as 4; a "B" as 3; a "C" as 2; a "D" as 1; an "F" as 0. Each student has two GPAs: one for the semester and one for all the college-level coursework they have taken.

H

Hybrid Class

A course that is partially online — meaning there are some on campus face -to-face sessions. Hybrid Courses use ECC's Learning Management System, CANVAS, to deliver content, and to assess your learning. For hybrid classes, look for the class footnote in the Schedule of Classes for on-campus meeting dates and times

I

In Progress (IP)

The "IP" symbol shall be used only in those courses, which extend beyond the average end of an academic term. It indicates that work is "in progress," but that assignment of an evaluative symbol (grade) must await its completion

Incomplete (I)

A student may receive a notation of "I" (Incomplete) and a default grade when a student did not complete their academic work for unforeseeable, emergency, and justifiable reasons

L

Live Online Class (Synchronous)

An online class with no on campus requirement but requires some regular, live, synchronous, scheduled online class sessions. Class times and dates are listed in the schedule.

M

Major

The area of study that you choose to focus on in college

Meta Major

Meta-majors are groups of related majors with similar requirements, outcomes, or methodologies

Midterm Exam

A test that is generally taken mid-way through a term to assess a student's knowledge of course material

Military Withdrawal (MW)

Military Withdrawal occurs when a student who is a member of an active or reserve United States military service receives orders compelling a withdrawal from courses

MyECC

A student portal where you can review your schedule, check the status of your financial aid, pay for classes, check your placement test scores, and much more in the MyECC student portal

N

New Student Orientation

A session that provides students with a general overview of El Camino College, its academic programs, facilities, and support services

Non-credit ESL classes

Non-credit ESL courses are free of charge and designed to help non-native speakers develop their ability to understand, speak, read, and write English

Non-resident

A student who is not an official California resident

O

Office-hours

Time set aside by professors for students to visit them and ask anything related to the course they teach.

Offsite Class

Held face-to-face at a location other than El Camino College

Online Class

Courses completed entirely online — meaning there are no on-campus meetings with no regularly scheduled online sessions. Online Courses use ECC's Learning Management System, CANVAS, to deliver content, and to assess your learning

P

Part-time Student

A student enrolled in less than 12 units during the Fall or Spring semester

Pass / No Pass (P / NP)

An option for students to choose a grade of Pass or No Pass instead of a letter grade (A, B, C, D, F) by the fourth week of a 16-week class or when 25 percent of a class has passed

Placement Survey

English and Mathematics Placement Survey is located on the MyECC student portal. Placement will be based on your high school GPA and coursework.

Prerequisite

A class that a student is required to take before another class to demonstrate readiness.

Progress Probation

This occurs when a student has attempted at least 12 units, and the percentage of all units attempted reaches or exceeds 50 percent of all grades at the college. Grades used to calculate attempted units include: "W", "I", "NP", "NC" and all letter grades.

R

Registration

The process of enrolling in specific courses

Reported Delayed (RD)

The registrar is the only person who can assign an "RD" symbol. It is used when there is a grade delay due to

circumstances beyond a student's control.

The academic record of a student's college course work

Withdrawal (W)

A "W" is not used in calculating grade point average, but excessive "W's" shall be used as factors in course repetition and probation and dismissal procedures.
