To all of my Seniors,

I was trying to decide how to close this year. Normally, I would stand in the classroom and try to give some parting advice, so I decided to write you all a letter. 2020 has become a crazy year and somehow all of you have become the ones that have been tossed in the middle of it. I was binge watching the Harry Potter films and if you remember in the 2nd film was a phoenix.
