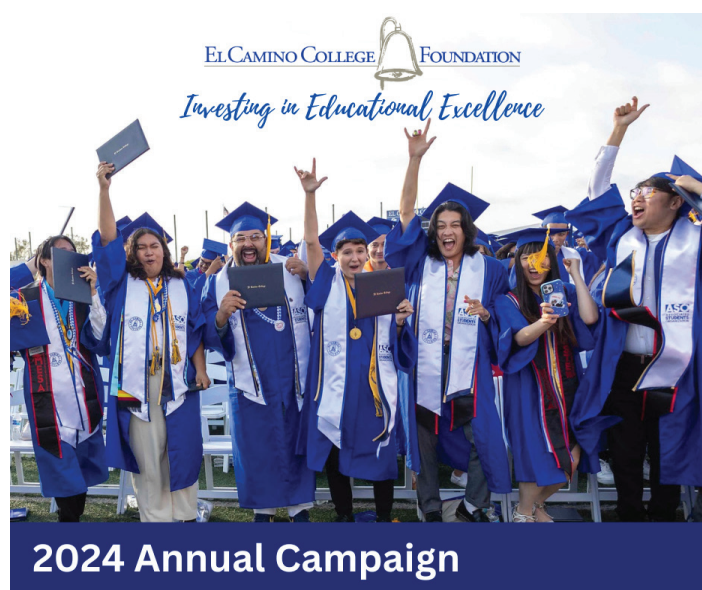

The Architecture Program at El Camino College Reaches Golden Milestone



The current academic year at El Camino College represents an important milestone for the Architecture Program. Introduced in the Fall of 1974, architecture courses were offered for the first time as part of an independent program. Prior to the establishment of the program, architectural

drafting courses were offered through the mechanical drafting program. Albert Palmer, an architect and civil engineer who taught at El Camino for 30 years, is credited with establishing the program with the intention of focusing on the needs of the architecture profession. The program started with six architecture courses in 1974 and grew to a dozen courses 25 years later in 1999. The emphasis was on the technical side of the profession with drafting and drawing courses at its core.

Today, the Architecture Program is a comprehensive educational pathway for more than 300 students enrolled in more than 30 plus architecture and sustainable design courses. While the program maintains its roots as being one of the best community college programs to train students on the technical side of the profession, the program's emphasis today is squarely on decarbonization and design theory.

The architecture students today represent a more diverse group with extensive talent to better shape the future of the profession.

"When I was a student at El Camino in 1969, the focus was on training draftsmen," says Dan Richardson, a 28-year veteran faculty member of the program. "Today the profession has its sights on minimizing the impacts of the built environment to which our program reflects this in order to better address the needs of



our industry partners," he continues. In addition, the architecture students today represent a more diverse group with extensive talent to better shape the future of the profession.

To celebrate this milestone, El Camino College and the Architecture Department are planning several events to commemorate the accomplishments of the program. From establishing an endowment for student scholarships and developing an industry campaign to curating an alumni exhibition and hosting an alumni reception, various 50th Anniversary activities will mark this special occasion through the rest of the academic year.

TUSD's Early College Program at North High School Sets Students Up for Success



This fall, Torrance Unified School District's North High School began their 3rd Early College Program cohort in partnership with El Camino College. This program provides driven, forward-thinking

students a jumpstart to their college and professional careers.

The comprehensive 4-year model began in November 2021 and provides students the opportunity to graduate with both a high school diploma and an AA or AS degree from El Camino College after taking classes including Business, Computer Science, Ethnic Studies, First Aid Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Basic Emergency Care, Journalism, Trigonometry, and more. While most Early College programs throughout the state are completely housed at the local community college, North's program is unique in that students still have the opportunity to

attend both campuses to participate in North's athletics, fine arts programs, campus clubs, and other extracurricular activities while earning both diplomas.

Kati Krumpke, Chief Academic Officer of Torrance Unified School District, spoke last year about the successes of the Early College Program at an El Camino College Board of Trustees meeting stating, "The cohort's GPA was at 3.8 this past year, including both El Camino and high school courses. The group also demonstrated a 100% retention rate, as all students remained in the program the following year."

In addition to TUSD, El Camino College has collaborated with 23 local high schools and has expanded their dual enrollment and early college course offerings for high school students. This free program not only helps to educate the South Bay, but families can ultimately save thousands of dollars in college tuition along the way.



Adversity Does Not Mean Impossible for Jason Newton

Jason Newton is a current El Camino College student, looking to complete a Business Administration degree in December. However, his journey towards a college degree has been truly remarkable and nothing short of easy.

Jason Newton moved to the South Bay from Lexington, Kentucky in March 2020, during the pandemic. Prior to El Camino, Newton spent years in foster care and attended college at Eastern Kentucky, then the University of Kentucky to study Hospitality Management. He was hired as a line cook at Kincaid's Restaurant in Redondo Beach on July 15, 2022. He became homeless that October. The first few months he had nothing but a backpack and a job. Newton stated, "It was definitely an experience I was not prepared for. It wasn't my first time {being homeless}, but to the extent that it was, being alone in a place I knew nothing about... It could really happen to anyone."

Ultimately, Newton saved enough money to purchase a car, which enabled him to land a second job delivery driving. Luckily for Newton, working in food service allowed him a daily shift meal. He also ate at the Salvation Army and received more food at a Torrance distribution center. At the Salvation Army, a worker introduced him to contacts who connected him to caseworkers who helped him move into the Redondo Beach pallet shelter. "I was thrilled. I was completely thrilled," Newton said. Newton is now a tenant at The Moonstone, Los Angeles County's first Homekey project in the South Bay, developed in partnership with Century Housing. He serves as their on-site Resident Advisor.



Reflecting, Newton shared, "The term homeless is not a blanket term. It's interesting how so many people can be treated because of one term... It's situational things, and they happen, and you keep doing what can be done. I have faith that God doesn't give us anything we can't overcome."

After El Camino, Newton's goal is to pursue a bachelor's degree at Cal State University Dominguez Hills and secure a management position in the food service industry. After hearing about Newton's story of hardship, the El Camino College Foundation awarded him the Joy Bender Scholarship in the amount of \$4,000 for his resiliency to remain in school despite life's challenges.

Looking Through the Lens of Telescope Maker Richard Hedrick: President/CEO of PlaneWave Instruments

in 1991, the first telescope-making class began at El Camino College. This elective, no-credit telescope-making course required ten students per semester, and is still taught at El Camino College today, under the course name ASTR 13 - Astronomical Optics. This class is where Richard Hedrick, Joseph Haberman, and Jason Fournier, the future co-founders of PlaneWave Instruments,

met and further pursued their future in astronomy. Because El Camino launched his professional career, Hedrick stated, "I'm a big fan of what community colleges can do."

As their hobby evolved through the early 2000s, Dr. Hacking, Richard, and his classmates set out on a mission to make the biggest amateur telescope in the world. Their plans included a 42" visual-use telescope, with handmade optics, and an eyepiece position that did not require a large ladder. When David Rowe, the engineer who would later develop the CDK telescope heard of their mission, he suggested a new design that would offer higher performance, and the crew welcomed him to their team.

In 1995, Richard graduated from UCLA and began work at Celestron, overseeing Product Development. Soon after, Jason Fournier was hired as Product Manager and Joe Haberman was hired as Master Optician. While working at Celestron, the team continued to develop the optics for their 42" telescope. As production continued, their pursuit of the perfect telescope began, and from this dream, PlaneWave Instruments was born. "When you do something you love, it isn't work," stated Hedrick. We are so proud of alumnus Richard Hedrick and the strong educational foundation he received at El Camino College. Once a Warrior, Always a Warrior!

Muratsuchi admitted that he truly enjoys teaching. Connecting with young adults, especially through classroom discussions, has been very rewarding to him. He hopes to convey the idea that politics at the local, state, and national level have a direct impact on his pupils. Muratsuchi's goal is to have his students translate concepts into their daily lives. "It's important for the students to make a difference by getting involved with politics," Muratsuchi said. Watching and critiquing the 2024 presidential debates this semester has been a class highlight.

Apparently, Muratsuchi had been thinking of teaching a college-level course at El Camino for some time and broached the topic with college administrators in January 2023. Muratsuchi submitted his resume like all potential faculty members, and after a full vetting and hiring process, was offered the position. Once students heard the Assemblymember was teaching, the course completely filled up and even was waitlisted.

Muratsuchi attended UC Berkeley and received his Juris Doctor degree at UCLA. Thank you for educating the students of the South Bay.

3X Olympic Medalist April Ross Named Women's Head Beach Volleyball Coach

Three-time Olympic medalist and professional beach volleyball player April Ross was recently hired to coach El Camino's women's beach volleyball program. Ross succeeds LeValley Pattison who stepped down from coaching after eight seasons. Ross will become the second coach in the program's eight-year history. "I'm excited to

continue to grow this program," Ross said. "Not just compete, but guide the athletes here in their lives and help them succeed."

The former USC Trojan who won back-to-back NCAA indoor volleyball titles in 2002 and 2003 represented the United States at the Summer Olympic

Games in 2012, 2016 and 2020. At the 2020 Tokyo Games, Ross paired with Alix Klineman to defeat Australia to secure a gold medal.

Prior to those games, Ross and Jennifer Kessy wrapped up the London Games in 2012 with a silver medal after falling to Misty May-Treanor and Kerri Walsh-Jennings in the gold medal match. Four years later at the Rio de Janeiro Games, Ross was paired with Walsh-Jennings to take home a bronze medal after defeating Brazil.

Ross will retire from the AVP in November after playing her final season. ECC athletic director Jeff Miera expressed excitement with Ross' hiring. "I'm really excited about this opportunity for our student-athletes. It's incredible for them to play and be coached by a three-time Olympic medalist."

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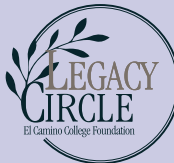
