Retired Educator and Community Activist

Eleanor graduated from El Camino College in 1963, and attended CSULA where she received a B.A. in English, and an M.A. in language arts and literature. She also attended the University of San Francisco where she received another M.A. in private school administration. She was an educator for 36 years in elementary and high school. After retirement, she put her heart and soul into volunteering in her community. She was named Citizen of the Year in Gardena and received a Community Recognition Award from Lions Club International.

George worked at Hughes Aircraft (now Boeing) and was encouraged to attain his college degree, so he enrolled at El Camino College. After completing his lower division courses he transferred to CSULA where he earned a B.S. in mathematics and a M.A. in education. He became a teacher at Jordan High School in Watts and eventually an administrator for the Inglewood Unified School District. He served 15 years on the Torrance City Council and six years in the California State Assembly until he termed out in 2004. George was a member on the board of directors of the El Camino College Foundation from 2007 through 2011 and served as president of the board in 2010-2011.

MESA Students Transfer to Top Universities



Recent El Camino College graduate Erick Quintanilla said a highlight of his time at El Camino was being a part of the Math, Engineering, Science Achievement (MESA) program. Erick was involved with MESA for two years. He was a computer science major, and transferred to UC Berkeley this fall, where he plans to focus on computer engineering. After an obsession with

video games in middle and high school, Erick said he took on a

new passion for programming when he entered college. "I fell in love with it, because it's both so logical yet artistic," added Erick, a Gardena High School alumnus, who is also a 2016 ECC grad.

This year, about 100 MESA graduates transferred to top four-year colleges and universities such as UC Berkeley, UCLA, UC Davis and Cal Poly Pomona. MESA students are offered rigorous coursework, leadership preparation and problem-solving workshops. Other perks

include counseling support and access to the MESA/STEM Center to meet with study groups.

"The El Camino College MESA program provides a variety of academic and enrichment opportunities for students majoring in math, science or engineering," said El Camino College President Dena P. Maloney.

Erick said he's received scholarship support through MESA over the years, and was connected with summer research projects at UCLA as well. Both are funded in whole or part by the El Camino College Foundation. A South Bay native and ECC graduate, Coach Featherstone completed 31 seasons with the Warrior football program. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or in the community, Coach Featherstone always encouraged his players to strive for excellence athletically and to pursue a college education, while representing ECC in a first-class professional manner. He retired with the highest winning percentage of any active coach in the Southern Section of California, which



includes 37 community colleges from Bakersfield to San Diego.

El Camino College Receives \$40,000 Grant from Pritzker Foster Care Initiative

Foster youth enrolled in community colleges disproportionately face serious academic, economic, and emotional challenges and it is imperative that they are adequately served with programs that enhance their learning environment. It is critical to raise awareness among foster youth of the programs and resources available to them. At El Camino College, that means providing a variety of services to help them succeed in their educational pathways.

This program encourages us to be the best we can be and I am very appreciative of it. – Erica – On any given day, there are over 400,000 children in our nation's foster care system with over 100,000 waiting to be adopted. Every year, 23,000 of these youth will age out of the system never having found a permanent home. Young people who age out of foster care face a tough road: they are more likely to experience significant challenges with completing their education, obtaining a job, homelessness, maintaining financial security and staying out of the criminal justice system.*

The majority of foster youth in postsecondary school in California attend community colleges.

Pritzker Foster Care Initiative, part of the Anthony & Jeanne Pritzker Family Foundation, donated \$40,000 to the El Camino College Foundation to provide funding for a Guardian Scholars program.

The Guardian Scholars program at El Camino College offers a regular meeting space on campus where foster youth can gather with their peers and interact with the professionals who support them. There are currently 68 students in the new program who are receiving funds for tuition, books and supplies, and extra resources

on the campus. "LINK UP" is one such resource for foster youth students that provides informational sessions monthly including job attainment, money management, college transfers and classroom success.

Foster youth is a cause about which Jeanne Pritzker is very passionate. In 2012 she launched Foster Care Counts, a non-profit organization that provides support to programs that help foster youth as they leave the system and attempt to become successful young adults.

We thank the Pritzker Foster Care Initiative for its support of foster youth at El Camino College and throughout California.

The South Bay Promise was created to provide a pathway from high school to college for students from the El Camino Community College district. High school graduates who "promise" to attend El Camino College the fall after graduation, will receive free enrollment fees during the first year of enrollment and receive a multitude of services. Private donations allow funding for this important program.

STEM Programs

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) programs are a priority. Our students' success supports that goal - preparing them for prestigious four-year universities. STEM programs are rigorous and need additional funding for facilitators and tutors in the STEM Center, mentoring programs, student collaborations, summer research opportunities, and even additional supplies that will keep our students at the top of the field.

Emergency Book and Tuition Fund
